Tueson, Ariz., July 14.—Two mile em this town, on the top of a hill, the ernegie Institution has set up a sort or tanical workshop, the business of which is to make a study of deser lants. The object of the investigation to find out how such plants manage get along with almost no water, This is a kind of knowledge that will e very valuable when applied, so far as day be practicable, in the raising of orinary crops in parts of the West where ainfall is deficient. But, incidentally fforts are being made to find uses for one of these plants of the desert-es cally for certain caeti, which, it is beeved, can be made to yield marketable

There is, for example, one kind of prickly pear (growing wild in Arizona idice of a brilliant red color. This fruit is already utilized to a considerable extent for preserves. But it is thought juice might have important. ourmercial value as a vegetable coloring. ts hue, when the fluid is concentrated, being as rich as that of cochineal.

Ed ble Cacti.

A number of species of prickly pears ield edible fruits, which are largely onsuraed in Mexico, and which migh asily be grown in the southern part o the United States, and particularly in he Southwest, Experiments with some of these were made not long ago by Lr. Leon E. Landone, who lived for a numorr of days on the fruits and leaves, the atter being eaten as greens and fried ike eggplant.

Against the claims of prescriptive right have been set up those of actual possession and effec tive control. It is not enough, say the aggressive nations of Europe, to exhibit as proof of cwners ip musty deeds with savage chiefs, when there has been no attempt to control effectually the territory in question, since in several eases, now matters of history, when Liberia has been anade to make such proof, it has been formed to yield to diplomatic pressure, and has seen itself shorn of large slices of territory once conceded to belong to the republic. Liberia is fearful that the eng is not yet, and suspects further cur-

tailment as its portion, "The back country, or hinterland, has in recent years acquired a new significance. In many parts of Africa the area of economic control is being pushed inways. With this increased trade area, have couse new governmental daties in the policing of larger districts, and the maintenance of peace and order among the native inhabitants. Increased trade has brought increased revenue in its train, and thus ways and means have

been available to meet the new duties of government. "In this expanding commerce Liberia has participated but little. It has had no mother country from which to draw the capital for railway construction, and its revenues have therefore been comparatively stationary. Surrounded as it by powerful neighbors, who are disposed to feel that if it expects to retain its territory permanently it must control it effectively. Liberia finds itself in a most uncomfortable predicament. It has at present neither the administrative capacity, nor the financial resources for the greater problems of government which now confront it. If it is to gain them it must be by slow internal growth. The transformation in the modes of government in Africa has taken place so apidly that in these essential particulars Liberia is behind the general trend of events. This is not saying that it may not catch up, With intelligent quidance and unremitting effort Liberia may meet these new problems as it has in times past met the older ones. But it is too much to expect that its advance in these particulars should at once be in proportion to its needs. In the early stages of its history the governments of the world looked upon Liberia with tolerance, if not benevolence, Some of the same patient forbearance exercised now gate affairs in Liberia in an interview will give the people courage in the solutien or their new problem. 

# JUVENILE COURT FOR THIS COUNTY

PROBATE JUDGE TO PRESIDE UN DER LAW PASSED BY THE LAST LEGISLATURE

Must Be Confined in Separate Jail -What Is Being Done Elsewhere.

Probate Judge Potter will be called upon to take upon himself the duties of presiding judge of the juvenile court of Marquette county, in accordance with the new law passed at the recent session of the legislature. The state of Michigan, with the exception of Marquette and Houghton counties, has for the last two years been acting under a juvenile court law, similar to the measure passed by the last legislature. When former juvenile court law was passed at the special session of the legislature in 1907, however, Marquette and Houghton counties were exempted from its provisions, as the counties were large and the old method of dealing with juvenile offenders seemed to be working with satisfaction. The new constitution, how ever, prohibits special legislation of this character, and after about Aug. 20, every county in the state will operate under the new law and maintain its juvenile

The law provides that the sessions of the court shall be held in the probate court room, but that a special place must be provided in which to confine youthful offenders, other than the jail or place of incarceration for adult prisoners. Accordingly, the board of supervisors will have to arrange for such a place of confinement, and this will probably be done at the meeting to be held July 28. All complaints made against boys and girls under seventeen years of age will be heard before the juven#e court, under the provisions of the law. Ir case the request is made, any case may be tried before a jury, as in justice or circuit court,

Probation Officer William F. Zuerner, of Milwaukee, has recently made public some information regarding the work ings of the juvenile court in that city and the results that were being obtained, which, in view of the widespread local interest in the subject, is well worth reading. He says:
