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RED LETTER PERIOD FOR THE RAILROADS

Business That They Will Do the Present Fiscal Year Is on Record in This Country.

This Is the Prediction of Chairman Knapp, of the Interstate Commerce Commission, and Other Leading Authorities-In Fact So Great Is the Volume of Traffic Expected to Be That There Are Fears of a Serious Shortage of Rolling Stock.

Washington, Aug. 16.-A heavier business than ever has been known in a single year is locked for by Chairman Knapp, of the laterstate commerce commission, for the American railroads dur ing the present fiscal year. A seriou situation anticipated not only by Mi Eurpp, but by the other officals of the commission and by operating railroad men generally, is that there may be a shortage of cars,

The crop prospects are considered s bright that there is a likelihood the transportation companies may be taxed beyond their capacity to handle the freight that will be offered them. Already, according to the figures submitted to the commission, railroads in consideral!e number have recovered from the low business pressure of a year and a half ago and are now handling almost as much traffic as they handled in the rush months of 1907, which was the banner year in American railroading.

Have Learned a Good Lesson,

In the view of Chairman Knapp, the carriers are now in better position to carry the freight offered than they were in 1907, and he said today that he expected that that year's record would be broken this year.

"The railroads learned a good lesson in 1307" said Mr. Knapp. "They were absolutely unable to handle promptly the traffic offered them. Since that time they have added materially to their emanment, have improved their readbds and in every respect have increased their facilities. I do not doubt that this year will be a red letter period for them and

Generally it is expected, however, that a shortage of cars will result this full from the increased business of the carciers, and some embarrassment by shippers may be looked for as a consequence

The Rock Island railroad, with in a day or two, will file a bill asking for a preliminary injunction to restrain the commission from enforcing its order, which reduces the through rates from points cast of the Illinois-Indiana line to Des Moines, Ia. The commission's order takes effect Sept. I and or ders reductions ranging from five to six cents a hundred pounds on first-class riaffic down to corresponding amounts on the lower classes. It is alleged in the bill that the rates prescribed by the commission are unfair, because they dis eriminate in favor of Des Moines against other cities in the state,

At Chicago the receipts of grain last veek were greater by over 2,000,000 oushels than in the same week last year, with a gain of more than 500,000 bushls in wheat and about 400,000 in corn. The crop news was for the most part highly encouraging. Nebraska, however, eported an absence of rain which was aving adverse affect on corn. DOVE OF PEACE RETURNS.

Fear of War Between Peru and Bolivia Is Rapidly Disappearing.

Washington, Aug. 16.-Mr. Dawson the American minister to Chile, has re ported his arrival at Santiago. In his telegram Mr. Dawson says that while enroute to his post he observed that public apprehension of war between Peru and Bolivia is rapidly disappearing in southern Peru and northern Chile.




