

TARIFF FRAMERS ON THE CARPET

Hearing the Corporation Tax Provision Might Be Dropped from the Bill, President Taft Summons Aldrich and Payne.

He Gives Them to Understand That He Has Not Changed His Mind About the Advisability of Enacting the Proposition, and Doubtless His Admonition Will Be Heeded—Nevertheless the Opposition to the Plan Still Is of Serious Nature.

Washington, July 14.—Reports that there was dissatisfaction in the tariff conference with the corporation tax amendment, and that it might be dropped out, reached the ears of President Taft today.

The president undoubtedly made it clear that he has not changed his mind about the advisability of taxing the earnings of corporations.

Adoption Not Yet Certain. That the opposition to the corporation tax feature is so serious as to imperil its adoption was indicated today by a chance remark of Representative McCall.

In the informal discussion in conference it has been developed that the corporation tax feature which was placed in the bill by the house and eliminated by the senate may not be restored.

Nearly all of the president's congressional callers today agreed that the tariff bill would be out of the way within the next few days.

President to Be the Impulse. The big disputes over the tariff bill will be fought out between Senator Aldrich and Mr. Payne, acting for the senate and the house, respectively.

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New Yorker's Reported Expulsion Is Permitted by Existing Treaties.

Washington, July 14.—The case of Estafka, of New York, one of the German-American marriages, who has been ordered to leave Germany, presumably for failure to perform military service in that country, has not been brought to the attention of this government, nor is it expected that any notice will be taken of the matter.

CAUGHT KILLING SEALS. Eighteen Japanese Are Captured by a United States Revenue Cutter.

Seward, Alaska, July 14.—The United States revenue cutter Perry today seized the Japanese sealing schooner Taki, with eighteen men, while they were killing seals within three miles of the Pribilof islands.

DOWNFALL OF THE SHAH APPEARS NEAR AT HAND

Refusing to Make Terms With the Nationalists, Notwithstanding That His Cossacks Propose to Surrender, He Takes Refuge in the Palace, Which It Is Now Reported Will Be Attacked.

Tehran, July 14.—The fighting in the streets of Tehran became more serious at midnight, when the Persian Cossacks opened a heavy artillery fire on the nationalists.

The British and Russian ministers have urged the shah to arrange terms with the nationalists, but the shah has refused, and it is now reported that the nationalists will attack Noutantatabad palace, where the shah has taken refuge.

PRINCE VON BUELOW STEPS OUT OF OFFICE

Germany's Chancellor Yields the Reins to His Successor, Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, Who, However, Is Not Received With Particular Enthusiasm.

Berlin, July 14.—Prince von Buelow, chancellor of the empire, retired today and was succeeded by Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg.

Various other minor changes have been made after conferences which the emperor has had with his ministerial advisers.

The political aspect of the change is important. Von Buelow is the first German chancellor who has been compelled to leave office because of an adverse parliamentary majority.

Establishing a New High Mark for the Season, the Price of the July Option at Chicago Soars to \$1.27 a Bushel.

'Fill Your Wants in the Open Market,' Is Patten's Reply When the Shorts, Alarmed at Reports of Additional Rain, Offer to Settle, and When They Attempt to Do So the Quotation Shoots Up Seven Cents, Amid Scenes of Great Confusion.

Chicago, July 14.—Wheat for July delivery advanced seven cents during a stormy session of the board of trade today, establishing a new high record mark for the season and giving promise of a reputation of the recent "deal," headed by James A. Patten.

Patten Has All the Wheat. There is practically no wheat suitable for delivery on contracts in this city at the present time, and what little there is belongs to the Patten interests.

As a result of the sharp advance in wheat the prices of flour were marked up ten to twenty cents for the best descriptions of the old wheat variety, while new wheat flour was advanced ten cents a barrel.

Stock Market Is Inactive. New York, July 14.—Operators in stocks were confirmed in their inclination to refrain from trading today, owing to the incoherence and indecisive movement of the market for several days past.

SHERIFF REFUSES WIDOW'S REQUEST

Denied Leave to Attend Funeral, Mrs. Saylor Remains in Jail, Weeping Copiously, as Husband's Body Is Given Sepulchre.

Blairsville, Pa., July 14.—Mrs. Cora Miller, wife of Dr. Miller, charged with killing banker Saylor at Crescent City, Ill., Sunday night, told her story of the affair to the Associated Press today.

Mrs. Miller said that she was cognizant of the intimacy between her husband and Mrs. Saylor for the past two years, but had kept her trouble to herself "rather than let the world put blame on her."

Mrs. Miller said that she would stand by her husband to the last, "for I love him better than my life."

Doctor Summons Her. Watska, Ill., July 14.—A letter summoning his still faithful wife to his side was sent from here today by Dr. Miller, slayer of J. B. Saylor, the Crescent City banker, whose body was followed to the grave today by nearly the entire adult population of his home town.

Mrs. Saylor was not allowed to attend her husband's funeral, although she begged the sheriff for permission to do so.

Sees Cortage from Jail Window. The principal address at the funeral was delivered by Rev. Joseph Bell of this city. He dwelt on the sacredness of the home and of man's duty to defend its honor, and commended that the law be allowed to take its course.

Another detail of the domestic situation in the Saylor family and of the day of the killing was learned today from Mrs. Margaret Jenkins, proprietress of the Crescent City Hotel.

LEGAL TECHNICALITIES CLOSE EVELYN'S LIPS

On the Ground the Conversation Was Privileged, She Is Not Allowed to Testify Concerning a Story Her Husband Has Recently Threatened to Kill Her.

White Plains, N. Y., July 14.—Evelyn Thaw's lips were still closed by legal technicalities today, and she did not resume the stand, as expected, to testify for the state in opposing Thaw's attempt to prove his sanity.

The court has not decided whether or not that conversation was privileged. Justice Mills, however, intimated to Thaw's counsel that unless further legal reason was advanced for excluding Evelyn Thaw's testimony he would be inclined to hold that the conversation of a husband against a wife, or any kind of abuse, is not confidential communication.

Attendants at the state asylum today testified that Thaw always appeared rational in speech and action while under their observation. Several physicians who attended Thaw and his wife and other members of the Thaw family testified along the same lines.

FIERY FLUID DRENCHES AUTOMOBILE'S OCCUPANTS. Due to the Explosion of the Gasoline Tank of a Touring Car, Two Persons Are Dead in Georgia, Two Others Are Dying and Four Are Seriously Burned.

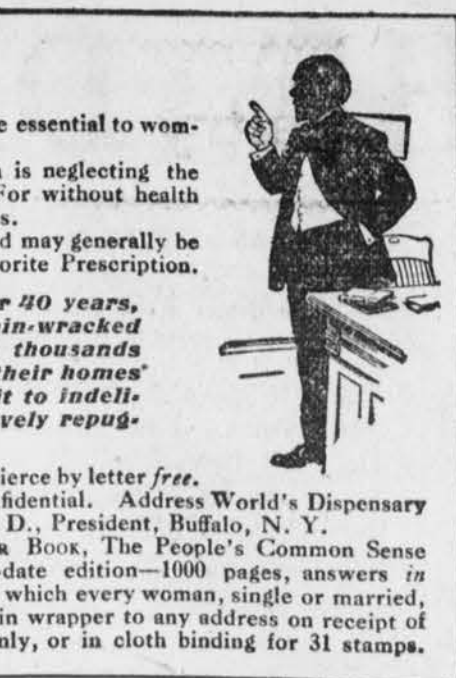

NEW FRISCO COMES UP FROM THE OLD.

Marvelous Transformation of the City Since Earthquake. CITY IS BOOMING AGAIN. Money Stringency Lasted Only About Six Months After the Great Disaster.

San Francisco, July 14.—The rehabilitation of San Francisco since the fire and earthquake of April, 1906, has witnessed as much courage, self-sacrifice, pluck and optimism as was seen immediately after the disaster.

In the first flush of enthusiasm, which was a rebound from the sense of crushing loss, the work of rebuilding seemed easy. Large amounts of insurance money were soon to be paid, banks and financial institutions in the east were eager to promise aid.

Heart-Breaking Experience. It was a heart-breaking experience for the enterprising men who began rebuilding before the ashes of the fire were fairly cold.

Everybody Bought Things. The hotels, restaurants and stores would have come to stay. Then came the big street car strike of May, 1907, and within a week a cruel frost had blighted the auspicious prosperity.

To R.D. the House of Flies—A correspondent writes to ask how to use pyrethrum powder for the destruction of flies. Directions will be obtained when the powder is purchased. It is largely used as an insecticide. There is a substitute duffler that is probably better. The London Lancet, a good authority, says: "The best exterminating agent is a weak solution of formaldehyde in water (say two tea-spoonfuls to the pint); and this experience has been confirmed by others. It would appear that flies are attracted by a weak solution of formaldehyde, which they drink. Some die in the water, others get as far as the immediate vicinity of the plate of water but all ultimately succumb, and where they occur in large numbers, hundreds may be swept from the floor. It is confusing to know that by this method flies have died under a dose of a fluid which is fatal to disease organisms, a fluid also which is inoffensive and for practical purposes non-poisonous. The method at once provides a means of diminishing the scourge and of securing to some extent what is most desirable, the disinfection of the slain."

Upper Peninsula

School Board Trustees Re-elected—Attorney G. R. Empton and C. A. Clark have been re-elected members of the board of education at Gladstone by majority approximately forty votes over M. W. Lanester and John Barrett. More than the usual interest was manifested and considerably more than the normal number of votes cast at both elections in the city were polled. Both Mr. Empton and Mr. Clark have served for several years as members of Gladstone's board of education.

Engagement Announced—Mrs. Thomas R. Thurston of Hancock has announced the engagement of her daughter, Miss Emma Dunstan, to George A. Osborn, son of Chase S. Osborn of Sault Ste. Marie, and at present a student in the Michigan College of Mines at Houghton. Miss Dunstan is a daughter of the late Thomas R. Thurston, formerly lieutenant governor of the state of Michigan, who during his lifetime was one of the foremost members of the upper peninsula bar and a leading and most influential citizen of the copper country.

He Lived to Be Eighty-One—John Miller, octogenarian, and one of Chippewa county's oldest and earliest settlers, passed away this week on his farm near Pine Grove, where he has spent twenty-nine years of his life. He located there when it was a wild and unsettled country and cleared the land until now it is an excellent farming property. Mr. Miller was born eighty-one years ago in England. His wife, to whom he was married sixty-three years ago, survives him, as do six children—William, who operates the farm where his father died; Isaac and James, of Chippewa; and three married daughters, Lina and Mary of Ontario and Jane of Manitoba.

Residence a Gift for Daughter—John Kevlar, a Meunonance contractor, has been awarded the contract for the construction of a residence for Samuel Crawford of that city. The house will be a gift by Mr. Crawford to his daughter. The contract was awarded on a bid of \$3,212. The residence will be on North Main street. It will be of the California bungalow style two stories in height, exterior shingled and the whole structure thoroughly modern. It will be the second residence of this design in Meunonance. The bid upon which the contract was awarded did not include the heating system.

Caught by Moving Machine—With one of his legs frightfully mutilated as the result of being caught in the sickle of a moving machine on a farm near St. Jacques where he was visiting, Early Barnes, son of Mrs. Minnie Barnes of Escanaba, has been taken to the Delta county hospital. Although the limb is badly cut, an effort is being made to save it. According to the story told by those who brought the lad to the city he went to a field where a mower was in operation. Misjudging the width of the swath that was being taken by the machine he stood in the striking path and before the driver saw him he had been caught.

Mayor Plans Free Saloons—In an interview at the Sco this week, Mayor Sullivan of that city stated that he would, in a short time, appoint a committee to investigate and report on the proposition of reducing the saloons next year to thirty or thirty-five. The mayor further said that he was anxious that such action be taken and that he would advocate the adoption of an ordinance to this effect early in September, when it would be necessary so to do under the new law. He said that the liquor dealers of the city were entitled to know at the earliest possible moment just what the council proposed to do in the matter so that they could arrange their affairs accordingly. The mayor's idea is to decrease the number of saloons and increase the license fee so that the city would derive practically the same revenue as at present. Should the number of saloons be reduced to thirty-five by ordinance, this number would gradually grow less, as those now in the business dropped out until the total number does not exceed one to every 500 inhabitants. The Sco now has some seventy saloons.
