COPPER MERGER.

J. P. Morgan & Co. to Finance Amalgamated-Cole-Ryan Combination.

Although the transaction involving consolidation of the Utah Copper company, Nevada Consolidated Copper company and Boston Consolidated Copper company will meet severe opposition, so far no organized effort has been made to block the merger, and none is likely, reports a New York correspondent.

BE GOOD TO CENSUS MEN.

They Have to Ask the Questions They Will Put to You.

If the Requests Seem Impertinent, They Are Important; and, Besides, a Heavy Penalty Is Attached to Refusal to Give Information—Field Work Begins April 15—Many New Features Included.

Washington, Dec. 26.—Pretty soon the "census man" with his little fountain pen and imposing papers, will be at your door asking all kinds of impertinent and important questions. Good citizens always tell him all he wants to know, while bad ones and those who know better try to kick him down stairs. But the government is spending a royal fortune to collect the facts, and the information is invaluable to the men who manage the business of the country.

Hundreds of Millions of Cards.

The population schedule has been approved by Census Director Durrand, and its final form will be 16 by 23 inches in size, printed front and back, with fifty lines on each side, one for each person enumerated. The government printing office will print 1,800,000 copies, so as to give each of the 330 supervisors of census an ample supply of blank cards.

REAR ADMIRALS TO RETIRE.

Navy Will Lose Twelve Well-known Officers the Coming Year.

Washington, Dec. 26.—An even dozen of the navy's best known admirals will retire from the active service under the legal age limit during 1910, the retirements beginning with the new year and ending in the middle of next November. Rear Admiral William Wir Kimball, now commanding the American naval forces in Nicaragua waters, will be the first to go on the retired list, while Rear Admiral Conway H. Arnold will be the last two years old on Nov. 14 next.

Upper Peninsula

Escanaba's Postmaster Reappointed—H. W. Colburn, postmaster at Escanaba, has received word from Washington, informing him of his re-appointment to the position which he now holds. While the appointment was not unexpected, it is nevertheless a Christmas gift which is highly valued.

Hancock, manager of the Grand Rapids City Railway company, announces the formation of a merger of traction, power and gas interests in Michigan by the Hoenepel-Walbridge interests of New York and E. W. Clark of Philadelphia. Properties in Grand Rapids, Saginaw, Bay City, Flint, Kalamazoo, Jackson, Cadillac and Pontiac are included in the deal.

The third group, "Relationship," calls for a statement of the relationship which the person enumerated bears to the head of the family in which he resides.

Personal Description.

The "Personal Description" group asks for the sex, color or race—that is, whether white, black, mulatto, Chinese, Japanese or Indian; age at last birthday; whether single, married, widowed or divorced; the number of years of present marriage; and, under the subject of "Mother of how many children," the number of children each woman has had and the number now living.

Place of Birth.

The group relative to "Place of Birth" requires answering the place of birth of the person enumerated, and also of his or her father and mother. The instructions are that if either is born in the United States the enumerator must give the state or territory, but if foreign birth he must give the country.

The names of the deserving poor were procured some days before Christmas and tickets, each good for one basket of provisions, were distributed among them. In the evening nearly 300 children assembled at the barracks to enjoy the Christmas program and receive presents of candy, nuts, fruit, etc., from the tree.

MANY HOME FOR CHRISTMAS.

Some 100 Former Residents Are Down from the Mesaba Range.

An unusually large number of former residents of this city have returned to spend the holidays with relatives. The visitors began to arrive the latter part of last week and on Friday in the neighborhood of 200 came in from various parts of the country. The Duluth, South Shore & Atlantic train from Duluth and the Mesaba range, arriving here Friday morning at 4 o'clock, carried nearly 100 people from that district. Most of them came from the Mesaba, where many former residents of this city are now located. Perhaps 75 per cent of the visitors are young people who were reared in Ishpeming and whose parents still reside here. Another large delegation arrived Friday afternoon from the copper country and intermediate points. Among the passengers were a number of people from towns in the western part of the county and points beyond, who came down to do their Christmas shopping.

Although the Ishpeming merchants dealing in holiday goods had almost a continuous rush following the paydays, a larger volume of business was done on Friday than on any previous day during the season. Most of the stores were crowded during the greater part of the day and some of them were not closed until nearly midnight. The heaviest rush was between 2 and 4 o'clock in the afternoon and from 7 until 10 o'clock in the evening. Nearly all of the merchants were obliged to put on extra delivery teams Friday.

Several of the merchants on Friday said that they had done their business holiday business this year. Many of them almost completely cleaned up their Christmas goods.

COOPER NEAR DULUTH.

Head of the Lake Men Believe They Have Made a Valuable Discovery.

Word comes from Duluth that several wealthy mining men and capitalists there believe that they have discovered a big copper vein almost within the city limits. One prominent Duluth party has been exploring for copper for some time past about ten miles north of Lester park. He has put a churn drill hole down about 150 feet and he is now installing a diamond drill to further test the property. It is said that there will be plenty of money back of the proposition and the parties interested are going to conduct their exploratory work in such a thorough manner that they will locate copper veins if they really exist. They plan to drill all of the holes several hundred feet deep and it is probable that the exploratory work will not be confined to the one tract of which the churn drills have been operated.

Numerous well-known Duluth men own land in this vicinity. If copper is struck in paying quantities, it will mean big fortunes for them. All of them have heard of the copper vein which is supposed to exist in that vicinity, and refuse to let go their holdings. There has been considerable activity in land in the neighborhood the last fall, due partly to the fact that it is believed that a street car will shortly be run to the Jean Du Luth stock farm and partly to the copper rumors.

The man who is now drilling recently bought 3000 acres of land along the line of the vein reported to exist. It is said that he paid an average price of \$8 an acre, making a first investment of \$24,000.

The reported vein is believed to run from the place that is now being explored to the south end of Eagle lake. The branch vein is said to start near Clinton, is 24-1-13 and run to the north vein in 36, 92-14. A diamond drill is being operated in the northeast quarter of the southeast quarter of section 29-32-13.

A map of the supposed vein has been published by John Peterson, who is

said to have had considerable experience in this line. He has been associated with his brother, Oscar Peterson.

Peterson himself has bought forty acres and has been doing some test pitting. He kept at it until recently, when he was obliged to stop to look after some other business. He will resume shortly, however. Peterson holds the southeast quarter of the southeast quarter of section 9-31-13.

Among Duluthians who have holdings in this direction are: J. J. Wagonstein, A. Elger, P. McDonnell, Harry Nesbitt, Charles Merritt, C. T. Fitzsimmons, C. Francis Coleman, Dr. Magle, J. M. U. Thompson, John Jensen, O. G. Olson, H. W. Cleaveland, O. Baldwin, A. E. Zimmerman, J. L. Washburn, M. H. Alworth, Anton Hjeltn and N. E. Russell. The vein is also supposed to go through part of the Jean Du Luth stock farm. All of these are not located directly on the vein shown in the Peterson map, but are near enough to have hopes that lightning will strike where it will do them the most good.
