FEDERAL CONTROL OF LAKE FISHING

SUMMARY PROPOSED CONCURRENT REGULATIONS BY UNITED STATES AND CANADA.

BILL NOW BEFORE CONGRESS

International Fisheries Commission Proposes to Take Boundary Waters Out of Hands of States.

It will be remembered that early last summer David Starr Jordan, who represents the United States on the International Fisheries commission, was in Marquette and spent a few hours with local fishermen and ascertained their sentiment toward the proposed scheme of federal regulation for the protection and preservation of food fishes in international boundary waters of the United States and Canada.

The treaty between the United States and Great Britain, creating the fisheries commission, provides that fishing seasons and methods in the boundary waters, and the nets and appliances to be used therein, should be determined by uniform international regulations, that these regulations should constitute a uniform system for the preservation of food fishes in such waters, and should embrace closed seasons, limitations as to the size, etc., of nets and other appliances; a uniform system of registry by each government for the regulation of commercial fishing within its own territorial waters, and an arrangement for concurrent measures for the propagation of fish.

Uniform Regulations Proposed. The proposed regulations formulated by the International Fisheries commission, in so far as they apply to Lake Superior are as follows:

No whitefish of less than two pounds weight shall be fished for, killed or captured.

No lake trout of less than two pounds weight shall be fished for, killed or captured.

No black bass or brook trout shall be taken in these waters, by any means whatsoever, except a rod and hand line, or a trolling line with spoon hook attached, and in no case shall the line be used near more than three hooks.

No black bass or brook trout shall be fished for, killed or captured through or beneath the ice. No brook trout less than seven inches or black bass less than ten inches shall be fished for, killed or captured. Not more than ten black bass shall be captured in any one day nor more than twenty by the occupants of any one boat.

No pound net shall be set in these waters unless so constructed as to have in the middle of the back of the crib, reaching from top to bottom, a vertical strip of netting, the width of which shall be not less than one-half of the width of the back of the crib, and the mesh of which shall be not less than three-fourths of an inch. No apron or other device which may reduce the means of escape of small fishes through the meshes shall be used in the crib.

The leader of a pound net shall be made visible; there shall be a gap of at least fifty feet open and clear in the bottom between one pound net and the next of the series when set in linear or-

der, and here shall be a lateral passage-way or distance of not less than 1,000 feet between one series of pound nets and the next on either side. Not more than seven pound nets belonging to one person shall be set in a linear series.

No concealed movable trap net shall be used in these treaty waters. No gill net or other movable net of less than 4 3/4 inches mesh, extension measure, as actually used in fishing, shall be drawn, set, placed, or maintained for whitefish or lake trout in these waters. No gill net or other movable net of less than 2 1/2 inches shall be drawn, set, placed, or maintained in Lake Huron, Lake Superior and Lake Ontario, for fish other than whitefish or lake trout.

Nothing contained in these regulations shall prohibit the use of seines, fyke nets, or other nets, exclusively for the capture of carp, eels, and coarse fish. When fyke nets are used for such purpose the wings and leaders shall not extend more than ten feet from the entrance.

Suggested Form of Act.

To secure the enforcement of the above regulations, the commission suggests that congress pass an act, in substance as follows:

That from and after the passage of this act the regulation and control of the fisheries on the United States side of the water contiguous to the United States and the Dominion of Canada shall be exercised by the United States government.

That the system of uniform and common international regulations for the protection and preservation of the food fishes in each of the waters prescribed in article four of said convention, as prepared by the International Fisheries commission appointed under the terms of said convention, and as signed on May twenty-ninth, nineteen hundred and nine, is hereby received and approved.

That the administration of these international regulations is hereby placed with the United States bureau of fisheries of the department of commerce and labor. That there shall be established in the bureau of fisheries a system of inspectors, wardens, deputy wardens, and assistants adequate for the proper enforcement of the laws and regulations governing the fisheries and fishing in international waters, each and any of whom shall have power to seize without warrant fishing gear, boats, or other apparatus which is being illegally used, and to make arrests without warrant; and the amount necessary for the enforcement of the said laws and regulations shall be estimated for annually by the secretary of commerce and labor and appropriated for, including salaries and expenses of the inspectors, wardens, deputy wardens, and assistants herein authorized, all of whom shall be appointed by the secretary of commerce and labor in accordance with civil service regulations as follows:

One deputy international fisheries commissioner who shall have general charge under the commissioner of fisheries, of the enforcement of the international fisheries laws and regulations, represent the United States in any suit concerning any supposed violation of such laws and regulations, conduct investigations of the natural history and habits of the various species of fishes with reference to their more adequate protection and propagation, and in general act as the duly authorized representative and deputy of the International Fisheries commission.

One secretary to the deputy international fisheries commissioner. Three inspectors, one of whom shall have charge of the fisheries of Lake Ontario and of the international boundary waters lying between or on the boundary of the states known as New England and the provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Quebec; this to be known as the eastern division of the treaty; one for the Great Lakes, exclusive of Lake Ontario and with the Lake of the Woods and its tributary waters; this to be known as the central division of the treaty waters; and one for the international boundary waters about Puget Sound as defined in the treaty; this to

be known as the western division of the treaty waters. There shall be not fewer than seven wardens under the inspector for the eastern division, twenty-one wardens under the inspector for the central division, and five wardens under the inspector for the western division, all of whom shall devote their entire time to the service.

Upon the recommendation of the inspector in charge and the international fisheries commissioner the commissioner of fisheries is authorized to appoint deputy wardens, not exceeding forty in all, who will devote only such portion of their time to the service as may be required. Local fishermen have expressed themselves as favorably disposed toward the federal regulation of fisheries along the lines suggested by the International Fisheries commission, believing that the laws then the states, and further, that all the lakes should be under one and the same regulations. On the other hand, State Game Warden Pierce is opposed to federal regulation, and went to Washington last week to protest against the government taking over the Great Lakes fisheries, claiming that the plan is a violation of the principle of states rights.

BASEBALL MEETING AT CITY HALL TONIGHT

ALL INTERESTED IN MARQUETTE HAVING A GOOD TEAM THE COMING SEASON ARE URGED TO ATTEND.

Much interest was manifested everywhere yesterday in the meeting to be held at the city hall tonight in the interest of the baseball team to be organized that there will be a large attendance, not only of dyed-in-the-wool fans, but of business and professional men, who may be chiefly interested in the civic pride and prestige that comes from having a winning ball team. It is especially desired that all who are in position to help the team morally or financially, or by furnishing employment to players on the team, make it a point to attend. Special effort through personal invitation will be made today to bring out a large and representative attendance of citizens at the meeting.

No definite plan of action has been mapped out and what will be done depends entirely upon the wishes of those who attend. For this reason, every person who has any ideas on the many features of the baseball situation in Marquette should be on hand to express himself, or forever after hold his peace. Some of the many questions that are likely to be discussed are: Plans for management of the team, whether along the same lines as last year or by a board of directors composed of prominent citizens; whether it is best to have a strictly amateur, semi-professional or purely professional team; the make-up of and rules governing any league that it may be decided to join; managerial timber, etc. The meeting will be called to order about 8 o'clock.

A Munising man who was in the city last night stated to The Mining Journal that Munising was in no shape to enter the league this season, and if any team was organized at all, it would play independent ball. He said that the management was heavily in debt from last season, as many of the games were very poorly patronized. Furthermore, he said that there was little talk or enthusiasm manifest in the Alger county town regarding baseball for next season, and that he would not be surprised if no team were organized the coming spring. If these statements are true it puts a new face on the baseball situation, as Munising was generally counted on as one of the four teams that would make up the league. Ecanaba has said that she would not enter a league under any conditions, and the fourth team to make up the league may not easily be found.
