LAKE COPPER COMPANY.

R. M. Edwards, of Houghton, who was largely responsible for the early success of the Lake Copper company and says: "I am still a holder of a considerable amount of Lake Copper shares and have the greatest confidence in the future of the property."

The Lake Copper company has been making considerable progress in the development of the mine. The drifts are being opened up and the ore is being hoisted to the surface.

UNITED STATES SMELTING.

California advices are to the effect that the smelter in the vicinity of the Mammoth smelter of the United States Smelting, Refining & Mining company may stir up trouble on the ground of alleged damage to timber lands on smelter times.

FIRST NATIONAL COPPER.

are operating the Lake and North Lake. The capitalization is 100,000 shares. The property adjoins the Lake and North Lake. North Butte has purchased a two-thirds interest in a small fractional claim called the Paul, lying east of the Redger State and adjoining the Gem and Croesus claims of North Butte. The ground is shaped like the figure seven and is thirty feet wide. The company is in a long time refused to buy. This ground, but recently James A. Murray, owner of the Ticon claim, who threatens litigation over the Edith May vein, bought an interest from one of the Paul owners, and North Butte has now purchased the remaining interest.

President Dow of the Corbin Copper company is in receipt of advices from the property to the effect that exploratory work is now in progress at nine different points and four of these openings are in the formation character of the property of the Butte camp. No wind-bodies of ore have yet been encountered because no great depth has been attained, although rich seams, giving every indication of a widening tendency with depth, have been encountered and samples have been taken. Development work has been going on at this property for about three years, and this strike is the first one that has been encountered, with the exception of a small vein about two feet wide recently developed at the Elv-Western property which is owned by the Boston Ely Mining company.

The decision of Judge Marshall in the federal court of Utah, permitting the Birmingham Junction iron-ore smelter to smelt copper ore at special conditions, is the second modification of the injunction granted two years ago prohibiting the company from carrying on smelting operations owing to noxious fumes. The company first convinced the court that it had mastered the problem of smelting lead ores without deleterious effects and it is now authorized to proceed with the smelting of copper sulphides. An immense bag house will be constructed to enable the company to smelt copper under the restrictions imposed by the court. It is needless to say this decision is one of great importance to the United States Smelting company. The other Utah smelters are not affected by it as they do not possess the patented process for treating the fumes which has thus far proved so successful in overcoming the objections of the Utah farmers.

Washington, Aug. 6.—President Taft plans to devote his forenoons at Beverly to golf and his afternoons to Mrs. Taft. Her health is improving, but the president is very anxious that she shall completely recover while in Massachusetts this summer. They will go driving much in the late afternoon and evening during the five or six weeks that the president expects to be at Beverly. He wants to get into excellent physical trim for the busy year ahead of him, and to that end is looking forward with much pleasurable anticipation to being out of doors a great deal and to robust exercise on the links. Thus far the president has made no appointments with public men at Beverly. He has made no plans for doing work while there, and about 3:30 p. m. he realizes that many men will come to him there on business connected with the government, and that in short order he will find himself devoting a little time every week day to them. His presence will lead to the production of the afternoon. By such arrangement the President will give between two and three hours a day to office work.

CANADA FEELS LITTLE CHANGE. Sees No Cause for Elation or Disaffection with Our Tariff Measures. Ottawa, Aug. 6.—A survey of the Payne tariff bill, from the standpoint of its effect on Canadian exports to the United States and in the light of the statistics of Canadian exports for last year, fails to show any noteworthy reason why Canada should be either elated or depressed over the outcome of the tariff revision across the border. On the great majority of the items of Canadian exports the new tariff, for all purposes, is quite as prohibitive as the old. The Canadian farmer gains little or nothing. The Canadian manufacturer, except in the case of the lumberman, the coal companies and the exporters of hides, is on the whole left in about the same position as he was before in regard to the American market. In respect to agricultural exports, the Payne bill does almost nothing to alter the McKinley tariff. The duty on barley remains the same, 30 cents per bushel, the duty on wheat is increased from 25 to 30 cents per bushel, the duty on oats is increased from 25 to 30 cents, on hay the practically prohibitive duty of \$4 a ton, is reduced to 20 cents per ton, on butter and cheese a duty of six cents per pound is placed, while on eggs the duty is unchanged at 5 cents per dozen. The duty on lemons, 45 cents per bushel, on onions 40 cents per bushel, and on garden produce generally remains practically prohibitive. In regard to lumber the new duty of \$1.25 per thousand feet for rough lumber is a considerable reduction from the old duty of \$2 per thousand. But lumber manufacturers are inclined to think it is still sufficiently prohibitive to give priority to a large increase in the exportation of Canadian lumber to the states. The reduction of the duty on coal from 67 cents to 5 cents is one of the most important features of the new tariff from the Canadian standpoint. Last year's coal shipments from the Mackinac provinces and British Columbia totalled \$4,011,502. The placing of duties on the free list also is likely to be of material benefit to Canadian exporters, Canada having exported to the states last year hides to the value of \$1,308,531. The reduction in the duty on agricultural implements from 20 per cent to 15 per cent is hardly likely to have any effect on Canada. As for the placing of a retaliatory duty on wood pulp this may be looked upon with comparative equanimity in this country as it probably will lead to the production of an export of wood pulp from Canada with the object of building up the paper industry of the Dominion. The effect of the duty, however, will be felt principally in Quebec.

Upper Peninsula

Sentenced to Hard Labor—George W. Grove, who was arraigned before Judge O. V. Linden, charged with being drunk and disorderly, enjoys the distinction of being the first man in Escanaba sentenced to hard labor for that offense in several years. The council has instructed the justices to sentence all prisoners arraigned for violation of city ordinances to hard work, and Judge Linden has followed the council's orders.

New Government Building—Work on Escanaba's new federal building is progressing rapidly and the indications are that the structure will be under cover by early this fall. The walls now extend well above the first floor and a fair idea of how the building will appear when completed is offered. The stone work about the entrance has all been set in place and presents a most imposing appearance. The contractors have been handicapped at times in securing sufficient masons and bricklayers to push the work, but a full crew is now employed and the progress that is made each day is easily discernible to passersby.

Boxing Bout for Escanaba—Negotiations have been closed for a ten-round boxing bout between Earl Foot of Escanaba and Johnnie Gardner of Chicago, to be held at Escanaba the evening of Aug. 20. The boxers are to meet at 122 pounds, it being provided that they shall weigh in at 3 o'clock on the afternoon of the match. The fight will be held in a tent erected on upper Ludington street, and it is expected that it will attract a great crowd of boxing enthusiasts. In addition to the main bout of the evening there will be matches between Kid Schultz of Corlow, Wis., and Kid Beauchamp of North Escanaba against Stub Schommer of Menominee and another preliminary that is yet to be arranged.

Fayette to Be Rejuvenated—Taking up the matter in their characteristic manner, the officials of the Cleveland-Cliffs Iron company have decided upon the practical rebuilding of Fayette, Delta county, as a summer resort, and the deal was closed when C. V. R. Townsend, land agent for the company, awarded contracts for the work which is to be done. The cottages will be practically rebuilt, will be repainted and placed in first class condition again. The summer hotel will receive a similar treatment and the large hall where the dances are held will not be neglected. The grounds are to be cleared up and the beautiful spot will appear in its best light to visitors. It is the intention of the company to boom Fayette in every possible way. The land agent has seen the possibilities which it offers if rightly conducted and has induced the directors of the company to take the matter up.

Lumber Shipped to Honolulu—From Escanaba, Michigan, to Honolulu, Hawaiian islands, is a long way to ship lumber of any kind, and when the L. S. & I. Steamer company loaded a car of it this week and started it forward on its long journey across the continent and half-way across the Pacific ocean a new distinction fell to the upper peninsula. The product sent to Honolulu comprised 241 crates of maple flooring. The car will go through to San Francisco. All flooring exported must be crated and the expense of crating the carload that left Wells this week was nearly \$100. The freight rate to San Francisco is eighty-five cents a hundred and the same rate applies from San Francisco to the destination. While this is the first shipment of hardwood flooring to be sent from Wells to the Hawaiian islands, it is by no means the first flooring exported by the L. Stearnson company. Consignments have been sent to nearly all the countries of Europe.

Has a Novel Automobile—James B. Seager of Lansing, formerly a resident of Portage Lake and a nephew of James H. Seager, president of the First National bank of Houghton, has, says the Lansing Republican, an automobile fitted up in a manner which is attracting much attention. The car has been equipped for hunting and fishing trips. The body is constructed after the style of a carry-all, with side seats in rear of the driver's seat. Underneath them are commodious lockers for carrying hunting equipment and fishing tackle, but the seats themselves are unusual features of the car. By means of pneumatic cushions and some shifts in the interior arrangement of the rear end the car can be transformed into a sleeping apartment in which a tired hunter or fisherman can secure as comfortable a night's rest as in his own downy bed at home. Everything is supplied for the comfort of sportsmen and within the roomy sleeping section three can slumber with comfort.

Important Deal Concluded—Through negotiations that have just been closed the Little Harbor Lumber company, Bonifas Brothers, owners, has purchased the mill and town site at Little Harbor, together with a large tract of timber, and will carry on extensive operations at that place for the next ten years. The officers of the new concern are John Bonifas, president, treasurer and general manager; Celia Bonifas, vice president, and Isaac Bonifas, secretary. Included in the purchase are a complete mill, a store, twenty-five houses and a quantity of other property, making the deal one of the most important consummated in the district for several years. The members of the firm already owned a considerable tract of standing timber near Little Harbor. Operations will be started at once and lumber will be graded, together with shingles, lath, ties, posts, poles and pulpwood, will be turned out. The company will give employment to a large crew of men. John Bonifas, head of the new concern, is one of the best known lumbermen in the district. He recently retired from the old Bonifas Lumber company, which operated in the vicinity of Garden for many years, handling the greater portion of the timber that was cut in that district. By closing the new deal Mr. Bonifas will be enabled to continue making his home at Garden and much of the company's work will be directed from that place.
