RAILROAD TO SPEND A GREAT MANY MILLIONS.

New York Central Orders \$25. 000,000 Worth of Rolling Stock and Will Use \$60,000,000 More in Improving Its Roadbed, All of Which Is in Addition to Costly Terminal Work.

New York, Oct. 27.—President Brown. f the New York Central, announced to lay that the company had contracted in he last few days for \$25,000,000 worth of new locomotives and passenger and reight cars, and that it intends to spend \$60,000,000 more in reducing grades, raightening curves and laying new ails, exclusive of the \$50,000,000 terminimprovements in New York city. "These expenditures," he said, "are absolutely necessary to meet the de-mands of business. The traffic records of September and October have exceeded anything in the company's history."

Illinois Worsted in Its Fight to Oust the Economy Light & Power Company, Wisconsin Will Now Get After the Corporation.

Holding in Part That Under the Ordinance of July Thirteen, 1787, All Navigable Waters Leading Into the Mississippi River Are "Common Highways and Forever Free," It Will Carry the Case to the United States Supreme Court.

Chicago, Oct. 27.-The decision of the preme court of Illinois, announced sterday, granting property and power ights on the Desplaines river to the conomy Light & Power company will e fought by the state of Wisconsin, cearing to Attorney Edward T. Cahill, epresenting Wisconsin.

Wisconsin's claim is that the state of Illinois and the trustees of the Illinois-Michigan canal cannot convey title to the land claimed by the power company, because it is in part bed and bars of the Desplaines river, which originates Wiscensin

The supreme court of Illinois had previously declined to entertain Wisconounsel for Wisconsin now proposes to take the case to the supreme court of the United States, maintaining that IIlinois has attempted to convey public lands, part of the federal domain, to a private corporation for pecuniary gain.
