Rising 31 3-4 Points Within Five Minutes, and Relapsing in Almost as Little Time, the Movement Gives the Market a Shock That Might Easily Have Proved Disastrous—Governors Are Aroused and the Episode Will Be Probed to the Bottom.

New York, Dec. 27 .- The New York Stock exchange has an investigation on its hands. Rock Island common stock rose 21% points almost immediately after the opening today, and then even more suddenly dropped to 50. Thereby bangs a mystery or fiasco or something that the governors of the Stock exchange will sift.

Francis L. Eames, formerly president of the exchange, and J. I Atterbury and Ernest Groesbeck have been ap pointed as a committee to conduct the investigation. Market Shows Its Strength.

The Rock Island episode afforded opportunity to test the stability of the present speculative position. The sisting power shown by the market to the alarming intimation carried by the sensational gyrations of Rock Island served as assurance that the present position is not easily vulnerable. fears that such a condition might be growing up have been fostered to some extent by last week's drooping tendency of prices. If there had been any real crumbling of speculative confidence this morning, the shock would have precipitated a violent liquidation and a slump in prices.

In a few stocks where there had been persistent speculative activity since the general market has grown quiet, there was a hasty unloading and a sharp break in prices. The general list, however, stood up well under the shock, and then rallied. The conclusion is forced that the heavy tone last week was due to a pause in the activities of the speculation for a rise rather than an active pressure to sell. That control of the situation is still exercised by the powerful interests back of the market was demonstrated clearly by the morket's action today.

The attempted explanations of the movement were widely various and, in ome cases, fautastic. The recent heavy sales of ealls on the stock by foreign operators and the purchase by them, according to their rule, of half the imount required to meet the contracts, undoubtedly played a part in this condition. The conviction grew that a mis carriage of the market management of the stock had as much to do as any thing with the unedifying spectacle. That management has involved a lavish utlay of resources and a very free play of manipulative forces. Instead of the usual carefully calculated balance of such forces in today's market, there eemed to nave been a reckless or blundering upheaval in one direction without the intended effect on the other side. An error by a clerk was one o the specious suggestions made. Such explanations found more general ac ceptance than the rumors of a struggle or control, owing to the fact of the control lying with the company's preferred stock. Having asserted its power of resistance to the shock the market showed little dispostion to move up wards with decision, pending the working out of the year-end money market problem.
