First, however, the charter revision must be adopted in order to provide the necessary machinery by which the funds required may be raised.

At the spring election in 1907 the attempt to raise money for water works improvement was a failure owing to the change in the charter which went into effect one month before the vote was taken, and this in spite of the fact that [a considerable majority of those voting on the question were in favor of the improvements then recommended.

Since that time, owing to the adoption of the new state constitution and a failure until recently of the State Legislature to provide for charter revision under the new constitution, it has not been possible for the board to put itself in a position to carry out the necessary improvements.

The adoption of the proposed amendment will provide the necessary means by which the improvements may be made.

The action of the voters on the recommendation of the Board will then determine the question for or against pure water and the nature and extent of the improvements.





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
