FOOTBALL TODAY.

Two Ishpeming Teams Will Try Conclusions With Marquette Elevens.

BOWLING SEASON WILL BE LIVELY

BANK STREET ALLEYS WILL OPEN TODAY AND THE FIRST TEAM CONTEST IS SCHEDULED FOR NEXT MONDAY EVENING.

The Bank street bowling alleys and billiard and pool hall, which have been closed since last spring, will reopen today for the fall and winter season. Manager John Gray has been busy for some time past repairing the alleys and tables and the interior has been thoroughly renovated.

The first team bowling contest of the season will take place Monday evening, when the Cripples and Johnson's Colts will bowl for an oyster supper. These teams bowled a series of three matches last winter, the Cripples winning by a total of 108 pins.

The management had such excellent success with the team contests last season that an early series will be arranged for. Several of the men who participated last winter will organize teams again and it is expected that there will be more bowling this winter than there was last, though last season was the second best that the alleys have ever had.

A league, to be composed of eight teams, two from the Bank street alleys, two from the Oliver office, two from the Cleveland-Cliffs office, and two from the Young Men's Christian association, has been proposed. If this league is perfected the series will doubtless be interesting. Some of the very best bowlers in the city are employed in the Oliver and Cleveland-Cliffs offices and a number of the members of the Y. M. C. A. are also excellent bowlers. For the Bank street teams Manager Gray would select the very best bowlers in the city, outside of those in the employ of either of the two companies.

The first bowling contest of the season took place Thursday evening at the Cleveland-Cliffs alleys between the Bank street alley team and five men from the Cleveland-Cliffs office. The former won by eighty-two pins, the scores being as follows:

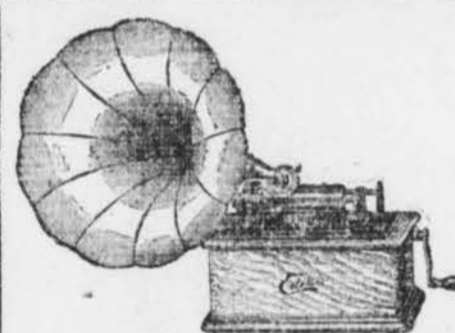

DISCHARGED WORKMEN HAVE BEEN PAID OFF

A NUMBER OF THE MEN WHO TRIED TO FORCE THE COMPANIES TO GRANT SATURDAY HALF HOLIDAY ARE NOW LEAVING THE RANGE

Practically all of the men who lost their jobs at the Regent mines because of quitting last Saturday noon, without the consent or knowledge of their bosses, have been paid off. Some of them have left the city, and others are preparing to depart. Several of the men have secured places at the American mine. A number have gone West.

Most of the workmen discharged now realize that they made a mistake. They admit that they were ill-advised and they say that the move in which they took part originated among the socialists. A socialist paper, published in the copper country, some time ago contained an article advising the men to demand a half holiday, it being asserted that they were entitled to it under the law.

A workman discussing the question yesterday, said he thought most of the men now feel that the companies will not grant the concession asked for. He said that some of the men obtained legal advice last Saturday morning soon after the circular was issued, and were advised to remain at work. One party of miners who lost their jobs at the Regent feel that they have a grievance because they were paid off at a company account rate, instead of on a basis of what they had earned in previous months on their contracts. Attorneys have advised them that they had no claim whatever against the company, as by quitting without giving due notice they had violated their contracts.

The companies discharged a few men who quit in Ishpeming Saturday. Twenty-eight hands left at the Cliffs Shaft mine and smaller numbers at some of the other properties, but the total number who lost their jobs in that city perhaps does not exceed seventy-five. Most of the men discharged here are Italians.

The Regent mines are still working on a single shift and it is likely that a sufficient number of new hands to organize a night crew can be secured on short notice. The men at all of the properties have been given to understand that in the event any of them quit work today men in an effort to force the half holiday, they will also be discharged.

IMPROVEMENTS AT CROSSING.

The steel plate that have been placed over the openings between the curb crosswalks and sidewalks built this summer on the principal streets of Negaunee, will prove a big labor saver each spring. At practically all of the principal crossings the pipes that were formerly used to carry away the water have been removed. The new plan was introduced by Al Withman, superintendent of the board of public works, who has charge of the street work. The plates are removable, and the workmen will have no trouble cutting out the ice in the spring.

INDOOR LEAGUE STARTED.

Teams Representing Fraternal Societies Will Soon Open Series.

John Keyes, the traveling man who organized a fraternal indoor baseball league at Hancock last season, was in the city yesterday. He advises that a fraternal indoor league be organized in Negaunee and Ishpeming. He says that the games will arouse interest in the societies as well as furnish good sport. The Hancock league has been reorganized with seven teams, representing the Houghton Light Infantry, the Ancient Order of Hibernians, Knights of Columbus, Catholic Order of Foresters, Elks, Eagles and Naval Reserves.

Each team pays an entrance fee of \$15, which will be returned at the end of the season, provided the team plays out the series. This year the net receipts are to be divided among the teams according to their standing at the close of the season.

Mr. Keyes is also enthusiastic over the organization of an athletic association, formed last Sunday by the members of the Hibernian society of Hancock. Fifty-four of the young men joined the association and it is expected that the membership will be increased to at least 100 within two or three weeks. The society some time ago paid \$15,000 for a block on the Main street. The upper portion of the building is to be remodeled at a cost of some \$3,000 to provide a hall and club rooms. The first floor is used for store purposes and has been leased for a term of five years. The Hancock division has over 400 members and it is the third largest division in Michigan.

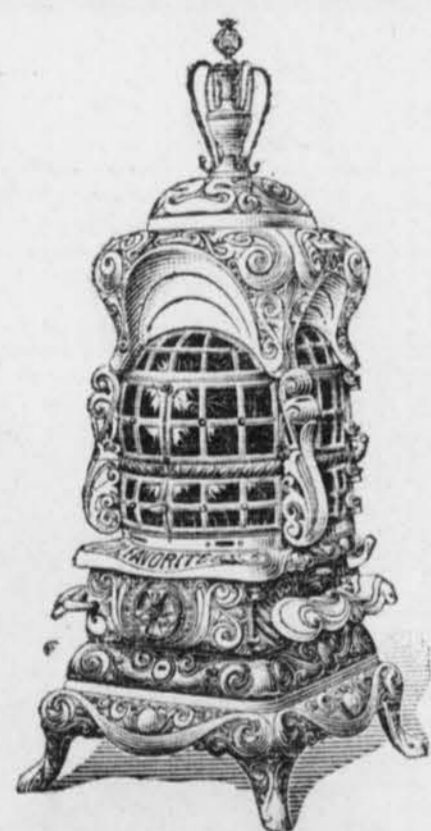
