Further Action on the Part of the Managers of the Switch-Developments at Washington.

St. Paul, Dec. 28.-The strike situation in the Northwest apparently has become a waiting game, further action being contingent upon the success of H. B. Perham, chairman of the railway branch of the Federation of Labor, who is enroute to Washington for the purpose of trying to secure federal intervention between the railroads and the switchmen.

It could not be ascertained tonight whether the allied orders of the federation have voted upon the question of a general strike. President Hawley, of the switchmen, did not answer when asked about it. President Harshbarger said that he could neither affirm or derry strike on short notice.

We at no time have feared nor do we now fear a spread of the strike, because it is not at all likely that the American Federation of Laber is willing to give official sanction to an illegal strike, as this one has been."




