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

SMALL REFORM IN PRUSSIA.

Classification of Voters Still Gives More Than Equal Power to the Wealthy.

Berlin, Feb. 9.-In anticipation of its presentation to the Prussian Diet, the official North German Gazette prints the details of the election reform bill. The measure makes certain alleviations in he plutocratic character of the present law which divides all voters in each precinct into three classes, each of which pays one third of the taxes of that precinct. Each class elects the same number of electors, which in turn choose the Diet member for the precinct, thus giving the first class, which contains comparatively few members, equal pow-

r with the third class. The new measure retains the tripartite system, but limits the amount of taxes admitting to the highest class o \$1,250. Voters of a certain specified egree of education, or who occupy certain official positions, or have served designated number of years as officers a the army or navy are assigned to he two higher classes independently of the taxes paid. Members of the Reichstag and of the state diets, as well as hunicipal officers serving without pay, ote in the higher classes. Viva voce voting is retained, but the division of voters by precinct is replaced by a dirision by electorial districts. The bill abolishes indirect voting for electors, the counting of the votes being done by classes in such a manner that each class as a whole will exercise one-third of the district's voting power. The effect of the bill will be to reduce the proportion in the present third class of voters, who constitute more than eighty-three per cent of the voting population, probably to eighty-two per cent, a fact which indicates but a small degree of reform. The bill will come up for disussion next week and a warm fight is xpected.

Despite the violent agitation of the ast eighteen months, the bill utterly fails to satisfy the reformers. The only concession made is that direct suffrage is substituted for indirect. Voting will continue to be open, the secret ballot for which the reformers clamored for years, being rejected. Terrorism exercised by the conservative landed proprietors and employers of labor has long been regarded as a handicap by the Liberal party. The government fears the secret ballot might favor the introduction of socialism in the Diet as it has done in the Reichstag.

In connection with the statement to the fact that water is wasted in some of the schools, and that it is intended to put a stop to this. The meter records indicate that some schools are using more than twice as much water as is used in other buildings of about the same size. It has been found that some of the taps have remained open almost coninuously. Where the janitors are careful and keep a close watch on the taps, the amount of water consumed is no

Alderman Barnett contends that if less vater is wasted, a better pressure can be maintained. For some few years past the pressure has at times not been strong nough to drive the water to the higher

points in the city. Figuring on a basis of the regular harges, the sum that should be credited mually to the department for the waer donated the city building, hydrants, etc., exceeds \$3,600. This figure is based on the water consumed during the three nonths ending Dec. 31.

The committee has found that the average hydrant charge throughout the country is \$44, the maximum \$79 and the minimum \$20. The committee allowed \$20 for each of the 130 fire hydrants in use, making a total of \$2,600.

On the average Canada buys from Jamaica about \$125,000 of fruit per annum and this will continue, preference or no preference. Besides, the market for fruit is growing rapidly in the United States, until now, during the ummer months, the demand exceeds the supply. Then during the past thirty years Jamaica has been buying more from Canada than this island has sold her. In 1906 Jamaica sold \$690,000 worth of goods and bought from her commodities to the value of \$915,000. ## POWER PLANT ON AU TRAIN RIVER

DAM TO HARNESS WATER POW-ER AT THE FALLS.

FOR MUNISING PAPER MILL

This plant will be capable of developing several hundred horsepower. It is not expected that it will be sufficient to supply the entire power for the operation of the paper mill, but will simply be used to supplement the steam piant that is now in operation. The company is understood to have plans for building another dam some distance up the river, which would considerably increase the available power in the Au Train river, but it is not certain that the second dam will be constructed in the im-
