LAST PORTRAIT OF CLAY. Story of Daguerreotype Treasured by Maker at Auburn.

Carefully wrapped in cotton there is in an Auburn, N. Y., home the last portrait ever made of Henry Clay. The portrait is a fine specimen of the daguerreotype and it shows the famous Kentuckian in all his ugliness.

"In the '50s I was a professional daguerreotype artist, and in my travels I reached Lexington, Ky. My firm, Reynolds & Ryder, of New York, had sent me purposely to get a picture of Henry Clay, and when I reached Lexington I was dismayed at the stories I heard. Clay had refused everybody and only a few days before my arrival he had refused to sit for a man who had come all the way from Boston and who wanted a portrait to aid him in making a bust of Mr. Clay."

"There are plenty of pictures of me when I was young and better looking," said Mr. Clay, and he refused to sit. "I was discouraged, but in looking around I met a man who said, 'The man is any man in the world who can do it. Coombs can,' and I was introduced to General Leslie Coombs. He kindly agreed to ask Mr. Clay to sit as a personal favor to him, and I agreed to give him a copy of the daguerreotype and to keep the original unpublished."

"On the following Monday I went to Clay's home at Ashland, a mile from Lexington, with my letter of introduction from General Coombs. I banged the big old-fashioned knocker on the door, and instead of a negro Mr. Clay came to the door himself and shook hands with me. "When I told him my errand and said I had a letter from General Coombs he did not even ask to see the letter, but agreed to sit for me. He said that he had not sat for his portrait for years and was satisfied to let posterity look upon his younger features, but would sit for the general."

"When I arrived his negro, Jack, was just hitching up his team and he asked me, 'How did you come over?' I said that I had walked, and he said, 'Wait until my horses are ready and ride with me. I am going over to Lexington.' So I rode back with him and on the way he told me about having heard Jenny Lind sing for him privately at Washington a few days before that. He said she was the most wonderful singer he had ever heard in his life. 'Somebody stole it many years afterward.'"

"When I got out of the carriage I asked Mr. Clay when he would come to my studio and he said, 'I am coming over to the Bank of Kentucky tomorrow at noon (Tuesday) and I'll sit for you then.' Then he drove on through Lexington."

"I was afraid that he would forget the engagement, so I had the darky boy who did my chores watch for him next day. He saw him go into the bank and told me and I sent him over a note. Mr. Clay said that he had entirely forgotten the sitting but that he would come right over, and he came within a few minutes. "I suppose I ought to adjust my wardrobe a little," he asked.

"I said, 'No, Mr. Clay, if it is the same to you I'd be pleased to have you just as you are,' and he sat down with his coat all wrinkled and I got him just as you see him in the picture. Then he got up and didn't even ask to see the picture when it was done and he never saw it."

"It took me only a few minutes to finish it and after making a copy for General Coombs—he was one of the 'Three Great C's of Kentucky,' Clay, Crittenden and Coombs—I took the original back to New York and have treasured it ever since. It has never been published. "Henry Clay died soon after I took that picture, his death occurring in Washington and I am sure it was the last ever made of him. He must have been at least seventy-five years old when I took it."

WEST ISHPEMING LOTS IN DEMAND

MARQUETTE COUNTY LAND & INSURANCE COMPANY HAS DISPOSED OF NEARLY FIFTY IN THE PAST TWO WEEKS.

West Ishpeming, the so-called Mildon addition, is to have a building boom the coming summer. The Marquette County Land & Insurance company, organized a few weeks ago, with A. W. Jurma as manager, has been given by H. H. Mildon and Manville Jenks the sale of all the remaining lots in the plat. The addition was platted in 1892 and during the two or three years following some forty-five lots were sold and houses were erected on several of them.

The Marquette County Land & Insurance company has placed nearly fifty of these lots in the past two weeks. Most of the purchasers are Finns, who intend to build homes. The lots, which vary in frontage from fifty to eighty feet and are 100 feet in length, are selling at from \$55 up. Mr. Jurma and his associates have secured control of the lots under favorable conditions and purchasers are given time in which to settle for them, if they desire it. There were 187 lots in the plat.

Mr. Jurma yesterday said that most of the men who are buying lots intend to build homes during the coming summer. The location is an ideal one, being high and dry, and the streets are in fairly good condition. The plat lies close to the main highway leading to the Cleveland-Cliffs Iron company's North Lake property and the towns west of here. The location will be less than two miles distant from the North Lake mine. The plat is just outside the city limits, in Ishpeming township, which a few years ago provided a fine school building.

D. T. Morgan Company's Letter

The New York market opened weak and began to slowly rise on persistent selling by traders. The selling was said to be based on the Western strike situation, as announced in the morning papers, and found a scarcity of supporting orders. The result was lower prices all through, ranging from a fraction to three points. Wall street sentiment is bearish and the best prospects for the time being is a dull, irregular market. The Boston market was dull and weak in sympathy, with considerable selling of the Lake issues, Arizona Commercial and North Butte. Lake was most heavily sold and broke 2 1/2 points. Indiana lost a point, Franklin and North Lake each lost fractions. North Butte declined to 41. The other Colliery stocks were quiet and slightly weaker. Hancock sold off on the announcement of an assessment of \$3. to be called, payable in three equal installments, May 2nd, Aug. 1st and Oct. 1st. The tone generally was weak, but except in the stocks above mentioned, the selling pressure was light. Heavy sales of metal at good prices yesterday were reported and the large producers claim to be confident of better prices shortly. Boston advises buying the standard coppers on this recession.

On the curb, the prices held well against rather heavy realizing sales in a few instances. The losses, where any, were but fractional, and in many cases yesterday's prices were maintained. Bohemia, South Lake, Cactus, Calumet & Cornish and Boston Ely were the most conspicuous in the trading. San Antonio was weaker, selling at 81 1/2. With the profit-taking on some of the new Lake issues completed, we look to see the curb do better, as they are less dependent on general market conditions than on physical developments at the properties.

George F. Ruez's Review.

Heavy selling in the New York list resulted in losses of from one to two points today. The liquidation was due to the uncertainty connected with the outcome of the railroad strike. Unless the strike can be averted through mediation or arbitration 25,000 men will go out twenty-four hours after the strike order is issued. The weakness in the New York list did not affect the Boston coppers much. The buying was much better than the selling. Lake opened at 77 1/2, broke to 75, then rallied to 76 1/2. Indiana sold off to 29, but was well taken. Greene Cactus sold off to 10 1/2, while Gironis sold off to 9 1/2. Hancock went down to 82 1/2 on the announcement of the assessment. Boston Ely and Bohemia were the most active in the issues. Boston Ely opened at 43 1/2, sold down to 35, then recovered to 43. The buying of this issue is said to come from insiders. Bohemia sold off from 15 1/2 to 14 1/2. The offerings are, however, light and it will rally easily. Cactus under 3 and chief consolidated under 2 1/2 were in good demand. Live Oak sold off from 2 1/2

to 30%, in sympathy with the general market.

MINERAL LANDS IN GOOD DEMAND

SEVERAL PROMISING TRACTS WEST OF AMERICAN MINE HAVE PASSED INTO NEW HANDS SINCE MAAS DISCOVERY WAS ANNOUNCED.

Several owners of land in the district between the American mine and Champion have either leased or sold their tracts to good advantage since announcement of the discovery by the Maas interests on the forty immediately west of the forty on which the American is located. The owners are asking prices all the way from \$5,000 to \$25,000 a forty.

Most of the land is owned by Marquette county people and a considerable amount of money paid for options or for acquiring lands outright has gone to poor people. Several tracts that are fairly promising are still on the market.

George J. Maas and his associates have not yet given a lease on the tract on which they found ore, but several parties have made inquiries concerning Mr. Maas and prepared to grant a fifty-year lease. All of the lands that he and his associates have acquired in that vicinity have been taken under fifty-year contracts.

As practically all of the ore thus far located by the Maas interests has been found in low lands, the sinking of a shaft will probably prove a difficult task. Mr. Maas is now working out the plans for a concrete shaft, 200 feet to the ledge. In the event the property is not leased within a reasonable time, it is likely that a company will be organized and development work started. It will be necessary to drain off a considerable quantity of water, as the swamp is one of the largest on the range.

The methods of shaft sinking have improved greatly during the past three or four years, and Mr. Maas is of the opinion that the first shaft sunk on the tract west of the American mine will be bottomed on the ledge at a comparatively small cost, in spite of the fact that much water and some quick sand will be encountered.

It is expected that several diamond drills, in addition to those now in operation, will be worked in the district during the coming summer. The Oliver Iron Mining company has control of tracts in that district that might possibly be explored this year, and one or two other well-known mining concerns may also do some work there.

TO HAVE DRILL SQUAD.

Menmie, of Ishpeming, who were on Tuesday night elected to offices in Lake Superior Commandry, No. 30, Knight Templars, at the annual meeting held at Marquette, are to organize a drill squad of Negaunee and Ishpeming Knights. The organization will soon be perfected and the drill meetings will be held at regular intervals. The squad will be composed of not less than sixteen Knights and thirty-two will be secured, if it is possible, to train. The squad will attend the annual conclave, to be held in Chicago in August. Nearly every room in the leading hotels of Chicago has already been reserved by Masons and their friends, who have planned to attend the meeting. It is expected that a special train will be required for the upper peninsula people attending.

Valuable to Railroads.

"Not only do they now realize, as they have always realized, that the settlers are valuable to railroads, but they realize that settlers in this section of the woods are particularly valuable. Ordinarily, a farmer on land is reckoned worth \$100 a year. In this section, devoted to small farming almost exclusively, as it must be, the farmer should be reckoned much higher in traffic and commercial value. The small farmer is several times as liberal a factor in railroad earnings as is the one who occupies broader acres.

"Settlement in this section counts for more than it does in the far West. Out there the railroads are pretty well satisfied if they find one family on every square mile. In this region the farms are smaller and the people live closer together. Instead of one to the square mile, there are here one to the average eight to the square mile. Eighty acres is considered a good-sized farm in this locality, whereas the ranchman considers a whole section rather small.

"Instead of being a region that offers little for the railroads except iron ore and timber, this country is a factor right for railroad exploitation than the wheat country, or the corn belt, or any of the ranch sections. Railroad men are now getting to be among the most enthusiastic boosters of the agricultural resources of the upper peninsula. Some of the local residents may have to brace up a bit in order to keep up with them, and let it not be said that Marquette has allowed herself to be exceeded in interest and zeal by anybody outside.

"Industrial work is nothing new for the railroads. They all employ agents who look out for openings and send word to the men who are seeking locations. Most of the western roads have land departments. Every road has its advertising agents, who take pretty pictures and write fetching descriptions of the scenery along the line. From now on the upper peninsula may expect to get results from this sort of advertising."
