TO STOP PULP EXPORTS.

Province of Quebec Will Prohibit Them from Crown Lands.

It is reported from Washington that the Province of Quebec has definitely decided to prohibit the exportation of pulp wood out from crown lands. This will probably make a considerable difference in the demand for pulp in Michigan and Wisconsin.

In September, 1909, the premier of the province made a promise that the stumpage rate of sixty cents per cord on wood cut from crown lands would be raised for ten years. It is intended to carry out that pledge and no increase in stumpage charges will be made until September, next year. The Canada paper makers are urging the province authorities to stop the exportation of pulp wood cut from crown lands, but the American owners of rights to cut timber on more than 12,000 square miles of those lands, represent that the pledge of that privilege is a right of importation for ten years and that no prohibition should be made until the lapse of that period.

The Canadian paper and pulp interests retort that the pledge specifically related to stumpage taxes, not to exportation, and that the extension of that privilege to American owners for another year will retard Canadian plans and discriminate against Canadian manufacturers who now suffer because of the retaliatory clauses of the United States tariff on print paper.

The provincial authorities are balancing the question whether they should prohibit the exportation of pulp wood on Jan. 1, 1910, or Sept. 1, 1910. They calculate that their new policy will add

RICH ORE FOUND ON CUYUNA RANGE

CORPORATION OF WHICH FORMER NEGAUNEE MAN IS SUPERINTENDENT HAS LOCATED BODY OF ORE IN THAT DISTRICT.

It is reported from the Cuyuna range, Minnesota, that the Rogers-Brown Ore company, whose properties in that district are being operated under the supervision of Henry Kruse, formerly of Negaunee, has found a body of exceptionally fine Bessemer ore on Section 12, adjoining the town-site of Crosby, The Rogers-Brown Ore company are among the original explorers in the district and are now doing a larger amount of both exploratory and development work than any other concern interested there.
