Hytonen and his wife lived happily together. The man had been in Ishpeming some three and one-half years when he returned to Finland for the purpose of wedding the girl of his choice. That was about a year ago. The marriage took place directly on his arrival in his native land, and six months ago Hytonen came back to Ishpeming, bringing his wife with him, Their child born on Thanksgiving Day. It had been ill latterly and the father had worried over its condition considerably. He had become greatly depressed, and fearful that the baby would die he had determined that his wife and himself should pass from life also.

Leaves Farewell Letter.

There were three rooms in the apartments occupied by the Hytonens-kitchen, sitting room and sleeping chamber. There was one bed, and in this the body of the baby was found, weltering in its own blood. On a table in the room was Hytonen's farewell message. Along with it was the man's watch and a \$2 bill. The letter was unfinished. It told how sick the baby had been; how the man had brooded over its condition until he could stand it no longer, and how he had decided to end the child's sufferings and snuff out the existence of the parents as well. Hytonen described how he had sent his wife out doors, and how he killed the baby.

"My wife is coming back now," Hy tonen wrote. "I hear her down-stairs She doesn't know our boy is dead. am going to kill myself and her, too I cannot leave her alone.'

Hytonen met his wife at the kitchen door. The people down-stairs heard them talking a few minutes, and then they heard them descend the stairs together and go into the yard. A minute or two afterward the explosion took place

Senator Burrows has announced his intention to abide by the letter of the direct nominations law. We have no doubt that these slight discrepancies will be corrected, now that they have been called to his attention.

Usually they do so quickly enough. In this county, where socialists are allowed to talk as often and as freely as they like, there hasn't been a speaker of that stripe who has been able to address a decent sized audience in years. But the authorities, by attempting to prevent them from addressing the public as they may wish, might easily create a strong interest among certain classes in their propaganda.
