Now it is a poor rule that will no work both ways. If Mr. Reid is chargeable with a birking non sequitur n the statement quoted, how about the anti-protection jeremiads of our perishing little band of foreigners?

Is it a whit more illogical to at tribute prosperity to the tariff, than (as they do) to attribute all sorts of adersity to the tariff?

Free trade logic has time out of mind trained itself to and beyond the breakng point in imputing irrelevant evils to the tariff-strikes, lockouts, socialism, the foot and mouth disease, the sorrows and sickness of the deserving oor, political corruption, and what not. Why, only the other day a neighbor of the Times angrily charged tuberculosis up to the wool schedules!

So, to vary the Times' tart rejoinder to Mr. Reid, one might retort, these evils are no more to be attributed to the tariff than the San Francisco earthquake to the railway rate law. The fact is there has been exaggeration on both sides in alternately making a universal benefactor and a universal scape goat of the tariff.

But the general truth remains: This country has flourished so prodigiously under protection that it is perfectly logical and reasonable to assume that i has flourished partly because of protec tion. So even England, the cradle and stronghold of Cobdenism, is plainly pre paring to pay us the sincere flattery of imitation, and adopt protection. Milwaukee Sentinel.
