BLUFF DIDN'T WORK

Marshal Manning Experiences Difficulty in Arresting a Vesselman.

The engineer of the steamer C. C. Hand was fined \$15 and costs by Justice Byrne yesterday, the charge against him having been assault and battery. Complaint was made by the fireman of the same vessel, who alleged that the engineer had struck him with an iron bar. This of itself is an occurrence not much out of the ordinary on board Great Lakes vessels, but from Marshal Manning's standpoint, the case was of particular interest. Complaint against the man was made yesterday, and the marshal went down to the boat which was at anchor off the dock, to arrest him. To the officer's surprise, the captain of the vessel refused to allow the man to be arrested, claiming that whatever offense had committed had been committed on the high seas, and that local officers had no jurisdiction. Not being a student of law, Marshal Manning was not sure but that the captain was right and went back to Justice Byrne for advice.

The justice advised him that he had been "bluffed" by the captain, and then the marshal, accompanied by Sheriff Lehman and two deputies, made a second trip to the vessel prepared to get the man, even if a fight was necessary, but meantime, the captain had moved his vessel just outside the breakwater. The officers straightway got a boat, went out to the vessel and spent three hours playing hide-and-seek with the engineer, but were unable to find him. They finally gave up the search and returned to shore. At 2:30 a. m. yesterday, however, Marshal Manning made his third trip to the dock, found the boat lying alongside, and arrested his man without further trouble. In justice court yesterday, the captain was meek and apologetic, and stated that he had attempted to shield his engineer, because he was afraid the latter would be lodged in jail, and the vessel held up until another engineer could be secured.

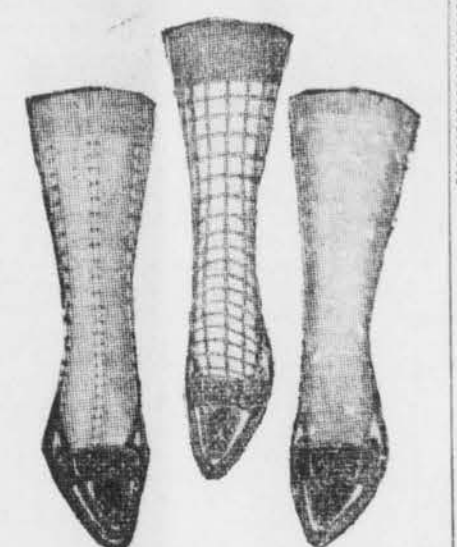
