## Mining News

### INDIANA.

All the reports which have come down from the lake on the Indiana are bullish and verify the first report of the rich character of the ore, comments the Boston Financial News, but it should not be forgotten that as yet the Indiana has no developments other than the success attained from the piercing of the conglomerate lode by the diamond drill; and the North Lake, except for the two lodges which were encountered some six months ago, has not thus far made any new discovery by duplicating the drill holes further south. On the North Lake property there is a heavy overburden to drill through which means a long way and a long time for the diamond drill to sink before results are obtained, and the mining interests who have watched prospecting in the Lake region have not forgotten the experience of the Elm River, Rhode Island, Ashland, Arnold and several others which have holes in the ground and looked good. It may be said, however, that none of these properties produced cores of the character of that which the Indiana gave up last week and there was no precedent in the district such as the Lake mine has been. With the possible exception of the advance in Lake Copper the copper share market has not experienced for a long time such a spectacular rise in prices as that witnessed in Indiana. The Miners' Copper company, which was later consolidated with Isle Royale, sold at 50 per share before anybody knew anything about the property, and it may be said that next to the action of that stock these

## Ishpeming Department

### CARL LEHTO WINS MATCH HANDILY

PLANS TO GO TO NORWAY.  
Aksel Holter May Represent America at Ski Convention Abroad.

Carl Lehto, the heavy weight catch-as-catch-can wrestler of the copper country, defeated Matt Kangas of Negaunee at Ishpeming Saturday evening, winning the first fall in Graeco-Roman style in thirteen and one-half minutes and the second, catch-as-catch-can, in nine and one-half minutes. In the preliminary bouts Oscar Grunlund of South Range and K. J. Wirtanen of Hancock gave a fast exhibition. They were on the mat twenty minutes in the Roman style, without either getting a fall, and they wrestled for ten minutes at catch-as-catch-can with the same result.

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## Notes of Copper News.

Superior & Boston will within a week commence shipping not less than fifty tons of ore daily to the Arizona Commercial smelter. The ore bins at the McGraw shaft and the spur to the smelter are expected to be completed by that time.

It is said that the development work being carried on in the Joe Bush and Scorpion shafts on the east end of the property of the Inspiration Copper company is securing favorable results. It is claimed that the faces of the six drifts driven on the 400-foot level of the Joe Bush shaft have been almost continuously in chalcocite ore for their entire lengths, which now aggregate about 800 feet of workings. The average grade of this ore is given as about 2 1/2 per cent.

Contentual has made a small reduction in its underground force, and has temporarily ceased shaft sinking. It is planned to give more attention to lateral openings in the bottom of the mine, particularly to those northward towards South Keatsarge, in which direction lies the best ground by an opening in this mine. Most of the north drifts at and below the twenty-fifth level are in first-class copper ground, and all from the nineteenth to the bottom that have reached the boundary are for the greater part in good commercial ground, undeniably richer than is indicated in the painfully low average yield secured at the stamp mill. The inconsistency is explained by the fact that little or no attention is given to the matter of rock selection, probably less than 10 per cent of the entire tonnage blasted down being discarded as poor rock.

### FLANNIGAN CHOICE OF BOTH PARTIES

DEMOCRATS AND REPUBLICANS UNITE ON NORWAY LAWYER FOR CIRCUIT JUDGE.

#### CONVENTIONS WELL ATTENDED

Entirely Harmonious Gathering of Politicians of Judicial District at Court House Saturday.

As had been anticipated, Richard C. Flannigan of Norway was the unanimous choice of both the Republicans and Democrats of the Twenty-fifth judicial district for the high office of circuit judge in the counties of Marquette, Dickinson, Delta, Menominee and Iron, at the conventions held at the court house in Marquette Saturday afternoon.

The Republican convention was called to order by F. J. Trudell of Menominee, secretary of the judicial committee. F. D. Mead of Delta county was elected temporary chairman by acclamation and F. J. Trudell, secretary. On motion, the following committees were appointed by the temporary chairman:

Credentials—John Cummins of Del. ta, M. M. Duncan of Marquette, E. P. Radford of Menominee.

Permanent Organization and Order of Business—R. C. Henderson of Dickinson, M. H. Moriarty of Iron, M. J. Sherwood of Marquette.

Resolutions—W. P. Belden of Marquette, I. C. Jennings of Delta, F. A. Bell of Marquette.

The committee on credentials reported that the following persons were entitled to sit in the convention:

In accordance with the report of the committee on permanent organization, F. D. Mead was elected chairman of the convention and John E. Tracy, secretary.

The nomination of a candidate for circuit judge was then taken up, nomination by roll call of counties being the system adopted. Delta county, the first called by the secretary, begged leave to waive its right to place a candidate in nomination to the Dickinson county delegation.

Flannigan Nominated. When that county was called, Don Cameron rose and placed in nomination the name of Richard C. Flannigan, prefacing the nomination with a speech in which he spoke of his long acquaintance with Mr. Flannigan, throughout which he had proven himself to be a man of extraordinary ability and by nature and temperament peculiarly well fitted for the high and important office of circuit judge. The nomination was greeted with cheers and applause and on motion of M. M. Duncan, Richard J. Flannigan was declared the unanimous choice of the convention. A committee was then appointed to notify the Democratic convention of the action of the Republicans.

A few moments later, a committee of Democrats, headed by M. J. Doyle of Menominee, begged leave to report to the Republican convention that the following resolution had been unanimously adopted by the Democrats:

"Resolved, That the Democrats of the Twenty-fifth Judicial circuit, in convention assembled, endorse the nomination by the Republican judicial convention this day made of Richard C. Flannigan for election to the office of circuit judge recognizing in such action an appreciation of ability, courage, learning and conscientious achievement and a well-deserved tribute of honor to thirty years' blameless life as a lawyer in this circuit preceded by an unblemished career as boy and man on this peninsula and within whose territorial limits his entire life has been lived."

Following the reception of this communication from the Democrats, the Republicans adopted the resolution drawn up by the committee on resolutions and which was sent to Governor Warner Saturday afternoon. This resolution read as follows:

"Whereas, Richard C. Flannigan has been unanimously nominated for the office of circuit judge of the Twenty-fifth Judicial circuit by both the Republican and Democratic conventions of that circuit; and

"Whereas, it is desirable that the vacancy in said office caused by the resignation of Hon. John W. Stone, should be filled immediately, therefore,

"Resolved, That the Republican judicial convention of said circuit, in session at Marquette on the 22nd of January, 1910, hereby requests Hon. Fred M. Warner, governor of Michigan, to appoint said Richard C. Flannigan immediately to fill the vacancy so caused by the resignation of Judge Stone; and further,

"Resolved, That the secretary of this convention be and he is hereby instructed to forward a copy of this resolution immediately to Governor Warner."

Democratic Convention. The Democratic convention was called to order by F. M. Moore, chairman of the judicial committee, and John Power of Delta county was elected temporary chairman and T. J. Dandon of Marquette county, temporary secretary. This organization was later made permanent. The following committee on credentials was appointed: Patrick Flannigan of Dickinson, F. S. Byrne of Marquette, John M. Millar of Delta, James F. Corcoran of

Iron, Geo. H. Haggerson of Menominee. This committee reported the following to be entitled to seats in the convention: Delta county—John Power, John B. Cleary, M. Doherty, John P. McCall, John J. Souvini, John M. Millar, James B. Mason.

Dickinson county—Patrick Flannigan, M. C. Hartwig, H. McLaughlin, W. H. Hurley, J. H. Wickstrom, Jas. H. Bush, Geo. S. Power.

Iron county—Jas. F. Corcoran, Jas. H. Johnson, M. T. Sullivan, Clarence McCreary, F. S. Olson.

Menominee county—G. P. Werline, Paul Periseau, Frank Erditz, J. W. Stiles, Jos. Caddahy, G. H. Haggerson, Otto Grasswell, M. J. Doyle, Wm. Carley.

Marquette county—T. J. Dandon, R. E. Anthony, J. L. Heffernan, Joseph Fay, F. S. Byrne, Peter Primeau, M. F. Madison, Dan Sullivan, C. F. Wilesen, J. H. Lewis, C. E. Moore, Shields McCarty, F. M. Moore, M. C. Scully, Henry C. Russell.

M. J. Doyle, John Stiles and F. M. Moore were appointed committee on resolutions. At this point a committee of Republicans informed the convention of the Republicans' nomination of Richard C. Flannigan. After a lofty eulogy of Mr. Flannigan by Mr. Doyle, the convention adopted the resolution endorsing the action of the Republican convention and appointed a committee to communicate the same to the Republicans. Chairman John Power in words of inimitable force and eloquence then addressed the convention on the fitness and merits of the nominee of both conventions.

Judicial Committees. The judicial committees chosen by the two conventions were as follows: Republican—W. P. Belden, chairman; F. J. Trudell, secretary; I. C. Jennings, M. H. Moriarty, C. T. Winegar. Democratic—John Power, chairman; F. M. Moore, secretary; M. J. Doyle, M. Doherty, Peter Primeau, Jas. F. Corcoran, Hugh McLaughlin.

The Republicans selected the following committee to officially notify Mr. Flannigan of his nomination: D. H. Ball, E. P. Radford, N. C. Spencer, Don Cameron, C. H. Watson.

At the close of the regular order of business, the Republicans invited the Democrats to meet with them in joint convention to discuss matters of mutual interest. The invitation was accepted, and John Power, the Escanaba orator, was called upon to make a speech. Mr. Power spoke in humorous vein of the unusual jury before which he was now on trial and brought the house down when he defined a Republican as a Democrat who was seeking office. He then spoke in the highest terms of the nominee of both conventions, who, he said, was the one man best fitted for the high office of circuit judge in this district, and who, when elected, would so perform the duties of the office that the judiciary and courts of the district would continue to hold a reputation second to none in the state.

Mr. Belden then addressed the joint meeting on the desirability of each county purchasing an oil painting of Judge Stone, to be hung in the several court rooms. By concerted action, the cost of these paintings would be considerably reduced, and the presenting attorneys of the district were appointed to take up the matter in their respective counties. The convention then closed with entire harmony and good feeling among all present, both Republicans and Democrats.
