Primary Law.

Such of the Osborn workers as have done a little hustling among the unrolled voters have found a peculiar condition. Many of these voters get the general election and the primary election confused and think the new law makes it necessary for them to tell what party ticket they are voting at the general election. To clear this impression the following extract from the primary law covering that point, is reprinted:

"Section 19. It shall be the duty of the board of election commissioners of each county in this state to prepare and furnish the necessary official primary election ballots which may be required September primary. Said ballots shall be printed or different colored paper for each political party, but no party ballot shall be printed on yellow paper. 

TO DOUBLE TOBACCO ACREAGE.

Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 11 .- Farmers in estern Missouri are finding tobacco such a profitable crop that it is expected that the acreage devoted to tobacco this year will be double what it was last season. The crop grown in the western part of the state last year is estimated to exceed 3,000,000 pounds and was of ine quality, selling at from fourteen to seventeen cents a pound. Buyera from all of the large tobacco markets have opened headquarters in the larger towns, and every pound offered has found a quick sale,

Farmers who grew tobacco last year report profits ranging from \$200 to \$300 an acre. Their success and the prospect of such profits is inducing other farmers to take up the cultivation of the plant. Those farmers who have become experienced in growing tobacco are turning their attention now to improving the quality of their leaf, and confidently expect next year to turn out high-grade leaf equal in quality to the best Kentucky leaf. Growers are now largely using the Kentucky White Buriey and other high-grade seed and many of them are following out a process of seed selection with a view to developing a distinctly Missouri high-grade leaf.

PANAMA CANAL IN WAR.

The strategic value of the Panama anal is estimated to be equivalent to a fleet of large battleships. This is the onclusion of Dr. Cornish, given before the Royal Geographical society in London. Taking the cost of the canal at \$500,000,000, which would only build forty first-class battleships nowadays. the United States will have a good bargain, and be able to cover a total coast line without any material increase in her vessels.

The canal will double the sea efficiency of our fleet for half the sum of money that would otherwise be necessary to maintain communication between the Pacific and Atlantic coasts, says the National Magazine. 

There is a little, unimposing structure ituated on North Oak street, at Escaaba, which probably never attracts even he casual notice of the passerby, but which is doing a thriving business and stilizing the ashes which are thrown out of the firerooms of the mills and facories. The uninitiated would look upon the ashes as useless and would consider that when the refuse wood, which is used as fuel to generate steam to drive the engines, turns into ashes it has done the last possible service to humanity. But from these ashes there is taken a valuable product called potash, which is used in the arts, in the manufacture of soap and in other ways too numerous o mention, and after the potash is relaimed the ashes become a valuable ertilizer and are hauled away by the armers of the surrounding country. This ittle industry, of which D. A. Brotheron is manager, does not give employ-nent to many people, but last year its product amounted to over 70,000 pounds of potash. The product finds a ready market; in fact, it is impossible to supply the demand. Of the output last year, over 20,000 pounds were exported to Germany.






