Morgan & Co's Letter.

"The New York market was again quiet today, though stronger all through and especially so in the metal stocks. Amalgamated advanced 1 1/2 points from the opening. Steel common is point and slushers 1/2. The strength in Amalgamated was said to be due to confirmation of the report that it had taken over the Clark copper properties in Butte. Copper reports and other news continue favorable and we are inclined to look for a higher market, especially in Amalgamated. The Boston market was quiet, with few stocks coming out on bids and the trend distinctly upward. The advance in Amalgamated should have a favorable effect next week on the entire market, as the bullish sentiment in the East towards copper is said to have been reversed during the past few days. Negotiations as published yesterday for the purchase of large quantities of metal indicate a much better condition of the metal than generally anticipated, as these large amounts would not be openly sought unless manufacturers' stocks were about completely used up. The close was strong, and we look for better prices next week. The curb stocks continue quiet, with the most activity in the Hoine issues. There was some inquiry for New Baltic, but no stock could be had. Shattuck sold at 30, and 7 1/2 was bid for San Antonio. Boston Eiy sold at 2 1/2. The other values were unchanged, but firm. The curbs should do better next week. The stocks are scarce and a little buying would advance several of the better issues to a much higher level. The bank statement was good.

George F. Ruez's Review.

"The confirmation of the purchase of the Clark properties by the Amalgamated, and the statement that this would enable the Amalgamated to produce copper at less than one cent cost good buying of Amalgamated advanced the price from 60 1/2 to 71 1/2. The Boston market showed some improvement in price but trading was not very active. Stocks are said to be scarce and the reported intention of the metal market, with the strength displayed by Amalgamated, should start something in the copper list soon. On the curb Shattuck was cleaned up under 20, with considerable more wanted. Chief Consolidated sold at 1 1/2. Cactus at 3 1/2 and 13. Trade was light."

DIXON PITCHES A SHUT-OUT GAME

DID NOT WRESTLE.

Rowett-Beehan Contest So Poorly Attended that Match Was Declared Off.

The catch-as-catch-can wrestling match between John Rowett, champion Cornish wrestler of the world, and Pearl Beehan, that was to have taken place Saturday evening at the 4:30 p. m. hour, was a failure as far as the attendance was concerned. Fewer than seventy-five men and boys turned out and the receipts were not sufficiently large to induce the wrestlers to go on. The preliminaries, one in Cornish style, and the other in catch-as-catch-can style, had been arranged and it was certain that the entertainment would have been a satisfactory one in the event it had not been declared off, as both Rowett and Beehan said that they were in excellent condition and that they both intended to wrestle for all that they were worth. Neither of them figured that they would have an easy match and they agreed that they could not afford to take a chance of being defeated for what cash they would get out of it.

Chris Person, who wrestled Champion Gotch in the handicap match at Houghton Friday evening, was in the audience. Mr. Person had never seen either Rowett or Beehan wrestle and he was taken down from the copper country especially for that purpose. He stated after the match that the wrestling game has been injured greatly in the copper country and that it will take some time to arouse the interest in the sport which prevailed a few weeks ago. He said that the contest at the Amphitheatron Friday evening was not the financial success that the management had anticipated. Mr. Person was Gotch's wrestling partner on the circuit through the West three years ago and he stated that Gotch has improved wonderfully since that time, and he is now a much heavier and stronger man than he was then. He expressed the opinion that he will win the world's belt of cloth and her goods. He will take place the latter part of this month. He bases his opinion on the work that both wrestlers did in the contests with himself. It took Zysko fifty-three minutes to throw Person, while Gotch put him down in a little over half that time.

'PHONE COMPANY LOSES.

Holland Subscribers Win Case in Supreme Court—Discrimination in Rates Alleged.

This brings to a conclusion the litigation which has been waged by the Holland subscribers ever since the rates were raised when the automatic system was installed in 1907 and is almost a complete defeat for the telephone interests. What action will be taken now is problematical, as the decision may pave the way for a multitude of similar suits in all sections of the state and even over the country.

The case grew out of the raise in rates which was announced by the company on Jan. 1, 1908, when new subscribers were charged \$18 for residential and \$30 for business phones, the rates before the installation of the automatic system being \$12 and \$18, and afterward being raised to \$15 and \$24, at which figure the service was considered satisfactory.

With the second raise, which did not apply to old subscribers, the Holland county took the matter up at the request of the merchants, and a subscription was started to defray the expense of a suit. Charles McBride, who then was city attorney, was chosen to handle the city's case and he was assisted during the conduct of it by Attorney C. R. Wilkes of Allegan. Judge Stuart and Attorney Kleinhaus of Grand Rapids undertook the defense of the suit before Judge Paulgum, who finally decided in favor of the plaintiffs, the case being immediately appealed to the supreme court. The decision handed down yesterday will probably bring realising results in the telephone world, as the decision is the first which covers this point, which has been raised in many sections of the state and country.

Marquette's first victory was easy picking. The entire Queen City delegation took with the greatest kindness to Oswald's pitching and gave their batting averages a great boost.

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With seventeen hits Marquette's scores were naturally of frequent occurrence, and in all, twelve of 'em were counted up.

Crystal Falls Tightened Up. In yesterday's game Crystal Falls tightened up about 100 per cent over Saturday, and gave indication of what can be expected from one team when it stands down to an average game.

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Will Be Strong. Despite the fact that the Crystal Falls team lost two games to Marquette and was fairly routed in the opener, it is the opinion of the Marquette team that it will be a strong contender in the league race.

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TELEPHONE COMPANIES FIGHT NEW TAX LAW

SIX LEADING CORPORATIONS, INCLUDING MICHIGAN STATE TELEPHONE COMPANY, REFUSE TO PAY THEIR TAX ASSESSMENTS THIS MEANS IMPORTANT LITIGATION.

Almost all the larger telephone companies of Michigan, with the exception of the Home Telephone company of Detroit, have joined together in an effort to get a supreme court ruling on the validity of the new ad valorem tax law.

Petitions for an injunction restraining the auditor-general from attempting to collect the tax have been filed in the United States circuit court for the western district of Michigan, at Grand Rapids, by six companies.

The companies which have filed petitions are the Michigan State Telephone company, Detroit; Citizens' Telephone company, Grand Rapids; Twin City Telephone company, St. Joseph and Benton Harbor; Citizens' Telephone company, Battle Creek; Citizens' Telephone company, Jackson, and Citizens' Telephone company, Marshall.

Several other of the larger companies probably will join and file petitions, and on one of these the test will be made. The argument of the corporations which are preparing to oppose the ad valorem law is, in general, divided into two parts, both based on the inequitable points in the law.

One is that clause in the law which exempts from taxation those companies whose income is less than \$500 a year. This clause includes perhaps more than half the companies of the state—most of them of course being the small rural local concerns.

The larger companies argue that this exemption clause is discriminatory and inequitable. Claims Taxes Are Inequitable. Their principal and underlying contention, however, according to leading telephone men, will be that the practical working of the law is unjust.

Under the old law the wire-using companies paid specific taxes—based on their gross earnings. Under the new law we are to pay on the basis of property valuation, like every other taxpayer. Theoretically this is just and fair, but it works out very much to our disadvantage.

The wire-using companies, under the ad valorem tax law, are to be assessed, not by the local assessors, but by the state board of assessors, and their valuation on the tax rolls is to be true cash value of their properties. Therein, if the new law is enforced, will come a very great hardship to us.

The great trouble with the new law is that it does not provide for a state board of equalization. Such a board exists in other states, and its work equalizes such unfair results of the law as this one. It is our desire, in this application for an injunction, to bring out in the test case the unfairness of the present law and thus ultimately to bring about the passage of another law which will make up the shortcomings of this one.

The injunction petitions contain the tender of the payment to the auditor-general of whatever taxes the court may decide to be proper, under the new law or the old one. Attorney Henry M. Campbell has been placed in general charge of the cases and will fight the test case through the courts.

Property Worth \$25,000,000. The property holdings of the 800 telephone companies of the state aggregate roughly \$25,000,000, it is estimated. Of this amount probably \$22,000,000 is in the holdings of the comparatively few larger companies which are most affected by the new law and are most earnest in their opposition to it.

The Home Telephone company of Detroit has paid its taxes under the new law, said H. H. Robinson, general manager of the company. "We had a meeting of the officers and decided that, although we consider the tax exorbitant, it was the law and we should pay and we did."

The total tax assessed against all companies under the new law was \$433,022.30. Of this sum less than \$100,000 has been paid.

DEATH OF MRS. GARCEAU. Following an illness of a number of weeks, Mrs. Mary Ann Garceau passed away yesterday morning at 9 o'clock. She lived at 432 Garden street. The deceased had made Marquette her home for thirty years or more, and she was among the best known of this city's French residents.

RELEASED ON BAIL

John A. Adams, Alias "Wolf" Weichers, Let Out of Prison. Saturday an order was received at the Marquette prison for the release of John A. Adams, alias "Wolf" Weichers. The order was issued by the supreme court, before which an appeal of his case is pending, and was granted to Adams for \$10,000 bail, put up by James Baird and Smith G. Young of Lansing, who are understood to be secured by Adams' sister.

Adams was sent to the Marquette prison from Detroit in May last year, for ten years, for perpetrating a marriage fraud on Rosa Renz. While traveling under the name of "Dr. Weichers," Adams advertised, in Cincinnati, for a stenographer, and the Renz girl responded. The girl accompanied Adams as his stenographer to several cities, and finally in Detroit after he had persuaded her to marry him, showed her an application for a marriage license and persuaded her that it was all that was necessary for a legal ceremony. Adams was tried twice, the jury disagreeing the first time. He has been constantly engaged since he was convicted trying to arrange for his release on bond. He is reputed to have considerable money, laid away while he was following the road as a medicine fakir. He was released from prison yesterday.

ANNUAL SCHOOL CENSUS. Co-Operation of Public Urged in Making It a Complete One. The school census enumerators will commence their work Tuesday, May 17, and the work must be finished before Monday, June 6. It is desirable that everyone, parent or otherwise, do his best to furnish the enumerators with a complete list of those who, on the 6th of June, will be between the ages of five and twenty years.

It makes no difference whether the persons are working, away from home (their parents or legal guardians living here) or married. They can all properly be placed on the list. Every name means several dollars for the school fund of the city. Whether or not parents send their children to the public schools, they have to pay taxes and help support these schools. Therefore, the more primary school money the city gets from the state, the less each and every taxpayer will have to pay.

Parents needn't fear that older boys and girls will be forced into school, by virtue of their names being placed on the school census list, for the only purpose of the school census is to furnish a basis on which the state moneys can be correctly apportioned to each school district.

The enumerators for Marquette, and the wards in which they will work, are as follows: First ward, Miss Annie Maney; Second, Miss Nellie O'Keefe; Third, Miss N. Reardon; Fourth, Miss Elizabeth Crowley; Fifth, Miss Kate Wallace.

WILL ENFORCE LAW. School Boys Must Keep Out of Billiard Rooms and Other Resorts. The state department of public instruction has directed the attention of the Marquette board of school trustees to Act No. 260, 1881, entitled "An act to provide for the protection of children of all its provisions.

The act prohibits the frequenting of barrooms, variety theaters, concert halls, pool and billiard rooms, etc., by minor children under seventeen years of age and minors who are students in any public, parochial or private schools.

The law provides a penalty for all persons conducting such places who permit its infraction by fine of from \$25 to \$50 or imprisonment in the county jail from ten to thirty days, or both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court.

The school board has issued notices on which are printed the full text of the law, and they have been distributed about the city. It is the intention to prosecute any persons who violate the provisions of this statute, and it is said that the conduct of the billiard and pool rooms on the points touched by the law will be particularly looked into.
