For a week or more, he said, the thermometer had gone below zero in Chicago every night, and in the daytime it was very cold with a piercing wind. He declared the weather in Marquette to be ideal for this time of the year.

Business is Booming—Theodore Schneider, superintendent of the lumbering and manufacturing operations at Big Bay, was in Marquette last night, and emphatically denied the report that business was slack at the Brunswick-Balke-Collender company's plant and that men were being laid off. On the contrary, he stated that business was rushing and that the mill and woods crews were working full time with as many men as could be profitably handled with their present equipment.

W. O. W. Initiation—Charter Oak camp, Woodmen of the World, will initiate a large class this evening at Legion Hall. District Deputy H. E. Laundry of Port Huron, who has been here the last month in the interest of the order, has met with good success in his efforts to increase the membership of the Marquette camp, the result of which is a large class to be initiated this evening. After the introduction of the candidates for membership, election of officers will be held and there will be a smoker. All visiting members of the order will be welcome.

Bring Donations to Hall—The Salvation army has been unable to rent the store room next to Stafford's drug store, and expects to have a place in which to assemble the donations and make up the baskets for the poor of the city, and those intending to make any such donations are asked to bring them to the Salvation Army Hall. Quite a little more money is needed to carry out the army's plan to give every poor family in the city a merry Christmas, but at the rate donations are coming in Captain Burr hopes to have the full amount by Friday evening.

Porter to Be Tried Here—R. W. Blackwell, the Pullman sleeping car porter who is accused with having stolen a gold case, studded with diamonds, the property of Mrs. E. N. Breitung, from a sleeping car in Marquette and is now under arrest in Chicago, will be brought here for trial about Dec. 29. Extradition papers have been made out and Marshal Manning will leave for Chicago to get the prisoner within a few days. The case was left between the mattresses in the drawing room of the sleeper when Mrs. Breitung left the car in Marquette. Blackwell is said to have shown the case to a fellow porter the same day.

**MAY BE PERPETUAL MOTION.**

Tennessee Claims His Machine Is Solution of Problem.

**SAYS IT HAS BEEN TESTED.**

Inventor, Who Is a Former Conductor, Avers It Ran for Three Days and Then He Stopped It.

Bristol, Tenn., Dec. 22.—Is the ancient problem of perpetual motion to be the next wonder of the scientific world? The town of Johnson City, Tenn., believes that it will, and just now the inhabitants of that town are in a state of wild excitement over what they believe to be the actual solution of the problem, in favor of the practicability of self-motion, notwithstanding that science has said time and again that the problem was but a chimera.

The accomplishment of this wonder, as related by representative business and professional men of Johnson City, was left after scientists had exhausted themselves in a study of the subject, to A. T. Markwood, a veteran conductor, who gave up his position with the Southern railroad to devote his energies to a solution of his problem, which he had come to believe absolutely practicable.

As a result of his efforts he has, it is said, by the aid of an expert machinist, put his ideas into the form of a big machine, which is said to be as large as an ordinary box car and which is possessed of most peculiar and unusual ideas of mechanism. It is a combination of steel and brass and other metals.

**Backed by Business Men.**

When it seemed that Markwood was nearing the completion of his work several thousand dollars' worth of stock in a company to back the new invention were sold at par, but it is now stated that a test of the machine has given the stock such a boost that \$100 worth of it could not be bought for twelve times that amount. Men of business and professional prominence in Johnson City have sought eagerly to purchase stock at almost any price, apparently, being confident that the new invention will be all that is claimed for it by the inventor. They have reached the point of anticipating that power for all purposes will have been revolutionized when this new invention is perfected by practical tests.

The principle of the new machine has been revealed to only a limited number, and about its operations the greatest possible secrecy is being maintained, guards being stationed day and night about the building where the machine was constructed and is now stationed, and nobody being admitted except a few confidential persons, including Markwood's attorney, who is also a stockholder, and A. A. Taylor, a brother of Senator Bob Taylor of Tennessee.

**To Apply for Patent.**

A model of the machine has been constructed and is to be sent to the patent office at Washington, when a patent will be applied for.

It is said that the excitement about this invention became general only when it was announced as a fact that the machine had been tested, and that the most serious difficulty was found in governing its speed, the tendency being to gain in velocity, threatening destruction of the machine by its own power.

It is now told that following certain adjustments, including the installation of a governing apparatus, the machine was tested by a run of three days, and that it showed no disposition to slacken its speed until its inventor touched the button which caused it to stop.

The machine has been placed in the hands of a stock company, with a very limited number of shareholders, and the organization is known as the Markwood Power Developing company.

The machine is by no means a toy affair, the labor on it alone representing more than a thousand dollars. It is claimed by the inventor that the power developed by this self-operating machine may readily be transmitted to any kind of machinery and may be used to operate mills, factories and all sorts of plans requiring power.

**RENTED MULE KICKS UP TROUBLE FOR GOVERNMENT.**

Owner Wants Pay for Peck Animal That Is Lost in Flood.

Washington, Dec. 22.—A mule rented by the Isthmian canal commission has caused a lot of trouble in the office of the comptroller of the treasury. The mule was hired by Robert A. Corbett, an assistant engineer, who had charge of a survey party on the Chagres river in the canal zone. Jose G. Rodriguez, the mule's owner, made a contract with Corbett whereby Jose was to get \$1 a day for not less than five days as rent for the mule.

Corbett wanted the mule for carrying purposes and he started in to use it in that way. While the survey party was crossing the Barora river, which was in flood, the mule of Jose Rodriguez became fractious and unmanageable and was swept down the stream and drowned. Jose Rodriguez demanded that the canal commission pay him \$50 for the mule. The chairman of the commission wrote to the comptroller of the treasury, who tells how other government people can spend money. In a two-page letter the comptroller explained that he could not

see why the government should pay \$50 for that mule. Rodriguez did not make a contract requiring the government to become responsible for the least, at all, he said. The question which is not answered or touched in the correspondence is, "Did Jose get anything at all, \$1, or perhaps \$2." About all he has according to the documents here, is a perfectly good contract and a whip.

**PREDICIS END OF CLOTHES.**

Mrs. Raymond Duncan's Relative Says Nakedness Means Purity of Mind and Body.

Philadelphia, Pa., Dec. 22.—"Go naked and you will be pure in mind and strong in body. Some day America will advance so far that it will be realized that clothes are a repression, and are the cause of disease and trouble. I would not be surprised to see the men and the women walking hand in hand down Chestnut street soon, wearing nothing but the consciousness of innocence that a clean mind brings."

Mrs. Raymond Duncan, the native Grecian, wife of Raymond Duncan, musician and scholar, brother of Isadora Duncan, the dancer, enunciated her principles clearly and calmly, and clinched the matter by admitting that in Greece she sometimes went minus even the light toga-like robe she wears in cold Philadelphia.

She added that she has never been sick in her life, that her husband, who also dresses lightly, has always been well, and that little Monnik Duncan, who is only four years old, does not know the meaning of the word "ill-health" in any of the four languages he speaks. None of the family eats meat or fish through the rain of yesterday they walked around Chestnut street, followed by a crowd of 200 persons or more. The sisters with which they are everywhere greeted do not annoy them.

**INFECTED WITH TUBERCULOSIS.**

**Dr. Deadman Has Exhibit of Diseased Glands from Marquette Cattle.**

In the window of Dr. Deadman's office on Beraga avenue is an exhibit of lymphatic and suprarenal glands, both showing tuberculosis in its advanced stage, which were taken from cattle owned by East Ridge street residents, that appeared "in fine condition and perfect health." The discovery of tuberculosis in an advanced stage was a great surprise to both Dr. Deadman and the owners of the animals, yet the evidence of the disease is so marked that the most casual observer could not doubt its presence. If further proof were needed, a colored plate from a government bulletin looks enough like Dr. Deadman's exhibit for the photograph to have been taken from it.

Dr. Deadman states that, in his opinion, 50 per cent of the cattle of Marquette and vicinity are affected with tuberculosis, and that the council is making a great mistake in eliminating the compulsory test from the proposed ordinance. In one of the best dairies in the northwest, recently, the state veterinarian found twenty-nine out of fifty cows that were affected, though all had been bought with a guarantee that they were free from the disease. Conditions are said to be aggravated in the upper peninsula by the fact that cordoned Wisconsin cattle, in which state there is an iron-clad tuberculosis law, are run over into Michigan and disposed of.

Accompanying the exhibit in Dr. Deadman's window is the following on a placard: "This is the disease that the city council refuses to prevent, the city from, by omitting the tuberculin test from the proposed milk ordinance. These tubercular glands were taken from cattle owned by Marquette residents, and from animals supposed to be in the best of health."

**UNNECESSARY ILLS.**

Habit in our attitude toward our bodies, toward health and ill health, has established such abnormal conditions of living that a mental plow and harrow must be driven under, through and over these thought habits of civilized mankind today before simple, normal conditions can be established. The fear habit in regarding disease has become so entirely an expected and accepted part of human experience that man hesitates to abandon it. He has become so accustomed to burden-bearing that, like "The Man With the Hoe," he does not aspire to be free from it. He even looks askance at one who offers relief.

The recognition of the source of ill health as, in large measure, a lack of understanding, a want of seeing clearly the truth that the divine inheritance of health is man's by natural right, and that he deprives himself of it by his own unwillingness to look upon life as harmonious, beautiful and opposed to imperfections and disease—this recognition we may confidently look to as a great achievement of the new time, the day in whose dawn we stand, rich in the knowledge of the freedom and power of man's soul.

**SURGEONS PLAN AN IMPROVED MAN**

**Widened Jaw, Bare Feet, Shortened Intestine Their Idea.**

**NATURE IS SHORT-SIGHTED**

Toes and Teeth Also Are to Receive the Attention of the Beauty Experts.

Boston, Mass., Dec. 22.—Leading Boston surgeons are working on these ideas for improving man:

Enlarge the jaws to make room for the teeth and give the face a chance to develop.

Cut out six feet of the large intestine, an operation which incidentally may aid digestion.

Straighten the toes so that a man or woman may achieve a graceful and healthful gait.

Dr. Edward H. Nichols, one of the most famous specialists in the country on intestinal operations, summed up the idea saying: "It is evident that as much as six feet of the large intestine may be removed and the patient recover. To take out more than six feet is not successful in a majority of cases; but the theory has been advanced that a man's digestion is better when he has a shortened intestine."

To take in the two other extremes of the body—the toes and the teeth—there is an equal chance of improvement on nature, according to the experts. Dr. E. H. Bradford, who lectured before the Harvard Medical school on the subject of orthopedic surgery, declared that the average city man could improve his general health by going barefoot a few weeks every summer as preliminary to getting in shape to wear sensible shoes.

Samuel A. Hopkins, M. D. D.D. S., professor of dental theory and practice at Tufts' college and a member of the dental hygiene council of Massachusetts, holds the opinion that the teeth of Americans, and especially of New England residents, are not only prone to be badly distributed in the jaws, but are liable to early decay.

Dr. Hopkins ascribes this overcropping of the teeth to the mixture of races of America, while he declares that the decay of teeth in New England is due to the prevalence of pig eating.

"And how are these unfortunate conditions to be corrected?" he asked. In relating the teeth we find, generally, that it is better to spread the jaw by springs or plates, for instance. Of course, after the jaws have been expanded and the teeth regulated there remains the necessity of constant care in the sort of food eaten and the cleansing of the teeth."

SENATOR SMITH IS VICTIM OF A COUP. His Eastern Colleagues Ignore His Plan to Hold Up Bacon's Nomination—Act in His Absence.

Washington, Dec. 22.—A group of eastern senators went to the Capitol yesterday with the firm determination to stuff down the throat of Senator William Alden Smith the name of Robert Bacon as ambassador to France. In the senator's absence they set at naught the untried rules of senatorial courtesy, ran the road roller over his request that the nomination be held in committee until after his return, and announced their determination to secure confirmation before Senator Smith could return and make his fight.

The Grand Rapids statesman, catching these eastern gentlemen in a corner in the final moments of the last congress, had it in his power to talk the British treaty to death. Rather than see the treaty defeated entirely the eastern senators yielded with bad grace and amended it to Senator Smith's satisfaction. Now they have paid him by acting on Bacon's confirmation when he was powerless to interfere.

Bacon Had Offended Smith. All this row goes back to the feud over the treaty. The senators who rushed Bacon's confirmation are Root and Lodge, whose plans were upset by Senator Smith's onslaught. Bacon, then secretary of state, was more vigorous than diplomatic in trying to block the Michigan senator and told him point blank that he did not know what he was talking about, according to the story in circulation here. William Alden never forgot this impolite allegation. The two had had decided differences before Bacon became secretary of state and Senator Smith was even then disposed to fight Bacon's confirmation.

Smith, he and other senators from the middle west were mollified by Roosevelt's promise that a few days as secretary of state would completely terminate Bacon's public career. Senator Smith interpreted this promise to mean that the Taft administration would not hand over a diplomatic or any other appointment to Bacon. But it has long been understood that Taft had Bacon in mind and to forestall any possible nomination and confirmation during his holiday trip to California the senator just before leaving filed notice with the senate committee on foreign relations that he wanted to be heard before the committee took action on Bacon's name.

The rapid succession of events since last week makes it appear that the whole thing was a well planned scheme to thwart Senator Smith. President Taft and the others had sufficient reason to know that William Alden intended to fight Bacon's confirmation. Accordingly he sent the nomination on the first legislative day following Senator Smith's departure, while the others in the secret planned to whomp it through the senate on the double quick.

It is stated by one of the senate confidantes that his objection to Bacon was based upon the New York's man kindness to eastern business interests. The senator believes that Bacon as an official of the state department was never able to forget the business affiliations which had made him a member of the firm of J. P. Morgan & Co.

So Treaty Still Rankles. This friendliness was shown particularly, according to Senator Smith's views, in that boundary water treaty whereby the United States made a good bargain at Niagara and for that concession paid the Canadians by giving them a big share at the Soo and along the north central boundary. This method of preparing the treaty was alleged by Senator Smith to be directly antagonistic to the big water power interests, which have made the developments at Niagara and which would like to make more.

DISCIPLINING M'VEAGH. Congress May Ignore Some of His Most Important Recommendations.

Washington, Dec. 22.—Congressional resentment against Secretary of the Treasury Franklin MacVeagh, while illustrated by the holding up of the nomination of James F. Curtis to be assistant secretary, is not really concerned with the future of that able young citizen, Mr. Curtis will be confirmed in due time, and need not worry over his prospects. The senate has other ways, however, of disciplining a cabinet officer, and from information current today, from sources which are to be credited, the upper branch is more likely to strike at the secretary through ignoring some of his most important recommendations.

One of the most vital of these, as it may turn out, was his reference to the rate of taxation on bank circulation secured by United States bonds. It is an open secret that the government wants more cash than it has handled. About \$600,000,000 is traditionally regarded as the proper sum to have on hand as a working balance. Yet the treasury last year today is less than \$300,000,000. It never was contemplated to pay for the construction of the Panama canal out of current revenues, yet the government has done that to the extent of almost \$94,000,000, and now it would like to issue a hundred millions more of Panama 3 per cent bonds and get its money back. The canal has cost to date \$181,000,000, and out of an authorized issue of more than \$375,000,000 the government has issued only \$84,634,980. These 2 per cent are very useful to the banks in securing their circulation, and more than \$75,000,000 of the total issue is now used for that purpose.

But the premium on Panama bonds has been steadily declining. The have been bid for, if not offered, below par and they stand just at par now. Secretary MacVeagh in a communication to the senate committee on finance last spring, and again in his annual report, recommended that the tax on bank circulation secured by bonds be increased proportionately with the rate of interest which the bonds bear. The present rate is one-half of 1 per cent on 2 per cent bonds, and Mr. MacVeagh proposes to make it 1 per cent on 2 1/2 per cent, 1 1/2 per cent on 3 per cent and so on. It being understood that the tax on circulation secured on existing bonds bearing 3 and 4 per cent interest and now on deposit to secure circulation would not be affected. This plan, in the opinion of the secretary, would protect future issues of Panama bonds and complete the availability (\$290,500,000) of those bonds authorized by the law of Aug. 10, 1907. It is obvious, of course, that these bonds, if issued at 3 per cent would be more attractive than the 2 per cent, as circulation issued over them under the present law would bear a tax of only 1 per cent. The effect of such issues upon the outstanding bonds, amounting to more than \$84,000,000, might be serious.

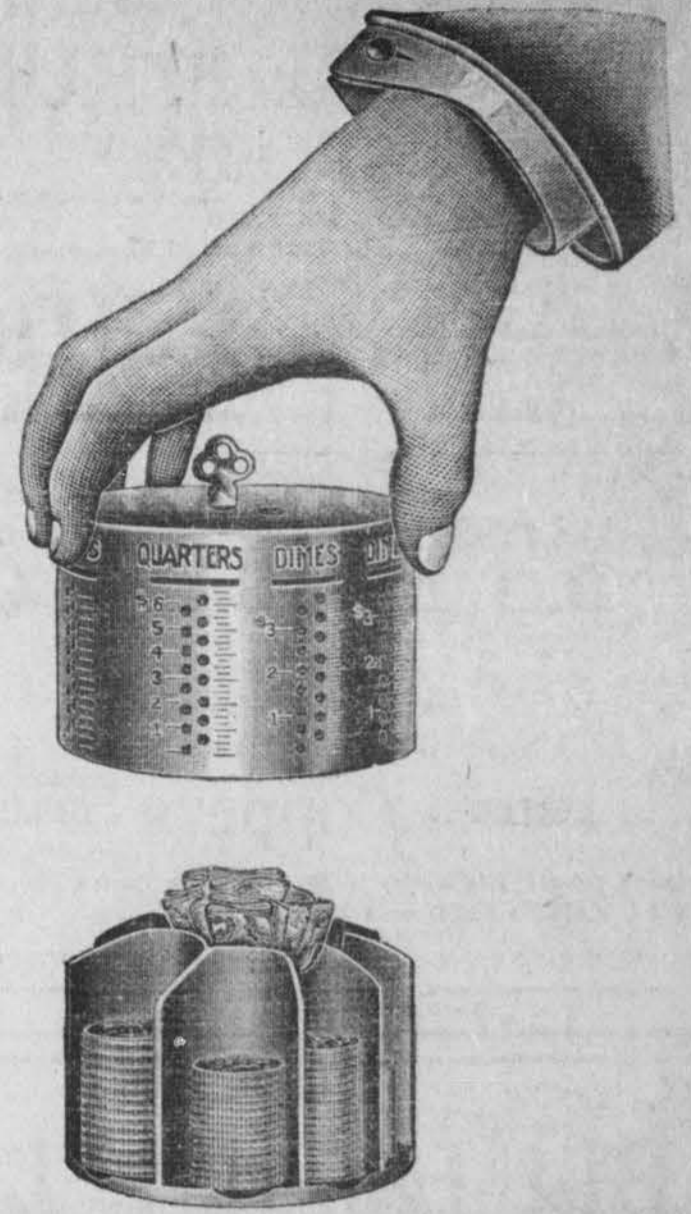

CHURCH COLUMBUS BUILT HAS NOW BEEN TORN DOWN. Erected in 1493 as a Memorial to Garissoon Slein by Indians. Washington, Dec. 22.—The oldest church in America, St. Michael, a Roman Catholic institution built by Columbus in the city of Santo Domingo, was recently torn down because its vaults were insecure and dangerous. When Columbus returned from Spain on the second voyage in 1493, finding the fort he had erected at Navidad destroyed and the garrison massacred, he retreated his tracks to a small but sheltered harbor near Monte Cristi, where he disembarked. His weary men and munitions and provisions and built a town which he called Isabella, after his royal patroness. He erected a church, a public storehouse, known as the King's house, and a residence for himself, known as the governor's palace. These were of stone. Many private houses were constructed of wood, reeds and such other material as was found in the neighborhood. King Ferdinand sent a bell which hung in the steeple of the church, which was dedicated to St. Michael. The city of Isabella was abandoned after the discovery of gold in the interior and all the buildings ultimately fell into ruins. The man-of-war Enterprise, with the late Admiral Converse in command and Admiral Colvocoresses as executive officer, visited the spot in 1892 and brought to the United States all of the cut stone that remained in the ruins, which was exhibited among the relics of Columbus in the replica of the convent of LaRabida at the Chicago exposition.

### N. E. SKUD PASSES AWAY IN CHICAGO

PROMINENT ISHPEMING BUSINESSMAN OPERATED ON SIX WEEKS AGO ANSWERS FINAL SUMMONS IN MERCY HOSPITAL.

Ishpeming people were shocked and saddened last evening, when it became known that Nathan E. Skud had passed from life. Mr. Skud was one of the city's most prominent businessmen, as well as one of its most highly respected citizens. He died in Mercy hospital, Chicago, late yesterday afternoon. He had been a patient in the institution the past six weeks and had submitted there to a difficult surgical operation. His age was fifty-four years. Mrs. Skud and four children survive him.

Mr. Skud had met with notable success in life. He had long been engaged in business in Upper Michigan. He was born in Russia in 1855, and at the age of fourteen went to Sweden. He remained there a few years, then came to the United States, locating at Buffalo, N. Y. Four years later, or in 1883, he removed to this city. Ever since then he had been a resident of Ishpeming, and throughout the twenty-six years he had been engaged in business.

On his arrival in this city in 1883, Mr. Skud associated himself with M. A. Kahn and with him opened a store in the Johnson block, on Cleveland avenue. The firm dealt in men's furnishings. It occupied the quarters now used as a barber shop by Johnson & Heard. This store was outgrown as business increased, and in 1888 Kahn & Skud took up quarters in the McEneaney building, on Main street. A few years later the firm removed to the McKay block, now the Odd Fellows block, at Main and Pearl streets, occupying all three of the store rooms. Six years ago last January the firm dissolved partnership, Mr. Kahn taking the men's furnishings and clothing departments, and Mr. Skud the ladies' furnishings and dry goods departments. Since then the business has been conducted separately. Mr. Skud had materially enlarged and improved his store the past year, having taken the annex erected by the Odd Fellows and remodelled his original quarters, and he had one of the best arranged and finest stocks of its kind in the upper country. Aside from his interests in this city, Mr. Skud was a partner in the firm of Skud, Goldman & Co. at Bessemer. This latter business was established thirteen years ago.

The deceased was prominent in fraternal circles, as well as in business life. He was treasurer of Abmeek lodge of the Odd Fellows, had been the past seventeen years, and in 1891 was treasurer of Court, Widow's Friend of the Foresters. He also held membership in Hematite camp, Modern Woodmen of America.

Mr. Skud was married at Buffalo in 1885 to Miss Johanna. They had four children: one son, eleven years old, and three daughters, the eldest of whom, Miss Stella, is twenty-one and the youngest is eight years of age. Mrs. Skud and Miss Stella Skud were at the bedside when the end came yesterday.

It was just six weeks ago today that Mr. Skud went to Chicago. He had been ailing for a considerable period, but had not realized that his condition was as serious as it proved to be. He submitted to an operation by Dr. Murphy shortly after his arrival at the hospital, and for several weeks appeared to gain a relapse set in last Sunday, however, and from this turn for the worse the patient failed to rally.

The remains will be conveyed to Detroit for burial. The funeral will take place either Friday or Saturday and it will be attended by all of the family, Mr. Kahn having left for Chicago last evening with the three youngest children.

The passing of Mr. Skud is mourned sincerely. He was an upright and honest businessman, and a good citizen. His friends were legion.

MEDICAL MEN EVERYWHERE ARE PROTESTING AGAINST ITS USE IN SCHOOLS AND ON RAILROADS

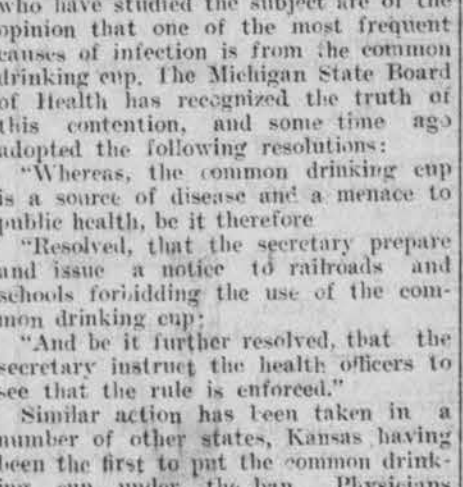

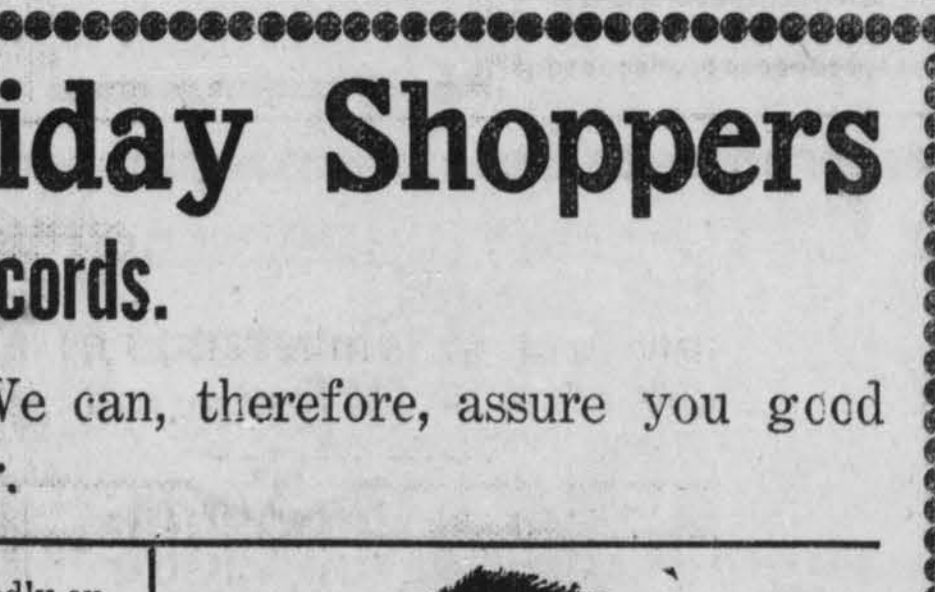
