THEY MUST KEEP **OUT OF POLITICS**

Writing to Secretary Nagel, President Taft Issues an Important Order Affecting the Supervisors of the United States Census.

Declaring That He Wants No Building of Political Machines Through the Distribution of the Patronage, He Directs That in the Event of Partisan Activity the Appointee Who Is the Culprit Shall Be Dismissed from the Service of the Government.

Beverly, Mass., Aug. 15.-In a letter addressed today to Secretary Nagel, of the department of commerce and labor, President Taft served notice that any man engaged in taking the census and who engages in politics will be dismissed, The president has told the representatives and senators who urged the men for the census places that he will insist that no active partisan be named and ne attempt will be made to build a po litical' machine through the distribution of the census patronage,

Mr. Taft's Letter,

The president's letter follows: "Taking the census involves the appointment of three hundred supervisors who, in turn, appoint many times that number of enumerators. The supervisors are given complete discretion in the selection of the enumerators under them. The success of the census depends upon the efficiency and strict attention to duty of the supervisors and upon the intelligence and faithful application of

Chicago, Aug. 15,-One of the most evastating floods in the history of Chiago resulted from the storm which prevailed from midnight Friday until noon






