With Most of the Passengers of the Ill-Fated Craft Asleep at the Time, the Argentine Excursion Steamer Colombia Is Crashed Into by a North German Lloyd Liner and Is Sent to the Bottom, Carrying With Her Some Two Hundred Persons,

Montevideo, Aug. 24.-In a driving ainstorm this morning, the Argentine Neursion steamer Colombia and the North German Lloyd steamer Schlesien collided at the entrance to Montevideo The Colombia's bow was rushed, and she sank almost immeliately. Between one hundred and fifty, and two hundred persons were killed or browned. The Colombia carried about two hundred passengers and a crew of orty-eight men.

Most of the passengers were asleep at he time of the collission, and a panie ollowed the crash. Almost immediately mall boats put out to the sinking tentaer, but the work of rescue was end-red very difficult by the ligh sea. About seventy persons were brought ashore. Most of the dead were women and children. The majority of the survivers are men.




