Washington, July 30 .- Entering upon the last stages of its consideration by congress, the tariff bill, as reported by the conterces, was submitted to the house today by Chairman Fayne, and was ordered printed in the Congressional Record, The discussion of the conference report will begin tomorrow morning, with indications that one day will suffice for its adoption,

Three hundred and fifty of the three hundred and ninety members were in their seats when Chairman Payne week passed up to the speaker's desk the document which had occupied the attention of congress for four and one-half of the final hour months, and then the Republicans broke out into loud applause. Mr. Payne will open tomorrow's proceedings with an exhaustive statement in explanation of the bill. Adjournment was taken at 1:52 o'clock p, m,

Panama Meets the Demands of the United States for Reparation,

Washington, July 30.—Panama has met the insistent demands of the United States for reparation in the cases involving the maltreatment of American mayal officers and seamen, the delay in acting on which had produced such irritation at the state department. She will pay an indemnity of \$5,000 in the columbia case, in which several officers in uniform were arrested, locked up and roughly handled in Colon; an indemnity of 88,000 to the relatives of Boat swain's Mate Rand of the Buffalo, who as killed in Panama in September, 1908; an indemnity of \$1,000 to Sailor Cieslik, of the same vessel, who was stabled at the time that Rand was killed, and it also will dismiss all the olice officers who were present at the time of the disturbance in the Buffalo case. The state department accepts these promises upon the condition the persons other than police officials who were involved be punished by the court, and that the payment of the in lemnities proposed be accompanied by a fermal official expression of regret.






