### **GRAND JURY INDICTS** THE MAYBRAY GANG

Conspiring to Defraud by the Illegal Use of the Mails Is the Charge Formally Entered in U. S. Court at Council Bluffs.

nals of the Country, Are Those Who Are Accused, and by Means of Fake Sporting Events They Are Alleged to Have Swindled Scores of Victims Out of Fully Half a Million Dollars.

Council Bluffs, Sept. 23-James C daybray and eighty-four alleged assoiates were indicted by the federal grand pury here today on the charge of con-piring to defraud by the illegal use of the mails. With the exception of Maybray and three others, none those indicted are in costody, and the names of the defendants have not been made public. It is said that the list includes many persons known in criminal annals in all parts of the country, and that nearly every name is followed by one to four aliases. Each of these alleged confederates had a number which is given as one of the aliases ac credited to the defendant

Although specific amounts are not nentioned in the indictment, it is au thoritatively stated that the amount ost by the alleged victims exceed hair million doilars. There are individual osses of \$2,500 to \$10,000, the latter sum having been placed on a fake horse race according to evidence given by a Misouri banker. The list of victims in the ndictment includes men of prominence in all parts of the country, and there are set forth letters of an incriminating haracter. Victims in eighteen states and Alaska and Canada are named. As bases of operation, the allaged conspicaters used Council Bluffs, Davenport E. 




