

HALLEY'S COMET IS RECEDING NOW

According to Calculations at the Yerkes Observatory, the Earth Passed Through the Tail Between 8:37 and 10:37 Last Night

Multitudes of People Peer Into the Heavens for a Glimpse of the Celestial Visitor, but There Is Very Little to See—Astronomers Find Much of Interest, However, and Some Excellent Photographs Are Taken—Big Spots Observed on the Sun.

Chicago, May 18.—Thousands of people lined the streets tonight to peer into the west for the incandescent tail of the receding comet.

At the Yerkes observatory at Williams Bay, Wis., the astronomers secured photographs and accurate records of meteoric phenomena and varying heavenly luminations under atmospheric conditions nearly perfect for work with the camera and telescope.

Professor Edward Barnard is greatly pleased with the results of the observations, which extended almost without interruption for forty hours.

A painstaking search was made through the tail of the comet for spots where illumination might be lacking.

The party at the observatory included Professor S. A. Mitchell, of Columbia University, New York; Professor Edwin E. Frost, Professor Sherburne, Professor W. Burnham, Professor Edward Barnard, Professor John A. Parkhurst, Professor Storr B. Barrett, Professor Frederick Sloan, Oliver J. Lee and Mary L. Calvert.

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TWO FEARFUL EXPLOSIONS AT PINAR DEL RIO, CUBA.

Dynamite Demolishes the Rural Guard Barracks, Killing Fully 100 Persons and Injuring as Many More—Cause of the Disaster Is a Mystery.

Havana, May 18.—Two almost simultaneous explosions of dynamite, about 3,000 pounds, demolished the rural guard barracks in Pinar del Rio this afternoon.

It is not known whether the explosion was the result of an accident or was due to an act of conspirators.

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FIGHT FRANTICALLY TO ESCAPE DEATH

150 Excursionists, Men, Women and Children, Are Panicked Stricken When a Missouri River Steamboat Is Wrecked.

Entire Right Side of the Vessel Is Crushed in When the Craft Strikes a Sand Bar in Attempting to Turn Around, and the Ship Capsizes Before the Shore Is Reached—Loss of Life Is Prevented by the Coolness of the Crew.

Kansas City, Mo., May 18.—Panicked by the realization they were on a sinking steamer, one hundred and fifty passengers, men, women and children, fought madly to escape from the excursion boat Uncle Sam when it struck a sand bar and capsized in the Missouri river near this afternoon.

The accident occurred in mid-stream, where the river is wide and deep, the steamer was attempting to turn around when it struck the bar, the collision crushing in the entire right side of the boat.

The boat was headed for the shore, but before arriving it sank on one side, submerging half of the deck.

The rapid filling of the hull cooled the boilers and probably prevented an explosion.

Chinese Fight Battle. Seattle, Wash., May 18.—Twenty-three of 400 Chinese on the Blue Funnel liner Keenan arrived tonight from Hong Kong wounded in a battle on the ship three days ago.

Russian Workmen Perish. Forty-Seven Are Drowned When a Boat Is Overturned. Alexandrovsky, Russia, May 18.—Forty-seven workmen were drowned here today through the upsetting of a boat.

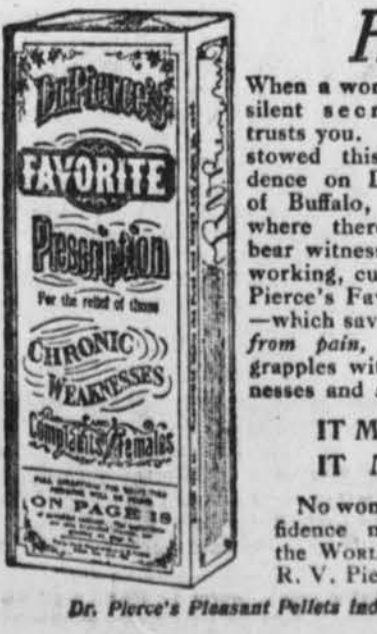

NO CURTAILMENT AT BUTTE.

If there is any expectation among copper consumers that the Butte mines will be compelled to close or curtail because of the lowering price of the metal they are likely to be disappointed.

The most costly thing in deep mining is to operate at half capacity or close down altogether. It requires just as many men to run a plant when the mines are operated half as if they were going at full capacity.

At present the Butte mines are producing copper at the rate of about 25,000,000 pounds a month, which is close to the high water mark for the mines now being worked.

**Budget Considered**—Aldermen Astor and Peters, of the council finance committee, and members of the park, cemetery and street commission met yesterday afternoon to consider the budget which the commission will ask the council to approve. It is likely that the commission will ask the council for about \$25,000, \$5,000 of which will be set aside for the park and cemetery fund. It is estimated that \$1,000 will be required to put the artificial lake in Park cemetery in good condition. The stone retaining walls are crumbling.

**Clinton Would Like Berth**—The management of the Marquette baseball team yesterday received a letter from Cecil Clinton, who pitched for the team last year, and who is now on the pitching staff of the Oshkosh team, applying for a place on the Marquette team again this season. He writes that he would prefer playing with Marquette to continuing with Oshkosh. Clinton says he was not released from the South Bend team, as he made good with it, but his services were not needed, as five old pitchers showed up in good form. Marquette will not be able to offer Clinton a place this year, as with Scholtus, Frost and Jeanson the management believes it has all the pitching talent it will require.

**Tariffs Received**—Marquette county business interests are receiving the tariffs of the Chicago & Duluth Transportation company which will be in effect for the steamer Penn Marquette, which is to go into service between Chicago and Houghton and intermediate ports the middle of July. The tariff is effective June 15. The rates will admit of approximately a 20 per cent saving over the existing railroad rates. The service for this and some of the other ports to be served is of an experimental nature, and whether it will be continued indefinitely depends on the amount of business the company has. The Transportation company has a traffic agreement with Lake Superior & Ishpeming, Munising and Marquette & Southeastern railways.

**MADAM SCHUMANN-HEINK.**  
A Sketch of the Career of Celebrated Artist to Be Heard Here.

Madam Schumann-Heink, whose approaching recital here, on May 28, a week from Saturday, is attracting so much attention, has achieved her success and world-wide fame through her artistic genius alone, not depending on sensationalities to attract attention.  
She was born in the latter part of 1861, in Bohemia near Prague, and after studying singing somewhat, she was forced by want into making her operatic debut when she was only seventeen years old. This was in Dresden, and her first operatic appearance was in Verdi's opera "Travatore."  
Her artistic greatness was a matter of slow growth. For four years she sang in Dresden, then went to join the company at Hamburg, where she sang for many years. It was not until 1892 that she first went to London, where she made a great and immediate success, which laid the foundations for her international reputation. Since 1896 she has been in constant demand as a Wagner singer at Bayreuth, Wagner's home, and later, at the great yearly festivals in Munich. She was one of the first of the great singers to give an entire program of songs, rather than a mixed program of operatic airs with the assistance of a "concert company" of interior music. She was also one of the first to put English songs on her programs, preferring the individuality of American composers to the general mediocrity of the writers across the water. For several years she has been an American citizen, living in her scant leisure on an estate in New Jersey, surrounded by her numerous family. Recently she bought a ranch in California.  
Success has come to her, thanks to her early beginnings (at least ten years before most debutantes) while she still has youth and strength to enjoy it for many years. At forty-eight she is in her glorious future, her wonderful voice just at its maturity and her creative interpretive genius adding new charm to every phrase she sings. There is never anything lacking about her singing; she is constantly trying new effects and welcomes new ideas.  
It would not be probable that a great singer so constantly in demand as is Madame Schumann-Heink would come to so remote a town as Marquette unless by special invitation. The Saturday Music club is responsible for this great privilege offered to the music-lovers of Marquette, and they hope to make her appearance here so successful that she will carry away as beautiful a memory as she leaves behind her.  
Madam Schumann-Heink caused it to be announced in Marshall, for her recital there, that she would respond to such encores as were asked for. It is suggested that each seat buyer have the privilege of asking for two encores, the requests to be left at Bigelow's, where the seats are on sale. Before the concert these encores will be arranged according to the number of requests and presented to Madame Schumann-Heink as a suggestion of the wishes of the audience.  
Some 82 seats and a few gallery admissions can be had at Bigelow's. No more than the actual seating capacity of the gallery will be sold. There are no more 82 seats left.

**RACED WITH DEATH**  
AND WON A BRIDE.

Finace of Match King's Daughter Made a Record Rush from Old Mexico.

Bridgeport, Conn., May 18.—Sitting up in bed for the first time since an explosion of acetylene gas which terribly burned her two weeks ago, Miss Frances Robinson, daughter of the late J. Kelly Robinson, the "Diamond" match king called a few intimate friends around her at her country home, Greenfield Hill, Fairfield, and smilingly announced her engagement to Paul McEwen of Chicago.  
The fiance, a typical American, bronzed by outdoor life, was one of the little group. There was no need for him to express his supreme happiness, for he had just completed a record-breaking trip across the continent from the heart of Mexico, having been summoned by a telegram which told him that Miss Robinson was dying.  
Instead of that he found her on the road to recovery, while the doctors assured him that she would not be disfigured for life, as had at first been feared. It had been necessary, though, to shear off the greater portion of her heavy chestnut hair in order to treat the burns.  
Mr. McEwen is a son of John McEwen, a prominent contractor of Chicago, and is superintendent of the Ox Fiber Brush company of Frederick, Md. In the interests of his concern he was stationed in a wild part of Mexico, buying raw material for use in its manufactures.  
When Miss Robinson struck a match near a leaky gas tank on her estate, resulting in an explosion which burned her from head to foot, nearly killing her, word was sent Mr. McEwen at once. Within twenty minutes of its receipt he was on horseback galloping for the nearest highway, which was miles away.  
It was hundreds of miles to the nearest railroad, and to facilitate the trip Mr. McEwen obtained an automobile, which he raced to the nearest railroad station. After reaching the railroad he took the shortest route and fastest trains to Connecticut. He reached the home of his fiancee to find her alive instead of dying, and able to greet him, her recovery practically assured.  
Miss Robinson's sister, Margaret, is the wife of Alfred McEwen, a brother of her fiancee. They were married several years ago.

Mining Journal Wants Bring Results

**SUNDAY SCHOOL WORKERS GATHER AT WASHINGTON.**

More Than Fifty Nations and 24,000,000 Students Will Be Represented by Delegates at the World's Convention, Which Opens Today—Taft Will Speak.

Washington, May 18.—Sunday school workers from all parts of America and beyond the seas will take part in the convention of the world's Sunday School association, which opens here tomorrow. Of the 3,500 accredited delegates, more than 1,000 arrived today, among the foreign delegates being 150 from England, Ireland and Scotland. Many visitors not delegates have been attracted to the meeting.

It is expected that during the entire week that the convention lasts there will be at least 10,000 strangers. More than fifty nations will be represented, and more than 24,000,000 Sunday School students. The proceedings will be public.

There will be a parade Friday of 10,000 men around the Capitol building. President Taft will speak tomorrow morning at the opening.

**STOCK MARKET STAGNANT.**

Strength of Foreign Exchange a Big Factor in the Dulness.

New York, May 18.—In seeking an explanation for the present stagnant condition of the stock market, today's attention turned to the foreign exchange situation. The difficulty in obtaining authentic information on the subject from the bankers concerned added to the doubts entertained. It is said that conditions in the foreign exchange markets are much confused and the difficulty of reading the supposed effects of the sales of bonds abroad is thus increased. The strength in foreign exchange was indicated by the course of the foreign markets and the sales here of stocks for foreign account. The troubles incident to the putting ahead of the fraudulent cotton bills of lading also constitute an element in the scarcity of commercial bills of exchange. The hardening course of the private discount rate in London today dissipated any expectation that the bank rate would come down tomorrow. The confidence of gold with draws for sundry destinations from the Bank of England makes it likely that protection will be sought by making the present bank rate effective in the open market.

**COLONEL ROOSEVELT TO BE CAST IN BRONZE.**

North Dakota to Erect an Equestrian Statue of Ex-President to Cost \$15,000.

Washington, May 18.—The good people of North Dakota are going to show their appreciation of their erstwhile citizen and neighbor, former President Roosevelt, by erecting a statue in that state in honor of the strenuous ex-president. But contrary to reports, the statue will not represent Mr. Roosevelt in cowboy uniform with a brace of pistols dangling at his side. Representative L. B. Hanna of North Dakota, who has been giving special attention to the matter, in discussing the statue to the former president said: "The statue of Theodore Roosevelt which the people of North Dakota are going to erect, will not represent him as a cowboy, and it will not be placed in Medora, the town near which he was located when engaged in ranching in the early '80s."

"It will be an equestrian statue, but the proposition to represent a former president of the United States as a cowboy does not appeal to our sense of dignity and propriety. This is to be a fine monument, one worthy its subject and the state whose people have a high admiration for Colonel Roosevelt as a citizen, soldier and statesman and a warm regard for him as an old Dakotan. He was a resident of North Dakota during its formative period, and many of the old timers knew him well and esteem him highly."

"The movement to erect a statue to Colonel Roosevelt started two years ago," continued Mr. Hanna, "Senator Hansbrough being president of the association started for that purpose. When his health failed him he retired and I was chosen to succeed him. Thus far there has been no organized effort to raise money and yet we have received nearly \$5,000 in sums ranging from twenty-five cents to \$5, most of them being \$1. We expect to raise \$15,000, and know that it will be promptly forthcoming."

"Gustav Vigiland, of Christiania, Norway, a noted sculptor, has been engaged to make the statue, and while in that city last week Colonel Roosevelt gave him a sitting. I wrote to Colonel Roosevelt while he was in Africa asking him to do this, and while coming down the White Nile he replied, promising to give him the sitting, but saying that he was not favorable to the erection of monuments to living persons. But he doubtless will waive the objection in this case. As soon as congress adjourns, Dr. Fields, secretary of the association and I will go to Norway to make final arrangements."

"The statue will be erected in the grounds of the State Agricultural college, which adjoins the city of Fargo. There are between 1,000 and 1,500 young men and women attending that institution and the location is a most appropriate one."

**TROOPS TO BE WITHDRAWN.**

Missouri Strikers Begin Negotiations for Settlement of the Trouble.

Hannibal, Mo., May 18.—Unless unreasoned developments arise, Governor Haley will order the militia on duty at Haseo to return home. The strikers today began negotiations for the settlement of the trouble which led to the shutting down of the cement plant and the calling for troops. Less than one hundred workers have returned to work. Warrants charging rioting have been issued against 144 men.

**ROADS MADE OF LEAVES.**

Leaves would be considered a very poor material for the making of roads in most parts of the world, but in certain districts of Florida such a material is used with great success. There are miles of road that would be almost impassable by reason of the deep sand were it not for the leaves of the long-leaved pine. These leaves, which are very much like straw in appearance, are raked over the sandy roadbed once a year, the task usually being performed in October.—Popular Mechanics.

**HAY IS GOOD TO EAT.**

Kansas Experiments Show That Alfalfa Can Be Made Edible.

Topeka Kan., May 18.—Kansas raises more alfalfa than any other state in the Union, but this great crop is not doing much to reduce the cost of living except that it makes fatter cows and steers and puts more lean streaks in the bacon of the Kansas hog.

Domestic science students in various parts of the state and at the Kansas Agricultural college are working on the problem of making alfalfa edible for human beings.

Miss Ruth Ingham of Topeka, a graduate of the Kansas Agricultural college is conducting the experiments with alfalfa bread and cakes. She has found that alfalfa bread is better than corn bread, has as much nourishing qualities as meat and it costs two cents a pound, while wheat flour costs three and one-fifth cents per pound. Just to show that edible and nourishing bread and cakes could be made from alfalfa Miss Ingham made some of these and gave the members of the Shawnee Alfalfa club "feet" of alfalfa products.

The members of the club ate much of Miss Ingham's alfalfa pastry and bread and pronounced all of it good. The cakes were probably the best, at least the club members ate more of the cakes than of the bread. In the cakes ants and raisins were used to remove the decided hay flavor which alfalfa meat has.

In making alfalfa bread small quantities of wheat flour and caraway seed were mixed with the alfalfa flour. These added ingredients removed practically all of the hay flavor.

There is some hope for improving the very worst, so long as they are not insensible to shame.

**THE COST OF DIVORCE.**

It is estimated that the lowest price for which a divorce can be obtained in England is \$220. This is considered very high, and it is pointed out that it makes divorce prohibitory for poor people.

We are not in favor of any divorce whatever, believing that the South Carolina law on this question is the best of all laws, in that it does not permit the breaking of the marriage contract for any cause. However, we believe that if divorce is to be recognized and granted by the courts, the remedy should be open to the poor as well as the rich. Moreover, the proceedings should be in the open, be the parties at issue either rich or poor, and such a scandalous secretion of the facts as was permitted in a recent prominent divorce case in New York should never be allowed.

Those who feel that it is necessary to separate should not be so sensible as to fear the verdict of the public—a verdict generally more just than that of judge or jury.—Charleston News and Courier.

### ELKS' DETROIT TRIP.

Members of Duluth Lodge Will Travel with Iron and Copper Country Men.

Duluth Elks will join those of northern Michigan and northern Wisconsin in a trip to Detroit in a body for the state and national conventions in July, says the Duluth News-Tribune.

Elks from this city will leave on the evening of July 8 and will be joined by Elks of the copper country at St. Ignace the morning of July 9, all embarking on the D. & C. steamer at St. Ignace for Detroit that evening.

They will arrive in Detroit the afternoon of July 10, Sunday. The convention will open Monday, July 11. The Elks of northern Michigan, nearly 1,000 strong, will appear in a big night parade during the convention dressed as miners. Each man will have a mine lamp or candle, lighted, on his leather hat, illuminating the entire parade. The famous Calumet & Hecla band, which is to accompany the copper country Elks to Detroit, will be made a part of a mass band, which will be made up of 47 organizations of more than 700 pieces, for a big parade and concert during the convention week.

The upper peninsula will send a large percentage of the Elk membership of that part of the country to Detroit than will any other community in the country. More than 50 per cent of northern Michigan's Elks have already pledged themselves to make the trip.
