

HE TELLS THE TRUSTS THEY MUST BE GOOD

Answer to Wall Street's Cry of "Panic" Is Made by the President in His Lincoln Day Speech in New York.

Threats Do Not Scare Him—If Business Methods Do Not Conform to the Law, They Must Be Changed So They Will, He Declares—He Defends the Tariff, and He Says the Promises of the Party Are Being Carried Out.

New York, Feb. 13.—If the enforcement of the law is not consistent with the present methods of carrying on business, then it does not speak well for the present methods of conducting business, and they must be changed to conform to the law.

This was President Taft's answer to Wall Street and its cry of "panic." It was made to a cheering audience of hundreds of prominent Republicans gathered Saturday night at the annual Lincoln Day dinner of the Republican club of this city, held at the Waldorf-Astoria.

Redeems Its Promises. "No one," he continued, "has a motive as strong as the administration in power to cultivate and strengthen business confidence and prosperity."

Defends Tariff Bill. Mr. Taft again came to the defense of the Payne-Aldrich tariff bill. He did not hesitate, he said, to repeat that it constantly comports with the party pledge for tariff revision.

Reviewing the party platform, the president spoke of interstate savings banks, amendments to the antitrust law, the anti-injunction plank, statehood for Arizona and New Mexico, and the conservation of natural resources.

Wall Street's Alarm. "The administration has been attacked on the ground that its policy tends to create a panic in Wall Street. All I have to say upon that is that nobody responsible for a government can destroy would foolishly run amuck and destroy values and confidence for the pleasure of so doing."

"Uncle Joe" Praises Him. Speaker Cannon, in a letter of regret, characterized President Taft as a "worthy successor to Lincoln, who was called on to exercise the same patience that characterized Lincoln's administration, especially in your great metropolis, where extremes in advice are always in evidence, and particularly at the present time."

He is a young man, he said, "don't excuse, don't explain; get it done, let them yell." As far as he can, the president said, he was going to get it done, meantime he would "let them yell."

BLOODHOUNDS RUN ACCUSED BOY DOWN

Trained to His Room by Dogs, Irvin Hanchett Is Arrested at Deland, Florida, Charged With a Brutal Murder.

He Is a White Youth, Sixteen Years Old, and Came from a Correctional School in Connecticut—Mary Tedder, a Girl, His Alleged Victim—She Is Found With Her Face Cruelly Beaten and Her Body Literally Cut to Pieces.

Deland, Florida, Feb. 13.—Irvin Hanchett, a sixteen-year-old white boy, was arrested today, charged with the murder of Mary Tedder, of Glenwood, yesterday. The girl was stabbed in six places, her body literally being cut to pieces. It is not yet determined whether she was assaulted, but this is believed to have been the boy's purpose.

Congressional Program. Washington, Feb. 13.—The fact that Mr. Taft, in his New York speech, emphasized the subjects of postal savings banks, interstate commerce legislation, anti-injunction and conservation of natural resources seems to mark these for early action by congress, and especially since all these already have reached advanced stages.

Navy Tug Nina Is Missing With a Crew of Thirty-Two Men. Boston, Feb. 13.—No news of the missing tug Nina came today. The belief is growing that the little vessel has gone to the bottom, carrying a crew of thirty-two men.

Disaster in Strait of Magellan. Valparaiso, Feb. 13.—On the receipt of news that the steamer Lima had been wrecked on a reef in the Strait of Magellan and eighty-eight persons had been dispatched the Chilean government dispatched the cruiser Zenteno thither. Following the cruiser are five steamers which the Pacific Navigation company has sent to the aid of their sister ship. The fate of those left behind by the steamer Hatumet, which rescued 205 of those aboard, will be learned by wireless from the Zenteno. No further word has been received from Anquid, where the Hatumet stopped with the survivors. The Hatumet was compelled to leave the Lima on account of the danger of being swept on the rocks.

BRITISH PREMIER CHANGES PROGRAM

At the Last Moment, It Is Said, Mr. Asquith Has Yielded to the Demands of the Radicals and Redmondites.

London, Feb. 13.—Following the premier's visit to the king Saturday, nothing has been divulged regarding the government's policy. The premier will communicate the king's views to the cabinet council tomorrow. It is said that at the last moment Mr. Asquith yielded to the extremists and Redmondites and, on the ground that the discussion of the king's address and the budget would postpone the question of the veto of the house of lords until after Easter, consented to introduce the veto bill first.

IRISH AND LABOR ATTITUDE.

The Irish and Labor parties have defied the dissolution of the cabinet, with a strict independence of action regarding any compact or agreement with the ministers, but it is a matter of fact that the whips of the three groups form a working informal committee of management which will secure the ministers a working majority. The scheme will be entered by the Liberals which does not give at least a fair chance to the Liberals to obtain a majority, however small, in the upper chamber.
