FATAL COLLISION ON TROLLEY LINE. One Car Crashes Into Another One at Osceola Switch.

Joseph Brady Is Killed and Four Men Are Injured, All Five of Them Hancock Elks on Their Way to Attend Memorial Services at Calumet.

Joseph Brady was killed and Rev. J. E. Curzon, Walter Bloomfield, John Harris and Alex Stevenson were injured in a rear-end collision of Houghton County Traction company cars at Osceola at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

On account of the accident, the memorial services were not held. These had been arranged to take place in the Hancock Elks' temple, following the beautiful custom of holding a lodge of sorrow once a year in memory of deceased members of the order.

FARMERS WILL ORGANIZE. J. O. Brunson Prime Mover in a Co-Operative Association.

The preliminary steps in an organization of the farmers of Houghton county are about completed, according to Joseph F. Brunson, the Houghton farmer and dairyman, who is the prime mover in the matter.

It is not the intention to affiliate with the Grange or the American Society of Equity, but to organize an independent society. The underlying idea in the organization is to co-operate.

The merchants, buying in larger quantities and being compelled by the nature of their business to make a profit on everything they sell, cannot be blamed for being unwilling to pay farmers the same prices at which they have been peddling potatoes.

When the fact that the market price of potatoes is about fifty-three cents per bushel is taken into consideration, and the fact that some merchants secured their supplies from Houghton county farmers at thirty-eight cents to fifty cents per bushel, that something is wrong can readily be seen.

There are considerations other than the regulation of prices which enter into the proposed organization, but these considerations will not be discussed until the meeting of farmers is held.

BETTER FOOD PRODUCTS.

Inspector Talks to Dealers About Renovated Butter and Inspects Bakery.

Joseph Snitzer, the district state food inspector, has begun a campaign against the manufacturers and dealers in renovated butter. Mr. Snitzer has found that renovated butter is not being manufactured in accordance with the law, and plans prosecutions. Renovated butter and butterine are having an increasing sale.

Mr. Snitzer Saturday talked with some of the dealers handling renovated butter. He recently notified the merchants that he intended to give the matter a thorough investigation, and they are satisfied from the way Mr. Snitzer is going at his work that he means business. They believe that his prodding will result in their securing a better grade of butter than some of the manufacturers have been sending them.

Mr. Snitzer is also inspecting the bakeries and meat markets in his district. Saturday he paid the Walker bakery, in the Pascoe block, corner Main and Pearl streets, his first official visit, dropping in unexpectedly. He looked the place over thoroughly from the front of the sales room to the oven and flour warehouse in the rear, and he complimented Mr. Walker highly, stating that the general conditions were not exceeded by any bakery in his district.

The Walker bakery was established about a year ago. R. F. Walker, the proprietor, and his brother, who aids him with the baking, learned the business under their father, Frank Walker, who conducted a business in Negaunee for a number of years. The business of the Ishpeming concern has had a good growth, due to the excellent quality of the goods turned out.
