Future pro jects for irrigation and for the improvement of the waterways will not be for the purpose of distributing 'pork.' een received here that Prince Ito, the amous Japanese statesman, has been assassinated by a Korean at Harbin. Prince Hirobumi Ito was perhaps the greatest statesman of new Japan. The been chiefly associated in the minds of Occidentals was the framing of the ira perial constitution by virtue of which apan took her place for the first time n the rank of modern civilized states The fateful news was received in Tokio at 3 o'clock this (Tuesday) after roon. The despatch contained the brief announcement that Prince Ito had been assassinated. The news has cause great grief and consternation. As the emperor's trusted adviser and the medon a constitutional basis, he must be egarded as one of the positive factors which have helped to win for Japan her present standing among the nations, He was sixty-eight years old. It was in 1863 that Ito made his celebrated pilgrimage to England at a time when it was against the law of his country to go abroad and the penalty for infringe-ment was death. Nevertheless, inspired by patriotic feeling and a desire to learn the secret of Occidental supremacy he undertook the trip, which proved beneficial to his country later on.

Prince Ito, who was president of the privy council of Japan, left Tokio Oct. 16 for a tour of Manchuria. He was to have arrived at Harbin today, where he was to meet M. Prince Ito visited the United States n 1870 as a commissioner to investigate the financial and banking systems. On his return to Japan he was appointed vic minister of public works. In 1880 he negotiated with Li Hung Chang on the Korean question, and concluded the treaty which formed the basis of Japan's ustification for her war with China in 1894. Later he negotiated a treaty of peace with China and at the close of he war was made a marquis. After the Russo-Japanese war he was resident general in Korea, in which capacity he became an object of hatred of the Koreans.



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


