## WOULD YIELD MANY MILLIONS.

Chicago Tax League Asks the Assess ment of Big Stock Holdings.

Chicago, Oct. 14.-An amended petition for a mandamus compelling the taxation of the stock owned by Chicago milionaires whose holdings are valued by the petitioner at \$236,625,000 was filed today in circuit court by the Tax Reform league. It asks that the millionaires stockholdings be assessed for elever years past and avers that if these taxes and the penalties are collected \$80,000,000 will come to the county treasury. Ogden Armour heads the list, with stocks and bonds valued at \$37,750,000; Edward Morris is next, with \$35,500,000 and Richard W. Sears third, with \$22, 000,000. Most of the individuals men tioned in the petition are identified with the packing industries. Swift & Co. with \$50,000,000 of stocks and bonds also is listed. The board of review has filed an answer, averring that it has no power to assess on the holdings listed.

# FINNISH AUTONOMY GETS DEATH BLOW

Appointment of New Members of the Senate Puts the Machinery of State in the Hands of the Russian Governor General,

Legislators Who Refused to Bow to the Will of the Ruler Are Replaced, It Is Ordered That \$4,-000,000 Be Paid Into the Imperial Treasury as a Military Contribution, and That the People Be Held in Check the Garrison Is Reinforced,

Helsingfors, Oct. 14.-An imperial manfesto is published ordering a military ontribution of \$4,000,000, to be taken from the Finnish treasury and turned over to Russia. The Finns have not decided upon any definite line of resistance, and disorders are improbable. Rus-

#### New Senators Appointed.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 14.-Admirals Weirinus and Sillman and Colonel Kraase, master of ceremonies, have been appointed to the Finnish senate by the governor general of Finland, according to advices from Helsingfors. They relace senators who, in September, refused reappointments because the Russian cabinet insisted that the Finnish senate contribute \$4,000,000 to the de-

fense of the empire. The appointment of the officers named is regarded as almost fatal to Finnish autonomy, as it places the machinery of state in the hands of the Russian gov ernor general and a senate denationalized by Finns who have spent their lives in the service of Russia. It is understood that Russia will reannex that part of Viborg province which was joined to Fin-



Bottled milk largely is replacing the old fashioned manner of deivery, but there are many peddlers who still carry their goods in cans and ladb out the quarts or pints to their cus-

"The first customer receives her milk frem a clean ladle, but she alone is thus fortunate. There is no method of sterilizing the dipper which is hung over the edge of the can in the wagon and covered as it is by a thin coating of milk, the flying dust stirred up by the wagon wneels settles thereon. Dipped again into the milk the dust and of course the disease germs if there are any, are washed off and the entire quantity is contaminated. So in this way dust again gets in its deadly work.
