Dr. Cook Describes His Journey.

Paris, Thursday, Sept. 2.—The Paris edition of the New York Herald this morning publishes a signed statement from Dr. Frederick A. Cook, dated "Hansegede, Lerwick, Wednesday," on his experience in the Arctic regions.

"After a prolonged fight with famine and frost," says Dr. Cook, "we have at last succeeded in reaching the North pole. A new highway, with an interesting strip of animated nature, has been explored and big game hannts have been located which will delight sportsmen and extend the Eskimo horizon. The land has been discovered on which rests the earth's northernmost rocks. A triangle of thirty thousand square miles has been cut out of the terrestial un-




