Seattle, Wash., Sept. 20 .- L. R. Glavis, ate chief of the field division of the land office, has written President Taft

the following letter:
"Sir: I have laid before you all the ssential facts in my possession regarding the conduct of certain cases by the interior department concerning the coal lands of Alaska. As chief of the field livision directly concerned and because of the tremendous values involved, I felt my personal responsibility most keenly. The evidence indicated that a great syndicate was trying to secure a monopoly of this coal in direct violation of the law. Ultimately I felt myself obliged to appeal to you over the heads of my superiors, in order to bring about the enforcement of the law, which, in a measure, would conserve these coal lands to the people. I deemed it my duty to submit the facts to you, and I

cannot regret my action. "Since there may be now even great-er danger that the title to these coal ands will be fraudulently secured by the syndicate, it is no less my duty to my country to make public the facts in my possession and concerning which I firmly believe you have been misled. This I shall do in the near future, with full sense of the seriousness of my action and with deep and abiding respect for your great office."

Peary has taken a hifalutin position with which the country, as a whole, has little patience. There now exists as much confidence in Cook as in Peary. It is fit and proper that Cook should produce his records, but it is fully as fit and proper that Peary should do the same thing. The country is not playing either of them as a favorite, but wants to be shown by both.

The man who is elected president by a great party is not only president of the country, but he is, perforce, the leader of his party. President Taft is today the real and recognized leader of the Republican organization. And a good leader must maintain discipline. 



FILING DAY IS FIRST OF OCTOBER

LOCAL OPTION PETITIONS MUST BE PRESENTED TO COUNTY CLERK ON THAT DATE-INTEREST-ING QUESTIONS HAVE ARISEN.

An interesting question in regard he local option petitions is by what means, if any, a person who has signed them and desires to have his name withdrawn can bring this about. It was believed by opponents of the movement that a counter petition asking the county clerk, with whom the petitions must be filed prior to presentation to the board of supervisors, to erase the names of the signers from the local option petitions would suffice, but the pinion is given by attorneys that this procedure would not be legal. The only way by which a signer of these peti tions can secure the withdrawal of his name is, it appears, by going to the person in possession of the petition to which his name is signed and re-questing that it be taken off, and this must be done before the petition is file with the county clerk, for once the peti tions are filed no signatures can, unde any circumstances, be removed. In the possession of the list to remove a sig nature on request, it is said that it would be within the power of the supervisor to withdraw the name, on a showing o As for publicity, the only require

ment of the statute is that the peti tions shall be placed in three con spicuous places in the ward, or precine of a township, where the signatures have been obtained. The law does not require he publication of the signatures in the newspapers, but, as a rule, they are published as advertisements, and this will be done in this county, it is stated. Much Interest Shown.

Much quiet interest is being shown in he campaign to obtain sufficient signers o the local option petitions, now being carried on by the prohibition workers, It is proceeding without sensational tacties, and the public has, in fact, heard comparatively little about it. The time remaining for the work is short, as the day for filing the petitions is October 1 One report vesterday was to the effect that more than the requisite number o signatures had been obtained, but was impossible to verify it. It is stat ed, however, that the work is still so fa from complete that it is imposible to tell just what its present status is, But men who are identified with the move ment assert that the petitions will b sufficient. On the other hand, thos of its opponents who have made an ef fort to keep track of the situation say that the reports of the number of sign ers in various localities have been large y exaggerated.

Less progress has been made with the work of getting signatures here than in any other part of the county, with al lowance for comparative population, and nany more signatures have been ob than in Marquette. Difficulty has been experienced here in interesting men i irculating the petitions, and this is said to have retarded the work more than any other one thing, though it is paten that there is less sentiment in favor of the movement here than at probably any other place in the county. It i generally conceded that the reign of lav enforcement that began co-incident with Mayor Vaughan taking charge of the city government is in no small measure responsible for this condition.

The work of determining the validity of the petitions will fall on the county board, and it is expected that it will be taken up at the October meeting Prior to the assembling of the board. however, the petitions will be gone over by agents of the interests opposed to the movement, with the idea of being able to point out the signatures of all persons not legally qualified to take part in a settlement of the question of whether the county shall vote on the prohibi-

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
