M'CORKINDALE HAS NOT YET CONSENTED

MANAGER OF MARQUETTE COUNTY GAS & ELECTRIC COMPANY WILL RUN FOR MAYOR IF WORKING CLASSES WANT HIM.

W. J. McCorkindale, manager of the Marquette County Gas & Electric company, who has been talked of for the nomination for mayor on the Republican ticket, has not yet consented to be a candidate. Since his arrival home from the South, where he was called because of the death of his father, many voters have urged him to run. He said yesterday that he is endeavoring to ascertain if the people generally want him for mayor. He said that if he finds that sentiment is favorable he will enter the race.

Mr. McCorkindale said he felt honored at being mentioned for the office during his absence from the city. The news that he was being talked of for mayor came to him as a surprise. The first intimation he had of it was an article in The Mining Journal some ten days ago, a copy of which reached him a few days later. If the working people of the city desire him to make the run he will become a candidate. He said that the success of the street railway and lighting business he is managing depends largely upon the support of the general public and he feels that if running for the office of mayor would make him or his company any enemies he would not accept the nomination, under any circumstances.

It seems to be the opinion of the voters that Mr. McCorkindale will be the Republican party's nominee. His nomination would be favorably received, as he has shown, during the years he has been at the head of the Marquette County Gas & Electric company that he is not only a hard worker but an honest and broad-minded business man.

WILL SHIP 50,000 TONS.

Former Ishpeming Man Making Great Headway at Vermilion Range Mine.

It is reported from Ely, Minn., that George A. St. Clair and Alfred Merritt are vigorously pushing their development work on Section 30. Messrs. St. Clair and Merritt are partners in lease contracts on the famous section and they are now employing 140 men.

It is reliably stated that every miner working underground is breaking ore and that not a single foot of dead work is being done at the present time. From the several headings ore is being taken of merchantable quality. Every drift, cross-cut, shaft, or upraise in which work now is being done, produces high grade hematite.

From exploration and development work now under way, 250 tons of ore are produced and hoisted every day. With a trifling amount of stoping, ore could be raised and put into the stock pile that, in quantity and quality, would be the envy and despair of every iron producer, buyer or user in the United States.

Already, Messrs. St. Clair and Merritt have contracted to deliver 500,000 tons of ore this season. One of the most prominent of the fee owners of Section 30 recently stated that the quantity will be 100,000 tons, rather than 50,000.

It is thought that the Duluth & Iron Range railroad will have an extension of its Ely line finished to Section 30 by June 1, perhaps May 1.

Captain Wood, an old friend of George A. St. Clair, recently visited Section 30. He was amazed and delighted with the showing there. He stated to friends in Duluth that Section 30 will make George A. St. Clair more money than any iron deal he ever has been in and that is saying much.

In all probability the old Chandler mine at Ely, which was operated by the United States Steel corporation for a number of years, will be a fairly large producer this year. At the time the steel corporation gave up the lease it was announced that the property was worked out, but it is reported that it now looks as if the former operators missed an ore body of considerable magnitude.

DIAMONDS FROM THE SKY.

Do diamonds rain from the skies? This is one of the theories mentioned by Sir William Crookes in his new book on "Diamonds." The suggestion is that of A. Meydenbauer, who says: "The diamond can only be of cosmic origin, having fallen as a meteorite at later periods of the earth's formation. The available localities of the diamond contain the residue of not very compact meteoric masses which may, perhaps, have fallen in prehistoric ages. Their remains are crumbling away on exposure to the air and sun, and the rain has long ago washed away all prominent masses. The inclosed diamonds have remained scattered in the river beds, while the fine light matrix has been swept away."

"Bizarre as such a theory appears," says Sir William, "I am bound to say there are many circumstances which show that the notion of the heavens raining diamonds is not impossible."

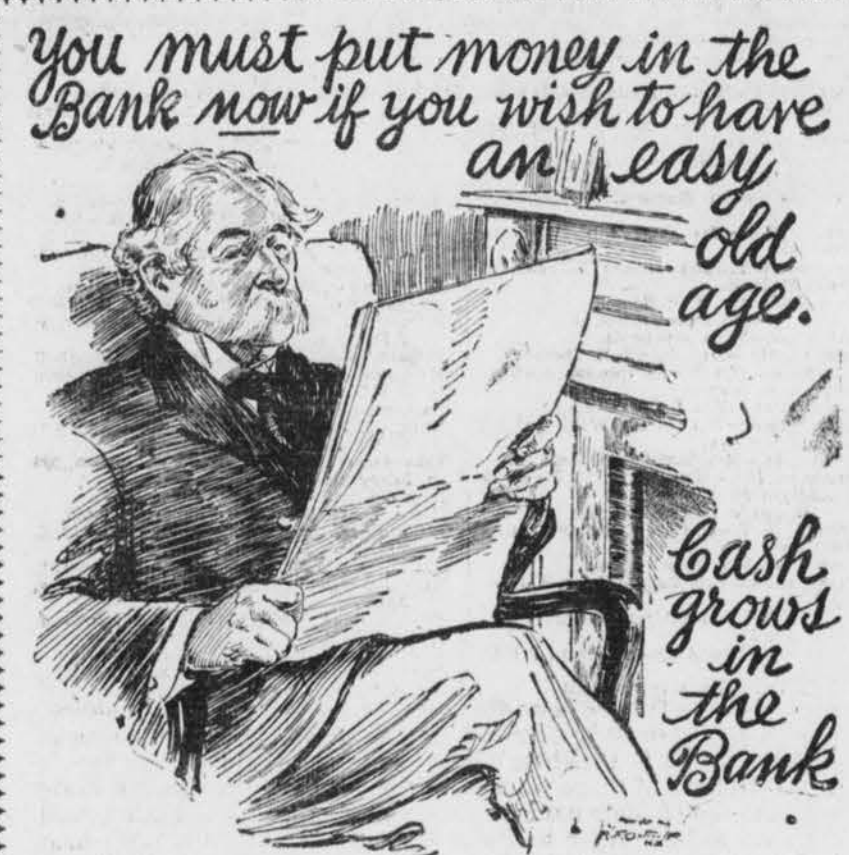

STEEL CORPORATION'S EXPENDITURES IN 1909

IRON ORE COMPANIES MADE A TOTAL OUTLAY FOR IMPROVEMENTS OF OVER THREE MILLION DOLLARS LAST YEAR.

The comprehensive report of the United States Steel Corporation, recently issued, shows that last year the total expenditures for improvements and equipment by the iron ore companies under its control amounted to \$3,012,298.95. The expenditures on the Mesaba range were much heavier than in other districts, and the amount expended for improvements on the Marquette range was less than during any previous year.

On the Mesaba range the Oliver company last year provided a steel shaft at the Mesaba mine, near Hibbing, and a complete mining outfit, a laboratory and crusher house at the Gilbert mine, new equipment at the Leonard, near Hibbing; new steel coal docks, trestle, laboratory and crusher house at the several mines. The company also spent nearly \$1,000,000 for equipment and repairing the old rolling stock for the Duluth & Iron Range railroad.

The Oliver company also spent nearly \$1,000,000 for equipment and repairing the old rolling stock for the Duluth & Iron Range railroad. Among the new equipment were 800 steel ore cars and four freight locomotives. Fifty cabooses were rebuilt and considerable other minor equipment was acquired.

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ON SIXTEENTH YEAR. Wellknown Commercial Man Has Made Good With Milwaukee Concern.

W. M. Quinn, who travels in the upper peninsula for the Mayer Boot & Shoe company of Milwaukee, has returned to Negaunee, after spending a week in Milwaukee getting together his fall samples. Mr. Quinn entered the employ of this concern sixteen years ago and has had the same territory throughout that time. It includes the entire upper peninsula and a few towns in Wisconsin. He is now one of the oldest traveling men in the employ of the concern, which was established twenty-six years ago. When he started he was the eighteenth salesman to be put on the road. The company now has fifty-eight salesmen traveling out of Milwaukee and right out of its Seattle branch. P. K. Wheeler, the company's first traveling man, is still with the concern, and he holds his original territory.

LARGE CONTRACTS PLACED. Reported That Mining Companies of This District Have Sold Considerable Ore.

It is reported from New York that interest in iron and steel last week was transferred to the lake district, where large contracts were placed for gray foundry iron for car wheel manufacturers and additional tonnage were placed. It is estimated that in all districts contracts placed aggregated about 100,000 tons, including 40,000 tons for the American Radiator company for delivery at its various plants during the second half of the year.

Cleveland and Buffalo furnaces are reported to have taken the bulk of the business in the northern territory. In the East no large contracts were closed, but there was a larger number of small purchases aggregating between 20,000 and 25,000 tons.

There was wide range in prices covering the same grades and deliveries. It is claimed that Alabama iron has sold as low as \$12.50 at Birmingham for No. 2, but most of the sales have been at \$13. The same grade in the Central West has dropped to \$10, but sold as high as \$17 at the furnace. Delivered prices in New England have ranged from \$13.50 and

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higher for both Northern and Southern iron. Virginia iron has sold as low as \$14.75 and as high as \$15.50. In Eastern Pennsylvania reports are that No. 2 iron has ranged from \$16.50 to \$18 at the furnace.
