Without honesty in business and decency in private life no man can succeed, and the blighted career of Broker Hopkins is only one of many examples that go to prove

Hopkins is not a proper object of symput it under the ban of law.

He is said to have built up a trade in tocks amounting to \$2,000,000 monthly. He was, as a matter of fact, trading on the credulity and gullibility of the publie, his operations in stocks having no capital behind them, and no knowledge of them, took their money and spent it as his expensive tastes inclined him.

Then he branched out on a colossal merger" scheme, having in view a conolidation of zinc properties, out of which he hoped to realize millions. It was dishonest in inception and he intended using it to dupe the public on a gigantic scale. Its collapse brought his financial house of cards tumbling about his ears, and he oes to a penitentiary instead of becom ing the owner of a big pile of tainted soney. The only criticism to be justly passed on the sentence given him is that t isn't severe enough. He got four years and three months, whereas if he were given what he deserved he would spend the balance of his life in prison.

There are, it is to be presumed, honest brokers. But the business they are in is demoralizing to those who carry it on and detrimental to the public. Legislation to regulate and keep it within safe limits is urgently needed and will be provided some day in the near future. 
