New York, Dec. 22.-Commander Peary, in a speech at a banquet at the Waldorf-Astoria tonight, given in his honor by the New England society, said: "The Stars and Stripes have been planted at the North pole. It would seem a fitting sequel if our efforts might be directed towards the South pole with the possibility that the flag would wave at both ends of the earth's axis." Peary's reference was taken to mean that he might lead such an expedition. and wild applause greeted it. Asked afterward if he intended to lead such an expedition, Peary said: "I am prepared to assist in the organization of such expedition." This reply, carefully worded, leaves open the main question. 



Dr. Deadman states that, in his opinion, 50 per cent of the cattle of Marquette and vicinity are affected with teberculosis, and that the council is making a great mistake in eliminating the compulsory test from the proposed ordinance. In one of the best dairies in the northwest, recently, the state vetrinarian found twenty-nine out of fifty cows that were affected, though all had been bought with a guarantee that they were free from the disease. 
