

Gans, was saved from a knockout in the fortieth round of his fight with Ad Wol-gast this afternoon when Referee Eddie Smith humanely stopped the fight. Nelson, game to the last, stood in the center of the ring, and even though he could hardly raise his hands he begged to be allowed to continue. He was led to his corner, heart-broken. In the op-posite corner of the ring, the new light-weight champion of the world, Ad Wol-gast of Cadillac, Mich., and Milwaukee, was lifted to the shoulders of his train-ers, amid the cheers of the big crowd.



Fifteen policemen quartered in a car barn in Ridge avenue narrowly escaped death tonight, when the entire northeast corner of the building was blown away with dynamie.
