Statements of the Witnesses Summoned Before the Board of Inquiry at Annapolis, Md., Disagree in Various Particulars.

Belief of the Mother That Her Son Was Beaten to Death Is Not Borne Out by the Testimony of the Comrades of the Young Officer, All of Whom Contend That He Ended His Life by Shooting, but the StoriesTold Conflict in Many Details

Annapolis, Md., July 21.-When the naval board of inquiry investigating the death of Lieutenant Sutton finished its four witnesses out of the fifteen so far along for several days yet.
