Ironwood Bank Situation—
There have been no sensational de-
velopments in the First National bank
case during the past week, says the Iron-
wood Times. We understand that about
eight thousand dollars worth of notes—
in addition to the sixty thousand report-
ed of last week—have been found which the
people whose names are attached thereto
claim are forgeries, but service has been
made on these people and they will be
compelled to show in court that these
notes are forgeries as claimed. Receiver

rency.
Wisconsin Officials Nipped—
A dispatch from Wausaukee, Wis.,
says, Game Warden John Rowett of
Bessemer, arrested two Wisconsin men
at Randallville, Dickinson county, Mich.,
on the charge of having unlicensed
trout in their possession. The prisoners,
who were taken to Iron Mountain
proved to be none other than Sheriff
Killman and Prosecuting Attorney Rey-
nolds of Provan county, their homes be-
ing at Green Bay. The sheriff assumed
the responsibility of having the un-
licensed trout and he paid a fine of \$10
and costs, amounting to \$16, in justice court.
An effort was made to suppress the news
of their arrest, but when the official ca-
pacity of the men became known, the
story was too good to keep.

Local Option Campaign—
Those in charge of the local option
campaign in this county report that
more than 300 persons have this far
signed the local option petition, and a
thorough canvass has barely commenced,
says the Manipique Pioneer-Tribune.
Some are so sanguine that they predict
that a majority of the voters will be se-
cured to sign the petitions before the
campaign of solicitation is ended. The
voters in the country are practically a
unit in favor of the proposition, while in
the city sentiment is very much divided.
Good arguments pro and con are being
heard on every hand, and it is safe to
say that the pot, which is at the present
time simmering, will be boiling in a
short time. At this early stage of the
campaign it is impossible to forecast
victory or defeat for the factions in-
volved. That the campaign will be
vigorously prosecuted by both sides goes
without saying. Many have predicted
all the time that if the requisite number
of signatures were secured the proposi-
tion would carry, as many that do not
relish the publicity that their signatures
would entail, would quietly vote for it.
A number of persons that are customers
of the saloons are signing the petition in
the city, and they say they will vote for
local option, so that the temptation to
drink may be placed out of their reach.
