JOHN C. RICE DEAD.

Commercial Man Taken Ill in Negaunee. Passed Away Friday in Milwaukee.

Laverne Seass, proprietor of the Breitung House, yesterday received a letter from Zimmerman Bros., of Milwaukee, advising him that their representative, John C. Rice, died in that city on Friday. Mr. Rice was taken ill at the Breitung House a week ago last Saturday, with a severe attack of appendicitis. He suffered considerably that night and next day, but Sunday night, but would not permit the hotel people to call a physician. Finally, on Monday morning a physician was called in, and finding Rice in a bad way, expressed a desire to go to Milwaukee to operate on him, and he was sent away that night.

One of his sons is a physician, practicing in Wisconsin. He is expected to arrive here this morning. The funeral will most likely be taken to Fond du Lac for interment.



BASEBALL IDEAS FOR NEXT YEAR

SOME SENTIMENT IN FAVOR OF RE-ORGANIZING LEAGUE ON SEMI-PROFESSIONAL BASIS.

AMATEUR BALL NOT PRACTICAL

Fan Advises Rules That Can Be Strictly Enforced, Different Division of Gate Receipts, and Makes Other Suggestions.

Though the local baseball season of 1909 has just been closed it is none too early to plan for next year.

One thing seems certain: while the idea of strictly amateur baseball may be all right in theory, it cannot be carried out in practice, and it is doubtful whether the fans would be satisfied with home talent ball, which would necessarily be very so-called class.

Legalize Semi-Professional Ball.

"Next year we should start out with the idea of semi-professional ball," declares a man who is close to local baseball affairs.

"This year the attendance at Union Park has been considerably larger than at Marquette, and the Marquette attendance has been much greater than that at Munising.

There should be some limitation to the salary that may be paid players, or some other method devised to prevent the leaguers from monopolizing the history of professional ball in the upper peninsula for this very reason.

Broaden Out Local Organization.

"In Marquette, it seems to me that the local organization should be broadened out. By forming a baseball association, with ten or a dozen directors, the opportunity for getting support at the beginning of the year would be magnified, and the baseball interest ought to become more general.

"These are only a few of the suggestions that might be offered the league managers to ponder over from now until the meeting next spring.

J. A. MALHOIT NOW ON LIBRARY BOARD
