FRANCE'S TARIFF AND OUR OWN.

From reading the address delivered by Cruppi, the French minister of con erce, in the chamber of deputies Mon lay, it might be thought that the French ernment-whatever is to be said of he French Tariff Commission, or the leg islature, or others concerned—is almost eady to throw the maximum and min mum system overboard and adopt in its stead the conventional or treaty system. This is particularly interesting in view of the fact that we are about to enter upon a form of the maximum and min imum system-a form, however, that i differently conceived from the French. But while M. Cruppi's remarks would

ndicate that the French government i becoming more and more favorably in clined toward the conventional system it is not to be inferred that it is read to break with the maximum and mini mum system. Evidently what it wishe to see accomplished is a further adaptation of the latter system to the conver tional idea. "Our reciprocal and indus trial interests, as proved by resolution passed by the chambers of commerce, said M. Cruppi, "fear a too extended re vision and favor reciprocity treaties. He said that the government approve nothing except a moderate, prudent re vision of the tariff, which would not com promise the economic interests of France abroad, and he dwelt with emphasis upon the need of close economic and po litical relations of France with foreign countries.

The anxiety of a minister of com erce on such a subject can be well ap preciated when we consider the record of what the maximum and minimum sys tem, as known to France in the past, has done by that country. Its rigidity re sulted in such serious tariff wars that in order to terminate them France was compelled to reduce the minimum rate below those established by the French parliament. Up to January the genera and minimum tariff of 1892, the revisio of which is now in progress, had see some 348 modifications in its tariff rates With that experience behind him it i easy enough to see how M. Cruppi could wish for more stable and more certain ground. As for ourselves, it is hoped that we

shall have no such experience. But we should not be too confident about it. The cheme as it passed the senate Saturday corresponds in an important respect with he Norwegian system, which is prol ably the most successful maximum and inimum system in existence. Like that it applies the minimum rates to a ountries in general, reserving the max mum rates only for those that discrim inate against us. But perhaps the true ecret of success of the Norwegian sys tem is that its minimum tariff is low "that no foreign nation could pos sibly find fault with it." The total of prisoners in the county jail yesterday numbered fifty-one. The total capacity of the jail, making use of every available space consistent with the comfort of the prisoners, is fifty. There are accommodations for thirty-six persons on the lower floor, and fourteen en the upper. It is a low room and poorly ventilated and when two big ranges are in action, cook ing food for lifty or more prisoners, that kitchen is a place of torture. The only help that the sheviff can keep in the kitchen is prisoner help, for no others will remain long. It is necessary to carry the food of the prisoners up one and two flights of stairs, which is a great inconvenience. The sanitary arrangements in the kitchen are none of the best and the whole place is inacequate

to its purposes, The present jail was built in 1886, being an integral part of the county build ing. Since that time it has not been enlarged with the exception of the ad-

In looking over some old papers of the Jate Peter White, A. F. Koepeke re cently found a manuscript, written Mr. White in 1870, while on a sickber in which he describes the founding o the city of Marquette as follows: From late in May up to the tent of July, we kept possession of all the iron mountains then known west of the 'Jackson,' employing our time fighting mosquitoes by night and the black flies by day; perhaps a small portion of it was given to denuding the iron hills of extraneous matter, preparing the way for the immense shipments that have since followed.

"On the 10th day of July, 1849, we cause away from the mountains, bag and baggage, arriving here at the lake shore (as we then termed it) before We found Mr. Harlow had ar rived and quite a number of mechanics some goods, lots of money, and what was better than all the rest, the sight of some female faces. We were much excited and buoyant with the hope of a bright and dazzling future then before

OPTOMETRY LAW WILL PUT FAKE EYE AND SPECTACLE DOCTORS OUT OF BUSINESS.

A new law to provide for the examination, regulation, licensing and regis tration of optometrists, introduced 1 frightened, but the Indians who lived the following synopsis will explain some Mr. Giles, is of interest to many, and

Five electors of the state are to be ap pointed before Nov. 14, 1909, by th governor, who shall constitute a board of examiners in optometry. These ex aminers must be people who have bee practicing optometry for at least five years. The names of these people ar to be furnished the governor by the Michigan Society of Optometrists, a least three times as many names as ar to be appointed, and he must select th ive from this list. Certain classes of ptometrists are barred from being the board. This board is required t meet at least twice each year.

After Jan. 1, 1910, all men and wome engaged in the practice of optometry of who wish to begin the practice of the same in this state, shall make applica tion to this board to be registered and for a certificate of said registration These certificates are granted under cer tain restrictions, which the law defines

The registration fee is \$5. From and after May 1, 1910, any ap plicant for registration under this ac shall be required to pass an examination The act provides for certain qualifica tions, such as being possessed of an edu cation equal to two years' high school course; he shall have been employed in the office of an optometrist registere under this act, as an assistant, for period of not less than two years, o shall be a graduate of an optical school or college approved by this board, a well as other restrictions which the lay

Provisions are made in the law for lishonest conduct, unprofessionalism. drunkards, etc., when proven in a court

competent jurisdiction. The board conducts their business with he money received in fees, and provision is made for salaries of examiners

The practice of optometry is defined to be the employment of any means other than the use of drugs for the meas arement of the powers of vision and the determination of the accommodative and efractive states of the eye and the scope of its functions in general, and th adaption of lenses and frames for the aid thereof. The provisions of this act do not apply to physicians and surgeons who are duly licensed. Punishment provided for the violation of this act.

The result of the hearing next Tues day will be of considerable interest t every taxpayer, as it will mean that the rate of taxation will be about two cents higher, if the state tax commission reduces the company's assessment, a requested. It will also mean a great deal of extra work for Controller Pri meau, if the reduction is made, as the entire tax roll has now been figured ou at the rate of \$1.71 per \$100 valuation If the reduction is made by the stat commission, the entire roll will have t be made over again on the basis of slightly higher rate.
