WAYS TO KILL SPARROW.

A Bulletin Issued by the Government. The Bird Is Regarded as a Pest Comparable to the Rat; It Is Cunning, Destructive and Filthy—Active Efforts Now Being Made to Exterminate It—It Eats Weed Seeds; but That Is the Only Count in Its Favor, and There Are Many Against It; Evidence Is Overwhelming—Nowhere Is It Among Protected Birds.

Washington, Jan. 30.—How to Destroy English Sparrows? is the title of one of the most interesting little pamphlets which the department of agriculture has issued of late.

Its natural diet consists of seed, but it eats a great variety of other foods. While much of its annual fare consists of waste material from the streets, in autumn and winter it consumes quantities of weed seed, and in summer numerous insects.

Little in Its Favor. It is not a pest because it eats weed seeds, but because it eats other things that are valuable to man.

Destroys Small Fruits. On the other hand, much can be said against the bird. It destroys small fruits, as cherries, grapes, pears and peaches.

Strong Evidence Against the Bird. The evidence against the English sparrow is overwhelming and the present unfriendly attitude of the public toward it is reflected in our state laws.

Nests Should Be Destroyed. The most effective method of preventing the increase of sparrows in a locality is to destroy their nests.

is to destroy their nests at intervals of ten or twelve days throughout the breeding season. Occasionally they build large covered nests in trees, but as a rule they build open nests in bird-houses, electric-light boxes, corn-cobs, water-pots and similar articles.

Baiting Method Effectual. Preliminary to the following destructive measures, sparrows should be baited until they are attached to the spot selected for the bait.

Traps alone are inadequate to exterminate sparrows, but a reduction of numbers can be effected by using a large trap.

Shot Gun Very Useful. Sparrows are accustomed to feed in close flocks, and when thus assembled a large number can be killed by a charge of No. 10 shot.

JURY RENDERS VERDICT.

James Scopacasa and James Donato Held for Murder of Richard Varcoe.

The coroner's jury in the murder of Richard Varcoe, who was killed while on his way home from the city a week ago last Saturday night, returned a verdict Saturday to the effect that Varcoe came to his death by being stabbed twice with a knife in the hands of James Scopacasa and James Donato.

Marshal Trevarrow was the only witness sworn. His testimony was to the effect that Scopacasa had confessed to having committed the crime.

Scopacasa, the self confessed murderer, waived examination in Justice Andrews' court a week ago today, before his removal from the city to the county jail, and was bound over to the circuit court without bail. Donato was given a hearing Saturday and his bail was placed at \$5,000, which he was unable to furnish. He was returned to the county jail.

Prosecuting Attorney F. A. Bell has sufficient grounds for holding Donato, in spite of the fact that Scopacasa stated in his confession that Donato had no hand in the crime. The fact that Donato had invited Scopacasa to his boarding place after he had inflicted the fatal wounds, and was later found with a revolver in his hand, and which he indicated that he might use, if necessary, puts him in an embarrassing position to say the least. While he and Scopacasa were confined to the jail here Donato was by far the more nervous of the two.

EARLY MORNING BLAZE.

TO GET ANNUAL PASSES.

Old Employees of Northwestern Railway System to Be Favored.

All conductors, engineers, firemen and brakemen, who have been in the employ of the Chicago & Northwestern Railway company for ten years or longer, are to receive annual passes, according to a current report. Heretofore the engineers were the only employees who were given annual passes.

The issuance of annual passes will save considerable clerical work for the railroad company as previous to this time it was necessary for the railroads to secure trip passes whenever they desired a short holiday. The making out of the application for the trip passes and the amount of red tape gone through often took several days.

The Chicago & Northwestern has started the task of lowering the headlights on its locomotives. The headlights heretofore have been placed on top of the boilers and in front of the smoke stack. They are now being removed and placed in the center of the boiler over the boiler's eye, taking the place where the number has heretofore appeared. The number is to now appear on the front base of the boiler. The change makes quite a difference in the appearance of the engines. One reason for making the change is that it gives the engineer a better view of the track when going around curves.

MARQUETTE RANGE
POSSIBILITIES GREAT

WELL INFORMED MINING MAN EXPRESSES THE OPINION THAT MANY EXTENSIVE ORE BODIES WILL BE FOUND IN THIS RANGE IN YEARS TO COME.

"The Marquette range" mines will be operating long after the present generation has passed," said a well informed mining man Saturday. "This range will probably never be as large a producer as the Mesaba, and perhaps some of the other newer ranges, but there should be a steady increase in the tonnage shipped from it for many years to come. The Marquette range is really in its infancy, and the time will come, though I may not see it, when it will be a heavy producer of non-Bessemer ores. At the time the Jackson was operated on a large scale, the non-Bessemer ores were not in demand and only the Bessemer was taken out.
"Exploratory work for low grade ores has already been started and I know from what I learned by personal examination of the formations in different localities that the Marquette range will some day be among the heaviest producers of non-Bessemer ores in the Lake Superior district. Much of the non-Bessemer is of the hard variety, and will, of course, be more expensive to mine than the ores of similar mineral content produced in the Mesaba and other soft ore districts.
"If the time comes when the process being experimented with by John Jones at his Iron Mountain furnace is a complete success, enabling the treatment successfully of various qualities of the low grade ores available on the Marquette and Menominee ranges, the value of the non-Bessemer ore in both districts will largely increase. It has been found by his experiments that each grade of ore requires a different stack where they are aimed than in paying transportation expenses on the product any considerable distance.
"The Cascade district would be a favorable place for such a plant, as the immense bodies of low grade ores in that district will not be mined out for many years. The district west of Ishpeeming, extending beyond Michigamme, will, before many years, contain a number of big producers. I feel certain that the operators in that field will find both hard and soft ore bodies. The soft ore bodies will be found to the north, while the hard ore will be found to the south. The exploratory work has only been started and the drilling operations have been conducted in almost a straight line east and west, without taking in any considerable territory either to the north or south. The Humboldt district will also be a big producer in the years to come, as there are immense bodies of ore stored away in the hills of that vicinity.
"Much of the hard ore found in that district lies close to surface and can be mined cheaply."

PINCHOT DEFENDS COURSE.
He Holds the Education of Rangers Not Unlawful.

Former Forester to Make a Statement in Explanation—Frieds Believe his Action Justified—He Is Likely to Put an Entirely New Light on the Transaction.
Washington, Jan. 30.—(Gifford Pinchot, the ousted United States forester, does not intend to let go unchallenged the notorious section that excluded an unlawful portion of the forest service by having forest rangers take instruction at certain universities and colleges in the west. The ex-forester will, it is understood, make a statement within a few days, which, his friends say, will put the entire transaction before the public in an entirely new light. Some of Mr. Pinchot's friends are authority for the statement that he feels keenly the imputation that he made a wrongful use of the government funds in educating rangers, and that they would not be surprised if he should reimburse the government out of his own pocket fund for the postal card which he used as a means of doing so. His friends were very confident that he will be able to justify the action complained of.

It is pointed out that the forest service picked up bright young men here and there and educated them for the forest service at various colleges and universities. No such thing was done, according to persons who are in position to know the facts. Ever since the forest service was established, or at least since it became an institution of any consequence, it has been the practice to have the forest rangers of a particular state or forest district gather once a year for instructions, or in what might be called a general exchange of views and experiences. After the forest rangers were divided into six districts the plan of conducting a school of instruction for a few weeks each winter in each of the forest districts was adopted.

EGGS AND BUTTER CHEAPER.
They Decline in Spite of Meat Boycott in Many Places.

The recent decline in the price of eggs and butter has been greatly welcomed by the retail dealers here, as well as by the consumers. It came sooner than expected, but inasmuch as it has been reported that both butter and eggs have been accumulated in large quantities still further declines in price are now looked for.
One day last week the wholesale price of creamery butter went off six cents per pound, and if there are no changes in the market, the price of choice stock at from thirty-one to thirty-six cents per pound. Fresh eggs are now selling at thirty-one cents per dozen, wholesale, in many places, and storage eggs at twenty-six cents. It is reported that the supply of fresh eggs is rapidly increasing, the soft weather of the past ten days being largely responsible. The roads are in good condition in most parts of the country and the farmers are bringing both their eggs and butter to market. The supply of storage eggs in many of the larger centers is becoming low and as a result the fresh eggs are being more extensively used than at any time in nearly a year past. The demand for fresh eggs at the present time is at about a parity with the supply.
So the boycott against meat continues, some dealers believe that there will be an increased demand for eggs both for cooking purposes and for eating. They also think that the boycott, while forcing a reduction in the price of meat, will cause an upturn in the price of eggs that will put the commodity on a level with the prices that prevailed a few weeks ago. Others think that the boycott is temporary, and that the increasing supply will be sufficient to meet a sudden demand above normal.

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TO STOP PELAGIC SEALING.

Washington Hears Rumors of Negotiations—Japan, Russia, England and the United States Interested.
Washington, Jan. 30.—Persistent rumors reach Washington from Canadian sources that Great Britain, the United States, Japan and Russia are moving under the surface toward an agreement for the abolition of pelagic sealing. The latest news comes through the United States consul at Victoria, B. C., who states that the Victoria Sealing company has decided not to send out its sealing fleet this year. The reason alleged by the company is announcement from Ottawa that international negotiations for the prohibition of pelagic sealing are under way. This may or may not be the actual reason. The company sent out no vessels last year, when no such reason for abandoning operations could have been advanced. It is known that two independent Canadian sealers already have gone out and three more are being outfitted.
The announcement comes at an interesting moment. The twenty-year lease of the North American Commercial company of San Francisco will expire April 30 and a determined effort to prevent its renewal is being made by certain interests in the United States. The department of commerce and labor has been satisfied with the relations of the company to the government and probably would renew the lease if no stronger reasons for not doing so were advanced than any which the department is familiar with.
Of late Dr. William T. Hornaday, the director of the Bronx Zoological park and well-known as president of the American Bison society, has interested himself in the controversy, which has been carried on for years by Professor Henry W. Elliot of Ohio, and an attempt has been made to have the situation investigated by the senate committee on conservation of natural resources, of which Joseph M. Dixon of Montana is chairman.
