ISHPEMING MAN KILLED BY TRAIN

WILL WRESTLE HERE.
 Copper Country Finnish Athlete Has Match in Ishpeming.

MUTILATED REMAINS OF CHARLES JOHNSON FOUND SATURDAY EVENING IN NEGAUNEE AFTER THEY HAD BEEN DRAGGED A DISTANCE OF THREE MILES.

Shortly after 7 o'clock Saturday evening, a couple of boys who were walking along the Chicago & Northwestern track, near the Cyr street crossing, in Negaunee, came across the mangled body of a man who had been killed by the train. They reported the matter to Marshal Rough, who immediately made arrangements to have the remains taken to Undertaker Dave's morgue. The body was so badly mutilated that identification at the time was impossible. It was determined yesterday afternoon, following an investigation by Coroner William Prin, that Charles Johnson of Ishpeming was the victim. The unfortunate man was very hard of hearing and it is assumed that while walking along the railway track in the eastern end of the Ishpeming yard, he was run down by one of the trains that left the city late in the afternoon or early in the evening. It is thought that it was the southbound passenger train that killed him, though neither the engineer or fireman saw anyone on the track after pulling out of the local station.

Mr. Prin started out yesterday morning at daybreak to walk to Negaunee over the railway track in the hope of finding some evidence that would lead to the identification of the victim. At a point between the gas house and the old New York store building he found blood traces, and a little further on he came across part of the man's skull, also some brain matter. He then found the overcoat Johnson had worn, which was badly torn. Other fragments of the body, also parts of the man's clothing, were found between the New York crossing and the Union park. Opposite the park a foot and part of the leg were found. Mr. Prin expressed the belief that the body was dragged beneath the locomotive the greater part of the distance between the two cities.

The overcoat the man wore is really what aided the coroner more than anything else to establish Johnson's identity. It was one that Emil Carlson had given him a few days ago. Enough of the face was left to show that the victim had a sandy mustache, also that his beard was sandy and that it was of about a week's growth. The coroner found a few men here who saw Johnson Saturday and they reported that his beard was stubby.

Johnson batched in a room in the rear of the Johnson building on Cleveland avenue for some time, but left there a week or more ago and had since been batching at the New York location in the vicinity of where he met his death. Among the articles the coroner found near the track at the point where the train struck Johnson were several pieces of fresh pork that he had purchased in one of the meat markets.

The deceased was between forty and forty-five years of age and had never been married. He was very well known about town, and particularly on Cleveland avenue, where he spent most of his time when not working. He did odd jobs about the city and had no regular occupation.

The inquest will be conducted some day this week and the remains will probably be buried in the cemetery here. So far as could be learned yesterday Johnson had no relatives in this city.
