ST. YVES MAY NEVER BE ABLE TO RUN AGAIN.

He Collapses in a Marathon Race at Montreal and It Is Found That His Heart Is Affected-Hans Helmer of Quebec Is the Winner of the Event Record-Breaking

Montreal, Oct. 3.—Henry St. Yves, the mous long distance runner, collapsed while leading in the twenty third mile of a marathon race here today. Physiians declared his heart affected and that ne probably will be unable to run again His opponent, Hans Holmer, of Quebec flushed strong, covering the marathon distance in 2:32:40, a new record if the track is found to measure correctly.

ASCENDS MORE THAN 1,600 FEET. Orville Wright, at Potsdam, Breaks All Records for High Flying.

Potsdam, Oct. 3.-Orville Wright yeserday broke his own and all other records for high flying, reaching the unprecedented height of more than 1,600 feet. He also took up Crown Prince Frederick William as a passenger but not on the high flight. After the prince had taken his seat, the machine rose twenty feet. The prince exclaimed, "Higher, higher," and finally the aviator went about sixty feet, gliding back ten minutes later. The prince and a mul-titude then watched Wright make his record-breaking flight. When he returned, Mr. Wright said: "No measurement was taken, but I estimate that I reached an altitude of 500 metres. I make the estimate from the time it took. The descent was made in five minutes, but my sensations were the same as in the lower

RIFF TRIBESMEN NOT YET CONQUERED

Madrid's Recent Celebration of the Success of the Campaign in Morocco Appears to Have Been Entirely too Premature.

Details of the Latest Fight Show That, Having Been Attacked Furiously and Suffering Heavy Casualties, the Spaniards Have Been Compelled to Fall Back-Now, It Is Announced, the Army Is to Be Reinforced by Fifteen Thousand Men.

Madrid, Oct. 3 .- Further details of he engagement of two days ago between he Spanish and Moors are that the Spaniards lost 235 men, killed and wounded. One battalion of Chausseurs had nineteen officers and eighty men vounded. When the Spaniards entered the rocky defiles they were attacked furiously and the entire expedition retired to Zenlan.

it is understood that the government, after consultation with General Marina, the commander of the Spanish forces in Morocco, has decided to continue aggressive operations against the Moors. Reinforcements to the number of 15,000 men will be sent to Africa, and a regiment of lancers already has left. Mt. Guruga will be permanently occupied and in addition the Spaniards will hold big piece of territory, with Tetuan as base, until the payment by Morocco of an indemnity of \$20,000,000. The reinforcements of 15,000 men will give General Marina an army of 85,000, together with about 100 pieces of artillery, Although thousands of Moors are said to have been killed, the enemy appears as numerous as ever, and it is evident that the Riffs, too, are steadily receiving reinforcements.





FARMERS WANT RAILROADS.

They Favor, However, Government Control of Capitalization -European Money Also Would Be Attracted—This Question Will Be Prominent Before the Next Session of Congress.

Washington, Sept. 30 .- Secretary of Agriculture Wilson is the latest to come forward in support of the idea of government control of railroad capitalization, which President Taft has advocated and which will be one of the most prom-162% inent questions before congress next 2014 winter. Secretary Wilson says he has long been convinced that the farmers of 208% the country would invest heavily in 194 railroad securities if there was some 78% form of government control of capitalization which would assure them that their investments would be safe,

This is substantial the same idea presented not long ago by Interstate Commerce Commissioner Franklin K. Lane o on his return from Europe, when he asserted that hundreds of millons of dollars of European money awaited investment in American railroads providing the government established control of capitalization. Judge E. H. Gray of the United States Steel corporation in an interview has recently pointed to the fact that European capital is eager to find investment in this country, though be made no reference to government control of capitalization.

Such utterances as these point to the fact that one of the chief arguments which will be exerted next winter to get s congress to enact legislation for the government control of railroads, as well as other corporations, will be that it will be of vast benefit to the railroads and corporations themselves to have the government placed in the attitude of seeming to stand sponsor for the satisfactory character of stocks and bonds. The complaint often heard from railroad sources is that enormous sums of money are needed to finance extensions and improvements and that it is a serious question where the money is to come from. Government control of capitalization will be urged as the answer to this

The great difficulty in getting congress to do anything with control of capitalization will arise from the fact that a controversy will be stirred up just as soon as the question is taken up as to whether control of capitaliza-175 ton should be confined to future issues of stocks and bonds, or whether it should go back of the face value of ex-387 isting issues and find out if they are watered and squeeze the water out of them if it exists. To legislate for government control of future issues would amount in effect to legalizing existing issues. It is known that Senator La 020 Follette is prepared to lead an unrelenting fight against the plan to limit the control to future issues. He will urge a physical valuation of the railroads as 29 a preliminary to control of capitalization. The interstate commerce commission has already recommended a physical valuation of the rairroad properties. It made this recommendation for two


