### J. H. QUINN SUES IRON RIVER MAN

#### IMPORTANT CASE INVOLVING A LARGE SUM WILL BE TRIED IN CIRCUIT COURT.

#### CLAIMS RIGHT TO \$45,000

Menominee Range Man Ignored Mr. Quinn in Securing Option on and Sub-Leasing Valuable Mining Property.

Mr. Quinn apparently has a strong case. He alleges that he devoted much time to inducing reliable mining people to take hold of both the Baker and Houlihan properties. He further alleges that Tully had deceived him in many particulars and that the agreement between them relative to any deal that might be consummated with reference to the Houlihan property was identical with that pertaining to the Baker property.

In the summer of 1903 Mr. Quinn first learned that the Verona Iron Mining company was conducting drilling operations on the Houlihan property. At that time Mr. Quinn called Tully's attention to the fact that he was entitled to a half interest in the royalty payments, but Tully did not give him any satisfaction. Shortly after this the Verona Iron Mining company abandoned the option for a sub-lease on the tract on account of defects in the title.

Later Mr. Quinn learned that Tully had secured and taken in his own name an option from John Dineen and other persons claiming to own the Houlihan property, and that he had made an agreement with the Verona Iron Mining company, giving it the privilege of taking a sub-lease upon the payment to him of a royalty of four cents per ton over and above the amount to be paid the fee owners.

Mr. Quinn endeavored to reach an agreement with Mr. Tully with a view to securing his just share of the profits derived from the work on the Houlihan property, but without success. Instead of executing the lease in his own name, Mr. Tully had it made out in the name of the Tully Mining company, sub-leasing it to the Crystal Falls Iron Mining company at an advance of six cents per ton on the royalty, paid the fee owners. The attorney representing Tully received for his services 50 per cent of the capital stock of the Tully Mining company, and all of the remaining interest, with the exception of one share, which was transferred to Mrs. Tully, was held by Tully. Mr. Quinn deferred instituting legal proceedings against Mr. Tully in an effort to recover what he believes belongs to him to avoid any controversy or litigation that would involve the owners of the Houlihan property.

The Tully Mining company has a capital stock of 400 shares, with a par value of \$25 per share. Mr. Quinn avers that he is informed and believes that the Crystal Falls Iron Mining company, which has conducted drilling operations and other exploratory work on the Houlihan property, has shown to exist thereon a large body of iron ore containing 3,000,000 tons and upwards. The company is now engaged in sinking a shaft for the purpose of mining the ore. It is on the knowledge of there being not less than 3,000,000 tons of ore proved up at this time that Mr. Quinn bases his claim to one-half of \$90,000.

Mr. Quinn alleges that the contract entered into between Tully, or the Tully Mining company, and the operating corporation, should have been made jointly in behalf of himself and the defendant or the defendant company.

Upon the filing of the bill of complaint an injunction was issued by Judge Cooper, acting circuit judge, restraining Mr. Tully from transferring or disposing of his interest in the Tully Mining company or the lease. The injunction also restrains the Crystal Falls Iron company from paying any further royalties to Mr. Tully under the terms of the agreement.

John H. Quinn, through his attorney, William P. Belden, has commenced suit in the circuit court of Marquette county against William J. Tully, his wife, Margaret Tully, of Iron River, Mich., the Tully Mining company, and the Crystal Falls Iron Mining company to recover his interest in a lease now held by the Crystal Falls Iron Mining company, together with an interest in the capital stock of the Tully Mining company, the whole involving a sum of \$90,000, of which Mr. Quinn claims one-half.

The defendant, William J. Tully, will be asked to account for one-half the profits made by him in disposing of options in a mining lease on what is known as the Houlihan property in Iron county. The bill alleges that in 1902 Mr. Tully solicited Mr. Quinn to examine certain mineral lands near Iron River, referred to in the bill of complaint as the Baker property. Messrs. Tully and Quinn made a personal examination of the land and concluded that if there was ore on the Baker property there would probably also be ore on the Houlihan tract, lying between the Baker and Caspian mines. Mr. Tully claimed to be acquainted with the fee owners of both parcels of land, and it was therefore agreed between Messrs. Tully and Quinn at that time that the work would be done to secure options for mining leases and endeavor to dispose of them to mining companies at an advance in the royalty payments over those which they would be obliged to pay the fee owners. They agreed to share equally in the expense of the enterprises and in the profits to be derived from disposing of the leases.

**Tully Secures Option.**

They secured an option on the Baker property. The bill describes the efforts they made in the next two years to dispose of this option, which they finally did at an advance of six cents per ton royalty, of which each party is now getting three cents. While the Baker property was being explored Mr. Tully got an option in his own name on the Houlihan property and interested the Verona Iron company in exploring it. He did not report this transaction to Mr. Quinn, and the first information Mr. Quinn had of it was through learning that drilling operations were being conducted. This option was thrown up on account of complications in the title.

Tully later succeeded in getting a lease which he took in the name of the Tully Mining company, without recognizing Mr. Quinn's interest. This lease was later involved in litigation, so that Mr. Quinn could take no steps to enforce his rights until the present time.

The bill avers that the services of Mr. Quinn were sought by Tully because of the fact that he had had experience in dealing with mining companies and understood mining leases, while the defendant was unfamiliar with such business. For some two years before Mr. Quinn finally succeeded in getting responsible people interested in the proposition he spent considerable time and money. He finally induced the management of the Oliver Iron Mining company to make a personal examination of the Baker tract, and as a result the company entered into an agreement with Messrs. Quinn and Tully to explore the property, with the privilege of taking a sub-lease of it upon the payment of a royalty of four cents per ton in excess of that to be paid the fee owners, which was ten cents per ton for all non-Bessemer ore produced and twenty cents for Bessemer ore mined.

The Oliver company conducted drilling operations and other explorations upon the Baker property for a period of six months and discovered iron ore there
