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
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



CHICAGO GRAIN MARKETS.

Chicago, Dec. 7.-The government re port, which indicated the second largest crop of winter wheat on record for the United States in point of acreage, caused a severe slump in prices here today, fol-lowing a sharp bulge due to confirmation of the reports of injury by frost to the Argentine crop. At the close the prices were weak, ½ to ¼ lower. Decided strength marked the trading during the first half of the session, commission houses and shorts being active bidders. The prices advanced about one cent above previous close. The demand was chiefly for the distant futures. When the crop report was issued, there was a complete reversal of sentiment, many early buyers selling freely. According to the official statistics the acreage seed ed to winter wheat is 33,483,000, an increase of 7.9 per cent compared with the final estimate on last year's crop and the second largest on record. Much long wheat came out in the final hour, and the prices declined more than one cent. The close was near the bottom figures of the day. They will run as long as cotton is to be obtained, economizing on their supply as much as possible and hoping that another crop will relieve their famine but they will run. The world is too prosperous and clothes will be worn, even though an inappreciable increase in price is made in the first hand product.
