When Mr. Aldrick and Mr. Cannon re turned to the Capitol, they minimized the differences that had aroused bitterness in the conference room, and insisted that nothing unusual had occurred, Senator Aldrich said that tomerrow would work, and he expected that by night when all the conferees are to be entertained by the president at dinner, most of the problems, apart from those recoiving the personal attention of the president, would have been solved.

Trouble Behind the Closed Doors, Nevertheless, there has been troub! behind those closed doors that shut the public from the room where the real tariff bill is being constructed. Some say that the differences between Senator Aldrich and Mr. Payne have taken such form that progress is impossible unless the president has influence enough to compel action. Pittsburg's Public Defense Association Fails in Its Novel Effort to Bring About Industrial Peace at McKees Rocks, Pa.



WOMAN'S STATUS AND MISSION. Her Responsibilities, Power and Influences in Different Ages.

In these days, when an active and highly ingenious band of women are determined that their political aspirations shall not be lost sight of; when cabinet ministers are routed by a muffin bell; when the organ in a public hall emits the cry of "Votes for women" when the sacred precincts of the House of Commons are not protected from in vasion, the majority of us are content either to support the movement with enthusiastic partisanship, or else to condemn it and its authors in forcible and bitter terms. Before, however, taking sides in the

present controversy it may assist some of us to form a dispassionate opinion on the subject if we trace, however, superficially, the position of women in different ages and under different conditions.

The social equality of the two sexes is undoubtedily implied in the Biblical history of the creation of the human race. Woman is to be the helpmeet of man, and her very name in the Hebrew as given her by Adam, is the same as his own, save only for the feminine affix. It is true that for a time, under the autocratic powers vested in the head of the family during the patriarchal era, voman held a very subordinate position: vet the whole tenor of the Mosaic law was in the direction of according to her a considerable amount of liberty, and a large share in the ordering of the house The tendency of polygamy was to de-

grade her to a condition of inferiority and this is the main cause of her sub servency to man up to the present day in many Oriental countries. Among Mohammedans (although with them she s frequently accorded a position of rust) and other polygamous races she regarded as an irresponsible playhing or else as a drudge, and all opportunities of educating herself or of leveloping her natural intelligence are lenied to her.

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
