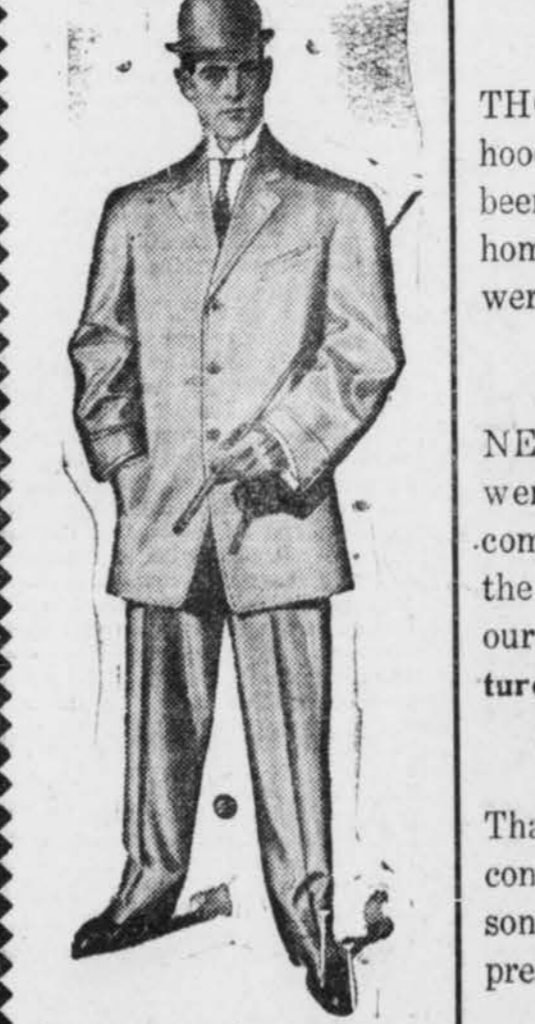

PROVISION SELLERS WERE THE VICTORS

OUTBATTED CLOTHIERS AND DRY GOODS MEN, WINNING, YESTERDAY'S GAME, 19 TO 11.

ATTENDANCE WAS NOT LARGE

Threatening Weather Kept Many Away, but Visiting Nurse Association Will Realize About \$50.

Yesterday afternoon's ball game between the grocers and butchers on one side, and the clothiers and dry goods men on the other, proved to be one of the most spectacular comedies witnessed in this city in many a day, and caused many of the old timers to recall the good old days when Haysseeds Crossroads defeated Corapot Corners by a score of 61 to 59.

The grocers and butchers proved to be the better sluggers and also to be in the better condition and won the game by the score of 19 to 11. Both sides might have made a dozen or more runs had the players not gotten exhausted running around the bases.

Due to the threatening weather and the light shower which fell about an hour before the game, the attendance was not as large as had been hoped, and but 148 adults' tickets and twenty-five children's tickets were taken in at the gate, which would indicate that about \$80 will be turned over to the Visiting Nurse association.

The game ceased to have interest as far as the outcome was concerned after the third inning, when the grocers and butchers ran in five runs, giving them a lead which was not endangered thereafter. But it must not be supposed from this that the crowd found nothing to interest them during the remaining six innings. In fact, it was toward the end that enthusiasm was at its height, and in no previous game this season have the individual players received so much advice and encouragement from the on-lookers.

Many Pitchers Used.

The game started with Sam Rose in the box for the clothiers and dry goods men, and E. J. Miller pitching for the grocers and butchers. Rose was found to have a peculiar, slow ball, with a vertical instead of a lateral curve, which proved puzzling at first, but later the opposing batters got to him freely and he retired in favor of Jack Bennett, who tired in one inning and was succeeded by Fab Dushane. Dushane's delivery proved to be one of the features of the game, but as he was somewhat wild, he too retired in favor of Phil Rose, who finished the game, his pea green suit fairly hypnotizing the dispensers of cut-abats.

Miller, who pitched for the grocers and butchers, threw a swift ball, which kept his opponents guessing whether they were going to hit it or whether it was going to hit them. In the sixth inning

he retired in favor of Nault, who pitched two innings. In response to the demands of the crowd, Will Salter pitched the last inning. Salter was really the hero of the game, making a beautiful one-handed catch of a fly back of third base and catching a runner on the bag on the same play, thus executing a double play unassisted. He made several other good stops and slammed out two clean hits.

Other players who received enthusiastic applause from the crowd were Fred Crawford, whose fielding and batting was unique if not especially effective, and Fred Anderson, who worked hard for victory all the way.

During the nine innings the grocers and butchers made thirteen hits and the clothiers and dry goods men, seven. The errors on both sides were so numerous that the score keeper was unable to count them. The score by innings was as follows:

LECTURED ON TEMPERANCE.

Mrs. Emor Calkins Declares Local Option Is a Success.

Mrs. Emor Calkins, state president of the W. C. T. U., gave a convincing and logical address at the Methodist church last evening, taking as her subject the temperance question, which she discussed from a business and ethical standpoint, with especial reference to the local option election, which it is hoped by the temperance workers can be held in this county next spring. She took as her text the famous saying of ex-President Roosevelt, "All I ask is a square deal for every man."

"The saloon business is bad and the saloonkeeper himself admits it is bad," said Mrs. Calkins. "Throughout the state you will find the large majority of the liquor men willing to get out of the business, provided they could find another business equally lucrative. Is it giving the public a square deal to foster a business which is universally recognized as intrinsically bad?"

"The license system has proved a failure as a solution of the temperance question, as an orderly saloon, conducted strictly within the law, cannot thrive. This was proven by the failure of Bishop Potter's saloon in the subway in New York, which failed in less than a year, it being found that the disorderly element and the partly drunk customers, were the sources of profit in the business."

"The right of personal liberty, which is argued by the liquor forces, is not mentioned in the constitution of the United States, though every citizen is guaranteed religious and civil liberty. Personal liberty is subject to the general good."

"The argument that the abolition of saloons raises taxes and ruins business is not borne out by the facts. In Kalamazoo county, it has been proven that it cost more to protect society from the product of the saloons than was realized from the license money. In the city of Battle Creek, which is the driest city in the state, the indebtedness in arrears has been reduced over \$10,000 since May 1, when the saloons went out of business, and there is no indication that it will be necessary to raise the tax rate. One groceryman told me that he had voted to retain the saloons, but that he now realized his mistake, as his profits had increased \$500 in the two months following their banishment from the city. You will find the residents of that city well satisfied with the results of local option, and the same is true of every other place where it has been given a fair chance." Mrs. Calkins will speak in Ishpening tonight.

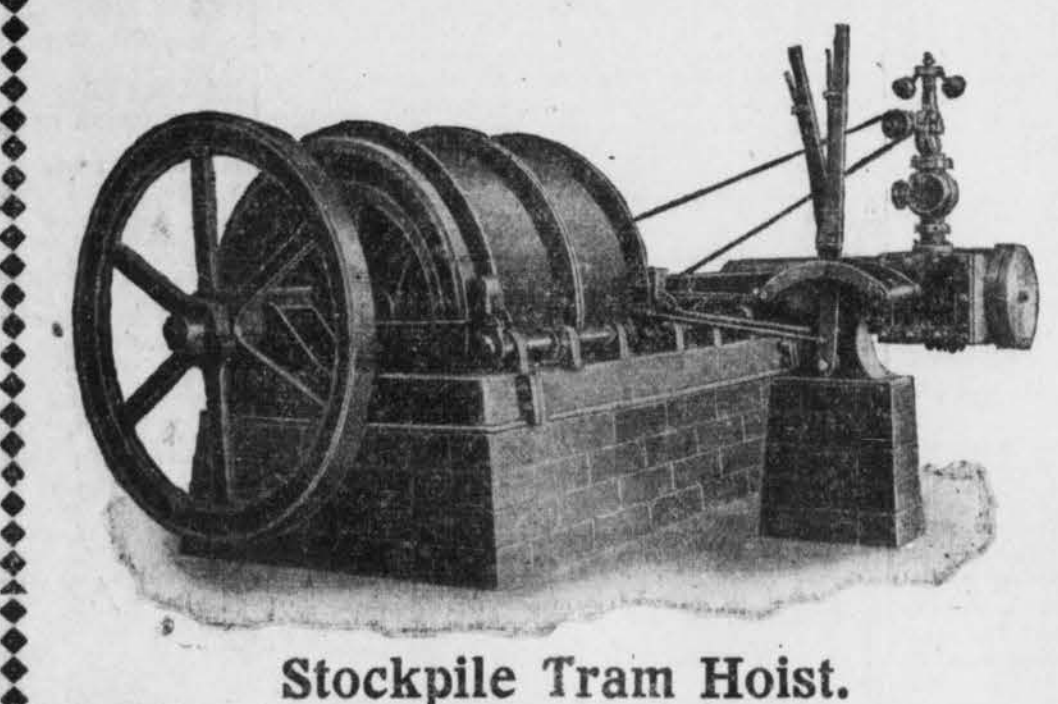
