BRITISH PREMIER CHANGES PROGRAM

At the Last Moment, It Is Said, Mr. Asquith Has Yielded Demands of the Radicals and Redmondites.

While the Speedy Passage of the Budget Is Said to Be Indispensable to Avoid Financial Chaos, He Agrees to Postpone the Consideration of That Bill and Give the Proposition of Curbing the Lords' Veto Power the Right of Way.





The new science of the air is the reult of many hundred kite and sound ing balloon flights made by day and by night in fair wealther and foul, over land and sea, at all seasons of the year and from the counter to the Arctic Circle. Most people know that the warm air surrounding the earth is only know that at ten miles above the earth t would not only be bitterly cold, but the sun would appear quite different.

The air is stratified in three more or less distinct layers. In the lowest we live. It extends about two miles and is a region of turmoil, whimsical winds. cyclones and anti-evclones. At two miles the freezing point is reached, and then there is a second stratum extending upward for about another six miles. Records in the auditor's office show that Michigan's permanent school fund amounts to \$4,270,411, and that the lands are all sold; that Wisconsin's permanent school fund is \$3,723,955 and that all but 364 acres of the land is sold; that the lowa permanent school fund is \$4,778,019, and that the lands are all sold. Minnesota, Michigan, Wisconsin and Iowa started with practically identical school lands and similar natural resources.

This is the main reason why Minnesota's school fund, founded upon virtually the same principle, exceeds that of either of the three states named by nt least \$15,000,000-the early-day legislators looked far into the future and were sagacious. In 1861, when government lands were on the market at \$1.25 an acre, the Minnesota legislation placed \$5 an acre as a minimum for state lands sold for farming purposes. The pine timber lands were withdrawn from the market entirely. except that the timber could be sold at public sale to the highest bidder at a certain sum per 1,000 feet as the mini-mun, the timber to be scaled by a state officer called the surveyor general, and not until the timber had been sold could the land be offered for farming

purposes.

Contributing to this situato have their own steel supply and the coming necessity of some of the merchant furnaces to find another outlet for their pig iron following the crection of ing companies which have been buyers in the market of pig iron.

A few years ago the Republic Iron & Steel company and the Youngstown Sheet & Tube company took a large proportion of the Bessemer iron output of the valleys, but both are nov practically independent of the pig iron market, and the same may be said of company tormerly bought heavily, but at all. The Republic company has built three new blast furnaces and enlarged its others. The Youngstown company has built two and is completing a third all of which represents about 3,000 tons of iron per day that will not be purchased in the market.
