General Pintos Among the Slain.

Melilla, Morocco, July 28.—The official report of yesterday's battle shows that it was one of the most sanguinary engagements of the present campaign. The fighting cost the Spaniards more than two hundred in dead and wounded, the slain including General Pintos, two lieutenant colonels commanding naval contingents and a large number of other officers. At 9 o'clock in the morning word was received that the Moors had destroyed large portions of the railroad, which isolated and imperiled the extreme Spanish post, A convoy escorted by two lively. While the convoy was reprovisioning the stations, the iards sustained a terrific fusilade from thousands of Moors who first fired from fastnesses in the mountains and then boldly charged in the face of a murderons assault by the Spanish artillery. The Spanish officers describe the Moorish loss as enormous. Reinforcements sent to the support of the convoy and its escort repulsed the Moors and drove them back to the hills. Today a Spanish gunbeat seized a vessel loaded with numitions of war and having on board 100 armed Kabyle tribesmen.

Revolution at Home Is Serious.

Madrid, July 28.—The revolution in Catalonia has reached a serious stage. There is much bloodshed, and artillery has been employed in the streets of Barcelena to quell outbreaks. The city is terror-strickelt. The revolutionists are reported to be fighting desperately be hind barricades. The troops include mounted artillery, and the defenses of the rebels have been raked with shot. King Alfonso hastened back to Madrid from Sansebastian today, and at once issued a decree proclaiming marrial law and the suspension of constitutional guarantees throughout Spain, Orders have been given to crush the revolution at any cost, without hesitation and without pity.




