For nearly a week the question of putting hides on the free list or imposing a nominal duty upon them has been be fore the conference committee. Not even a nominal duty proved acceptable to Mr. Payne, whose position was strengthened by the support of President Taft, and the senate was compelled to vied in spite of the fact that free hides threatened to provoke an insurrection among the "stand-pat" senators from the cattle-raising states. It appears, however, that Mr. Payne's victory was a costly one, inasmuch as the house conferees were defeated on coal, print paper, iron ore and lumber. Although new oaths of secrecy were taken by every member of the conference committee before today's session was adjourned, it is well understood that the foregoing rates represent the understanding reached on tween those who wanted a one per cent all subjects which have engaged executive attention during the last 'few weeks.
